HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. (Alree Labranche, Speaker.)

The House was yesterday almost entirely occupied with a hill, having for its object the repeal of all the laws prohibiting the introduction of slaves. The bill was opposed by Messra, J. F. Canonge, Marigny, Allard and Morgan, with much force and vigor. It was, however, finally adopted. Mr. Morgan, one of its opponents, having voted with the majority, availed himself of the privilege accorded thereby, to demand its reconsideration; it therefore stands over for further argument for another day.

Mr. Marigny, in scordance with previous notice, introduced a bill to authorise the Governor to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, two additional Judges for the Supreme Court.

On motion, it was ordered, that the Clerk be authorized to subscribe for fifty copies of ath the newspapers published in the State, being for the use of the several members. Mr. A. Cuvilier was elected as clerk in the place of Mr. C. Rousseau, resigned.

A petition signed by the officers of the Legi n, praying that good fire arms be given to the soldiery, was presented; after some debate, ordered, that the consideration of the same he postponed to next Monday.
