We recommend Fall planting of all hardy trees,
shrubs and plants.

As a rule Fall is much the best time for planting hardy trees, vines and shrubs and we can and do ship them all through October and November. We recommend, however, that they be left standing in the nursery up to October 15th to ripen and harden. When planted in the Fall, the cut ends of the roots callos by Spring; the winter's rains and snows settle the soil closely around the roots; and the tree is ready to start to grow early and vigorously; thus making a much larger growth the first year than if planted in the Spring. Do not trim the tops of the trees in the Fall, but early in the Spring. It is also well to bank the soil high around the trees and plants as a protection to the roots and to prevent too much swaying in the wind. This applies to all stock offered herein except strawberries, black raspberries, dewberries and perhaps peaches. These do not do as uniformly well, planted in Fall, as other stock.

PERENNIALS by all means should be planted in the Fall as they start to grow in the Spring as soon as the thawing of the ground permits the young shoots to come through. These wonderful, if old fashioned, plants should be in everyone's garden. They give the most for the least care of anything you can plant. They come up each Spring to surprise and please you with their beautiful foliage and wonderful flowers. We have an extra fine lot of plants this Fall, especially Peonies, Phlox and Iris.

SUBSTITUTING—In case we are out of a variety or size called for, we reserve the right to substitute another similar variety of equal merit, or another size or grade of an equal value, unless the words "No Substituting" are written on the order, in which case we fill the order as far as we can and return the balance of the money.

CLUB ORDERS—Parties requiring but few vines and plants are invited to take advantage of our offer to send \$20.00 worth, freight paid, by clubbing with, or taking orders of their neighbors.

FREIGHT PREPAID—Orders of \$20 or over, with remittance for full amount, will be sent freight paid to any shipping point in the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, New Jersey, Delaware and all New England States. Also to the following distributing points: Wheeling, W. Va.; Louisville, Ky.; St. Louis, Mo.; Chicago, Ill.; Richmond, Va.; and Baltimore, Md.

EXPRESS CHARGES we do not prepay.

OUR SHIPPING SEASON extends from October 15th to May 15th. From December 1st to March 15th by mail and express only, as that is carried in warmed cars.

CLAIMS OF ANY KIND must be made within five days after receipt of goods. Those made after a lapse of ten days will not be entertained.

OUR GUARANTEE—We warrant all our stock to be true to name and of quality represented to this extent, that should any prove otherwise we hereby agree, upon proper proof, to refund the money received for the same, or else replace with others that are true. OUR TERMS are cash with order. By holding to this rule we have no bad debts or collection expenses and therefore can sell at lower prices.

Remit by postal or express order, bank draft or registered letter at our risk. Money loose in ordinary letters is at the risk of sender. If desired, \$5.00 worth or more sent C. O. D., provided at least one-quarter of the amount, but not less than \$2.00 accompanies the order. Return charges on money will be added in all cases.

FRUIT TREES BY MAIL—We are often asked to send small lots of fruit trees by mail. We cannot send trees of five feet and over by mail, nor evergreens of any size. But we can send 4 to 5 ft. fruit trees to a distance of not over 500 miles for 8c each postage. Five trees or over, 5c each. 500 to 1000 miles, twice the amount; 1000 to 2000 miles, three times the amount. Two to four foot trees and shrubs, two-thirds the amount.

Grape vines when packed to go by mail will weigh 1 yr. vines, 18 lbs. per 100 ; 2 yr. vines, 25 lbs. per 100.
