TAXATION BY ORDER-IN-COUNCIL

The Fishery Tax Act, to which Lieut.-Governor Paterson gave assent, is a most remarkable piece of legislation.

Apart, however, from the ulterior motive behind the law, the plan adopted to levy tribute upon the fishermen is a revival of the methods of centuries ago.

Were it not that the consequences of the enforcement of this scandalous legislation may prove destructive of a most important industry, the Fishery Tax Act might amuse and to some extent instruct those more directly concerned.

This act authorizes the government to impose taxation by order-in-council, without any restraint as to the amount of the tax or the manner of assessing the value of the property to be taxed.

The conditions in Canada are not, except in degree, so very different from the conditions in Great Britain. There are hundreds of poor, houses scattered throughout the country, which, in the light reflected from the system created by that much-abused individual, Lloyd George, are not a credit but a reproach to Canada.
