The witness identified Exhibit 2557 as his affidavit and verified its contents. The affidavit stated that the witness was with the Headquarters of the Central China Expeditionary Army in August, 1938. Military operations to capture Hankow were in progress and Hankow was due to fall.

He was living in Shanghai at the time. He went to Army Headquarters at Kiukiang and arrived at Hangkow on the 28th, in the evening, landing at the eastern end of the Japanese settlement about a mile from the custom house. The settlement was for the most part burnt down and very quiet. He was not permitted to enter the French settlement but went around it to the Custom House. There was not a Japanese soldier to be seen except MPs stationed in the Ssuming Bank because the soldiers were not allowed to enter but were kept outside. He was looking for quarters of Japanese soldiers but there was neither. There was no alternative and he went to the wharf and talked to the crew of a certain ship, whom he asked for lodging *. He remained there six days until November 3rd, except when he went ashore on business in the daytime. There was a foreign ship at a distance of about thirty or forty yards. A considerable number of Chinese junks, and British and French gunboats were down the river and there were Japanese destroyers. The city of Hankow was truly quiet. There was no gun report. He saw no murders committed near the wharf. The custom house was used as the office of Transport Headquarters and it had an unobstructed view of the vicinity.

Hankow was divided into two garrisons the army and the navy. Most of the Yangtze Valley was placed under the Navy Guard and army men could not enter the area. This was altered later on.

There was no cross examination of the witness.

That Japanese soldiers were not allowed in the city; that he never once heard the report of a gun, and inasmuch as he had an unobstructed view of the vicinity, "neither shot nor murder could have occurred; that when Hankow was occupied the Navy took over and soldiers were not permitted to enter the area."

I was attached to the Headquarters of the Central China Expeditionary Army in August, 1938. Military operations to capture HANKOW were in progress, and HANKOW was on the eve of fall at that time. I was residing in STANGPAT at that time. Preceding my subordinates, I went by plane the "eadquarters of the Army at KIUKIANG. Unaccompanied, I boarded a destroyer at KIUKIANG and arrived at HANKOW on the evening of the 28th. I landed at the eastern end of the Japanese settlement, a spot down the river about a mile from the Customs House. The Taranese settlement in HANKOW city was for the most part burnt down, and was very quiet, there being almost no one to be seen on the streets. I was not permitted to enter the French Settelement. After going around the French settlement, I came to the Custom Wouse. Not a Japan se soldier was to be seen, except those of the headquarters unit of the Japanese Filitary Police stationed in the SSTMING Bank, because the Japanese soldiers were not permitted to enter the city; but were guartered on the outskirts of the city. I was looking for quarters of Japanese soldiers with the intention of lodging there. However, there were neither Japanese soldiers nor their quarters. As there was no alternative, I went to the wharf at the Custom House. A ships named "Nidori Maru," belonging to the Shipping Transport Command, lay at anchor. I shouted to the crew of the ship from the wharf. Then, going to the ship I asked for

lodging there and Obtained their approval. I went on board the "Midori-Maru" some time ofter 8:00 p.m. on October 28th and lodged there for six days, that is until November 3. I spent all of my time on the ship except when I went ashore on business in the daytime. At a distance of about thirty or forty from the "Midori-Maru," a foreign ship lay at anchor. In addition there was a considerable number of Chinese junks near-by. Down the river British and French gunboats lay at anchor close to the river bank, and in the offing there were Jacanese destroyers. While I lodged in the "Midori-Waru", the city of HAMKOW was truly quiet. Never once did I hear the report of a gun. Nor did I see a murder committed in the vicinity of the wharf. The Customs House nearby the wharf was used as the office of the Transport Headquarters. from the window of which we had an unobstructed view of the vicinity. Therefore, neither shot nor murder could have occurred. After its occupation by the Japanese Army, HAMPON was divided distinctly two garrison areas, that is, that of the Army and that of the Navy. At the time when HANKOW was occupied, most of the Yangtze. Valley was placed under the Navy's guard, and soldiers of the Army were not permitted to enter that area. These garrison areas were more or liss altered later on.
