And call the Infant, Valentine".

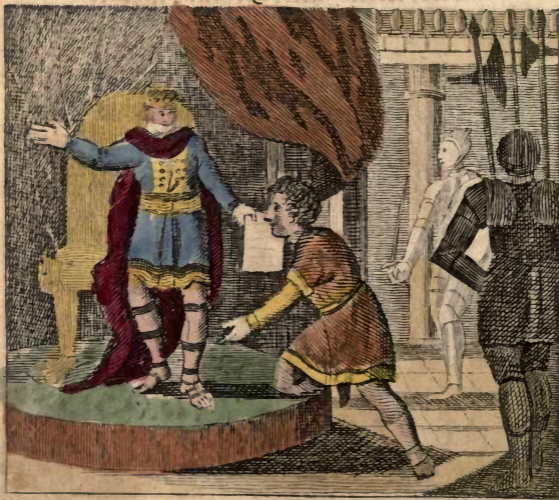
Orson destroying the Travellers.

to fight Orson.



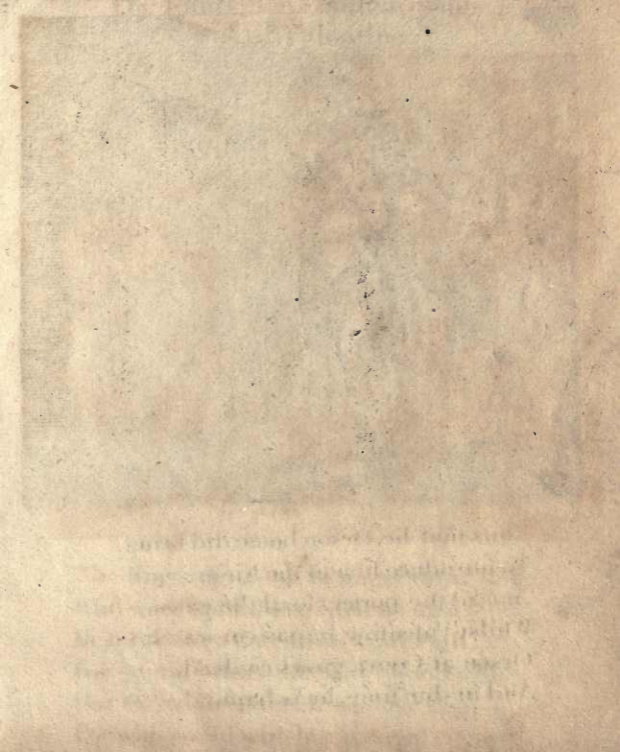
The King himself, wish'd much to see,

 Who from the Green Knight set her free.



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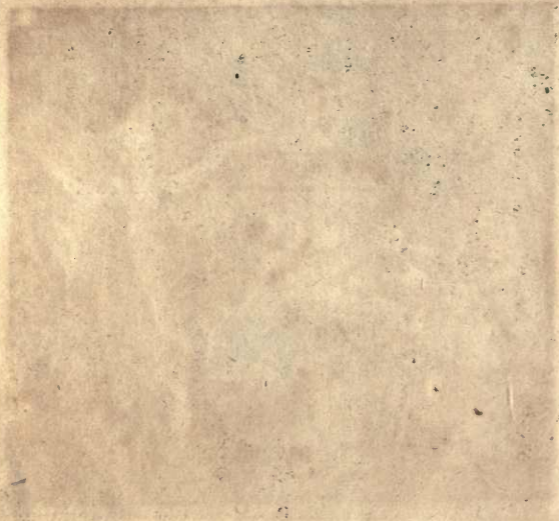
The Green Knight making friends
