Before me appeared this the 26th day of December, 1917, 1946, William R. Mathews, known to me to be a citizen of the United States, over the ege of twenty one years, a resident of the city of Tucson, county of Pima, state of Arizona, and also known to me to be the editor and publisher of The Arizona Daily Star, at Tucson, Arizona, who stated to me that he wished to make known a conversation he had in Moscow, United States of Soviet hussia, with Mamoru Shigemitsu on July 5, 1937.

Affiant said: Accompanied by my wife and elder son, I arrived in Moscow i on July 2, 1937. We had come across the Pacific, stopping in Japan for three weeks, in China and Manchuria, and had taken the Trans-Siberian railway to Moscow.

We were invited to the reception Ambassador Joseph Davies gade on July 4, 1937. At this reception I met Mr. Shigemitsu who was at that time Japanese ambassador at Moscow. When I told him I had been in Japan and had come through China and Manchuria across the Trans-Siberian Railway, he seemed to be interested enough to ask me to call at his embassy the frowing morming.

This I did, and in his embassy on July 5, 1937% we had a frank discussion of Japanese-American relations. In the course of this discussion, I said that if the secretive policy of the Japanese government continued regarding Japanese naval construction, I felt that it would in time generate enough distrust and fear in America eventually to provoke hostilities. I added that I felt that if it were true that Japan's policy was one of "non-menace and non-aggression", an open book on naval construction would do much to atky allay American fears.

In answer to this I distinc/tly remember Mr. Shigemitsu saying: "Oh, we could never think of going to war with the United States. That would be a tragic day for apan, if she ever did such a foolish thing. You would overwhelm us."

During the remainder of our conversation, higemitsu explained just as diplomatically as he could how he felt that the saner people in Japan were doing their best to temper the aggressive policy forced on them by the army leaders. He said that he deplored the thought of attempting to settle controversyial issues by violence, and he pleaded for patience on the part of

the American people and expressed the hope that differences in the Orient could be settled by juridical means.

My conversation with Shigemitsu lasted for nearly an hour. As a result of his statements and of his general attitude, I became convinced that he believed in peace rather than war and that he was disturbed lest the arrogance and aggressiveness of certain apanese leaders in Japan lead to armed conflict. During the several days that I was in Moscow, I found during discussions of the international musiculation with members of the diplomatic corps and with foreign journalists that my good opidion regarding Shigemitsu was widely shared. As a result of my conversations while in Moscow, I have firmly believed that the willingness of Shigemitsu to serve as Foreign Minister in the Japanese Cabinet during the war was prompted by the hope of himself and his friends to use the first available opportunity to bring about peace.

As of possible interest I am attacking hereto copies of the Arizona Daily Star of April 2, 1945 containing an article written by me and published in the Star in which Mr. Shigemitsu is mentioned.
