

TAXATION BY ORDER-IN-COUNCIL

The Fishery Tax Act, to which Lieut.-Governor Paterson gave assent is a most remarkable piece of legisla tion. The ostensible object of the act is to increase the revenue of the the real object is to retain control over fisheries the Privy Coun cil decided were not within the juris diction of the province.

Apart, however, from the ulterio motive behind the law, the plan adopted to levy tribute upon the fisherme is a revival of the methods of centurie ago, when the Crown and not parliament imposed taxes and compelled payment by unjust and cruel persecu tion. In the old days the Crown pos sessed the authority of power, either assumed or wrested from a weak par liament; to-day the McBride government has been vested by a servit legislature-which will be known in history as the Rubber Stamp Parlia ment-with authority to fix the taxe to be paid by fishermen and to vary the amount in respect to the kind of fish taken and as to the parts of the province in which fish are taken. Thus there may be one tax for salmon, another for halibut and another for cod one tax for Victoria, another fo Nanaimo, and still another for the Fraser and Skeena rivers. No person knows what the tax will be, or how much or how often it will be varied. That is known only to the gods and McBride

Were it not that the consequences of the enforcement of this scandalous legislation may prove destructive of a most important industry, the Fishery Tax Act might amuse and to som extent instruct those more directly concerned. For there would be both amusement and instruction in witness ing the fantastic tricks that would be played by virtue of the arbitrary power provided by this autocratic enactment. The arrogant assumption of legislative power by the Lieut .-Governor-in-Council is only excelled by the cowardly surrender of authority by the representatives of the people.
