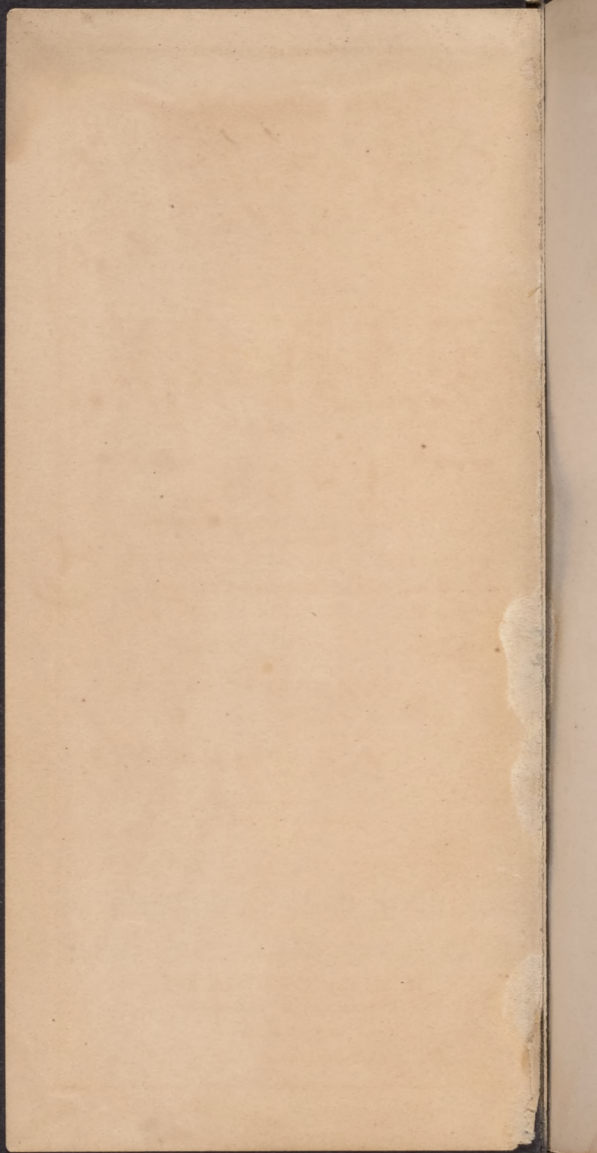


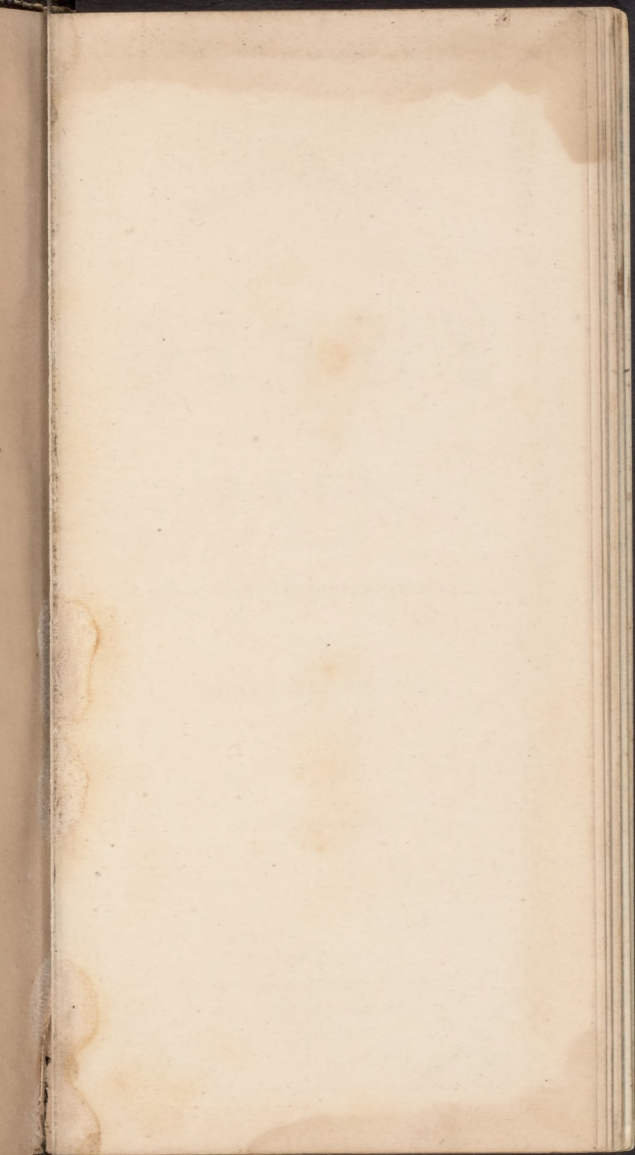

Dates *italicized* apply only to 1868.

EPIPHANY is twelve days after Christmas, January 6th.  
SHROVE SUNDAY, the first Sunday before Shrove Tuesday. — *February 23d.*

SHROVE TUESDAY is the first Tuesday after the first change of the moon in February. — *February 25th.*

ASH WEDNESDAY, the day after Shrove Tuesday. — *February 26th.*

The Fast of LENT is from Ash Wednesday to the feast of Easter, forty days.

The FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT is *March 1st.*

MIDLENT is the fourth Sunday from Shrove Tuesday. — *March 22d.*

CARLE SUNDAY, the fifth Sunday from Shrove Tuesday. — *March 29th.*

ST. PATRICK. — March 17th.

PALM SUNDAY, the 6th Sunday from Shrove Tuesday. — *April 5th.*

PASSION WEEK, the week after Palm Sunday. — *April 5th to April 12th.*

GOOD FRIDAY, the Friday in Passion Week. — *April 10th.*

EASTER DAY, the festival appointed in commemoration of Christ's Resurrection, is the seventh Sunday after Shrove Tuesday, or the first after the full moon, which happens on or after the 21st of March. — *April 12th.*

LOW SUNDAY is the first after Easter. — *April 19th.*

ROGATION SUNDAY is the fifth after Easter. — *May 17th.*

ASCENSION DAY, or HOLY THURSDAY, is the Thursday in Rogation Week, the fortieth day from Easter. — *May 21st.*

PENTECOST, or WHITSUNTIDE, is the forty-ninth day, or seventh Sunday after Easter. — *May 31st.*

TRINITY SUNDAY is the next after Pentecost. — *June 7th.*

ST. JOHN BAPTIST'S DAY. — June 24th.

ST. PETER. — June 29th.

ST. MICHAEL. — September 29th.

ALL SAINTS' DAY. — November 1st.

ADVENT SUNDAY, the nearest Sunday to the feast of St. Andrew. — *November 29th.*

ST. ANDREW. — November 30th.

ST. THOMAS. — December 21st.

CHRISTMAS. — December 25th.

ST. STEPHEN. — December 26th.

ST. JOHN, EVANGELIST. — December 27th.

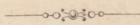



Documents made in any foreign country, to be used in the United States, shall pay the same duty as when made here.

Powers of Attorney, or other papers relating to applications for bounties, arrearages of pay, or pensions, require no stamp; neither do indorsement of negotiable instrument, nor any warrant of attorney accompanying a bond or note when such bond or note shall be stamped; and whenever any bond or note shall be secured by mortgage, but one stamp duty is required, provided the stamp duty placed thereon is the highest rate required for said instrument, or either of them.

The person using or affixing the stamp or stamps, shall write thereupon the initials of his name and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used, so that the same shall not be used again, under a penalty of \$50; or they may be otherwise canceled as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may prescribe.

Violations of these Stamp Duties will be punished as the law directs.

VALUABLE LETTERS may be registered on application at the office of mailing, and the payment of a registration fee not exceeding 20 cents.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS, Periodicals, Pamphlets, Blanks, Proof Sheets, Book Manuscripts, and all mailable printed matter, (except circulars and books,) 2 cents for each and every 4 ounces. Double these rates are charged for Books.

UNSEALED CIRCULARS, (to one address,) not exceeding 3 in number, 2 cents, and in the same proportion for a greater number.

SEEDS, CUTTINGS, ROOTS, &c., 2 cents for each 4 ounces or less quantity.

ALL PACKAGES of Mail Matter not charged with letter postage must be so arranged that the same can be *conveniently* examined by Postmasters; if not, letter postage will be charged.

NO PACKAGE will be forwarded by mail which weighs over 4 pounds.

ALL POSTAGE MATTER, for delivery within the United States, must be PREPAID by stamps, except duly certified letters of soldiers and sailors.

WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS, (one copy only,) sent to actual Subscribers within the County where printed and published, *free*.

LETTERS TO CANADA and other British North American Provinces, 10 cents for each 1-2 ounce. Prepayment optional.

LETTERS TO GREAT BRITAIN OR IRELAND, 24 cents, for each 1-2 ounce. Prepayment optional.

LETTERS TO FRANCE, 15 cents for each 1-4 ounce. Prepayment optional.

LETTERS TO OTHER FOREIGN COUNTRIES vary in rate according to the route by which they are sent, and the proper information can be obtained of any Postmaster in the United States.

## THE SOLAR SYSTEM.



The Sun, the centre of the Solar System, has a diameter of 885,680 miles, and its bulk is 1,400,000 times greater than that of the Earth, and 700 times greater than that of all the bodies revolving around it.

The Moon's diameter is 2,160 miles, and her volume one forty-ninth of that of the Earth. She revolves in her orbit once in 29½ days, at a distance of 240,000 miles from the Earth.

The Asteroids number 79, of which 2 were discovered in 1863. Leverrier estimates that their aggregate mass does not exceed one-third of that of the Earth.

**VELOCITY OF THE EARTH'S MOTION.**—The Earth moves forward in its orbit, 1,640,000 miles per day, 68,000 miles per hour, 1,100 miles per minute, and nearly 19 miles every second.

**APPARENT TIME** is reckoned by the revolutions of the Sun from the meridian to the meridian again. These intervals being unequal, of course the apparent solar days are unequal to each other.

**MEAN TIME** is time reckoned by the *average* length of all the solar days throughout the year. This is the period which constitutes the civil day of 24 hours.

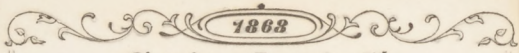

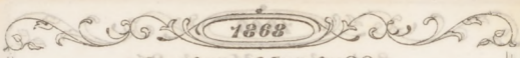

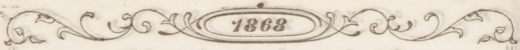
