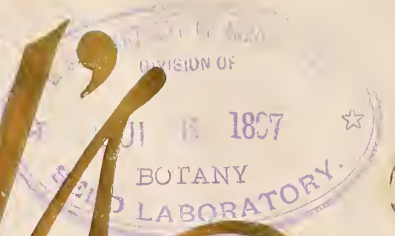

Roger's Lima. The pods are very broad and flat, and a most excellent rich quality. The plant is branching and vigorous, pods are borne in the greatest profusion, often a single plant having fifty or more pods. The pods form in clusters and sink beneath the dense foliage, which shields them from light showers, heavy dews and hot sun, which is a protection against their spotting or rusting. They require thin planting (two beans being sufficient for a hill) on very rich soil, and will run true and not sport. Pkt. 10c., qt. 60c.

Keeney's Rustless Golden Dwarf. This new bean combines hardness and productiveness with fine quality; is a vigorous bush variety with entire freedom from rust. The pods, although flat when young, are meaty and well-filled; of rich, yellow color, fine quality, and entirely stringless, even when large enough to shell. Pkt. 10c., qt. 40c.

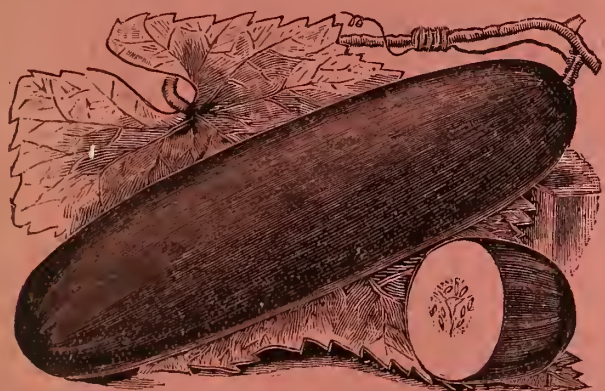

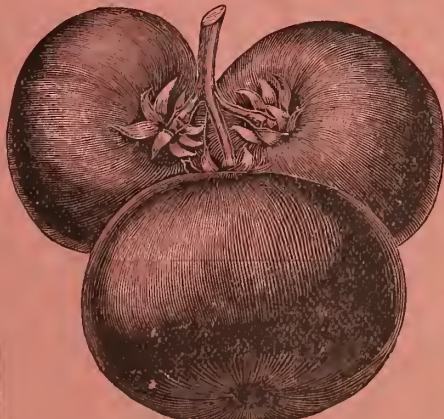

 Awarded a Certificate of Merit of the "Society of German Nurserymen."

This quite new and original class of Asters will be offered now in the above-named colors to the trade. The judgment of first horticulturists, who saw this novelty in September, was that the large assortment of these admired summer flowers got a highly appreciable addition with this new introduction. It was found two years ago amongst the improved Giant Comet Asters, and carefully cultivated since. The Ray-Asters attain a height of about twenty inches, in habit of true candelabrum growth and bearing their large flowers on long, strong stalks. The flowers, measuring four to six inches in diameter, consist of rays of very long, slender quilled florets, which have a charming appearance. This new type of Aster is likely to take the public fancy, being invaluable material for floral designs as well as a first-class acquisition for the flower garden. The committee of the Society of German Nurserymen, having been sent for judgment of this novelty, stated with words of praise in the Certificate of Merit, which was awarded for the Ray-Aster, that it is a very noticeable novelty among all classes of Asters.

FORGET-ME-NOT (*Nyosotis Alpestris*)

614 "Distinction," New Early Flowering. This new variety is different from all the other sorts of Forget-me-not which do not bloom until the second year. Distinction is a seedling of "Alpestris Victoria" and may be sown at any time of the year; if treated properly it will commence flowering about eight to ten weeks after the time the seeds have been sown. The plants are of a stout bushy habit of growth and it blooms like Victoria, having the same large bright azure blue flowers. The plant attains a height of five to seven inches, a diameter of eight to ten inches, and when fully grown is quite globular in shape and perfectly covered with flowers. The great value of Distinction is that if placed in a greenhouse in autumn it will continue flowering all the winter, and will be very useful for cutting; it has also proved to be the very best variety for forcing. Not alone for edgings and masses, but especially for growing in pots as well as for cutting it may safely be pronounced a first-class novelty. 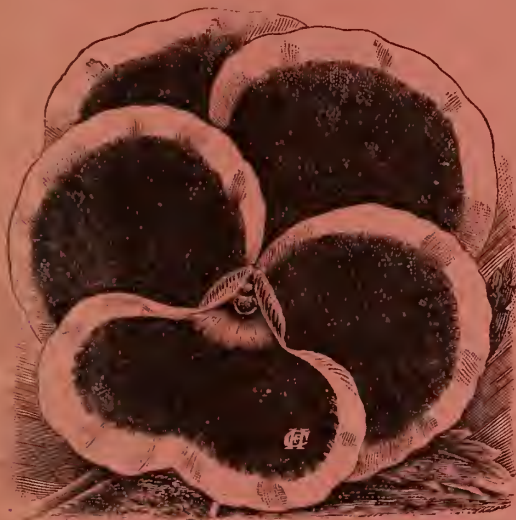

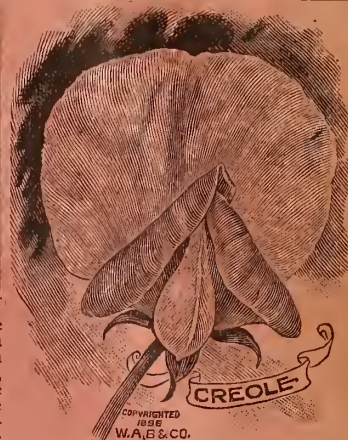
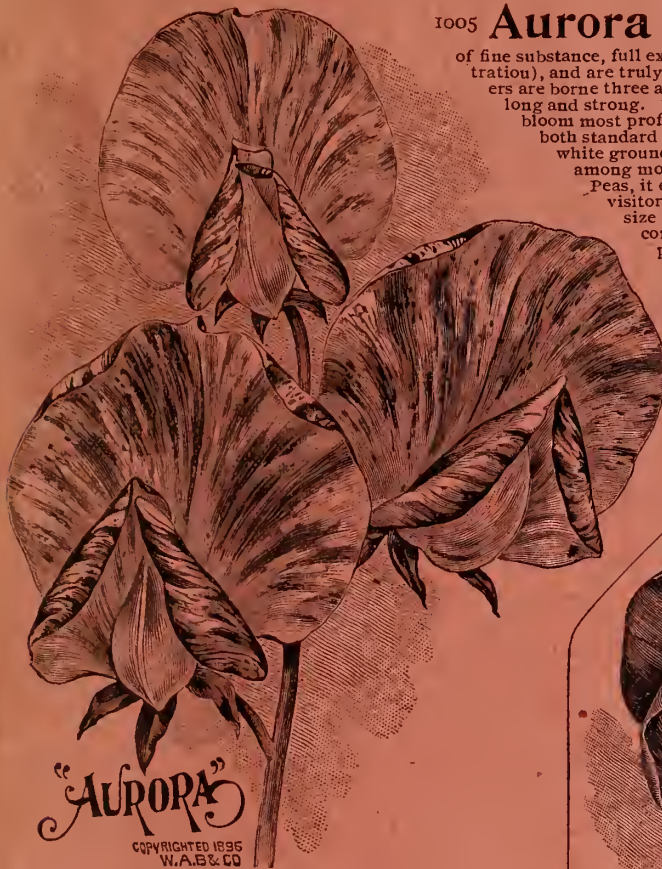


Wall-Flower "Royal Purple."

HOW TO MAKE A LAWN

....

Some previous cultivation, or at least a thorough turning over should be given. A clayey loam is the best foundation for a good lawn. Let the surface be graded to the level wanted in all parts and well rolled—a light raking following this will prepare for the seed sowing, which should be done as early in the spring as the ground can be worked, provided the ground has not already been prepared in the fall. The very best time, the ground being in order, is about April 1st. Three to four bushels per acre should be shown ; the latter amount is best, for the young plants are but small, and if thick, cover the ground better and make a smoother and more even turf. Mowing should be done at least once a week in favorable growing weather, and even in dry weather it should be cut twice a month. Do not allow the clippings to remain on the ground, except they are very short.

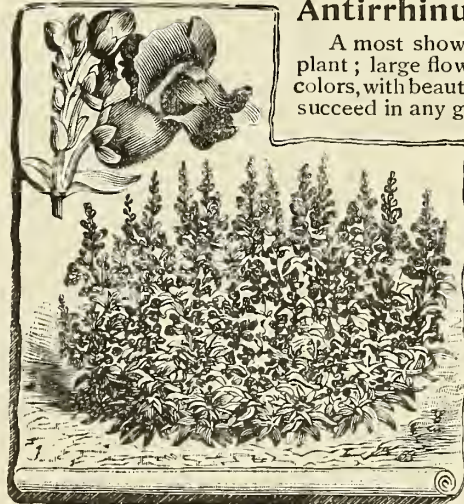

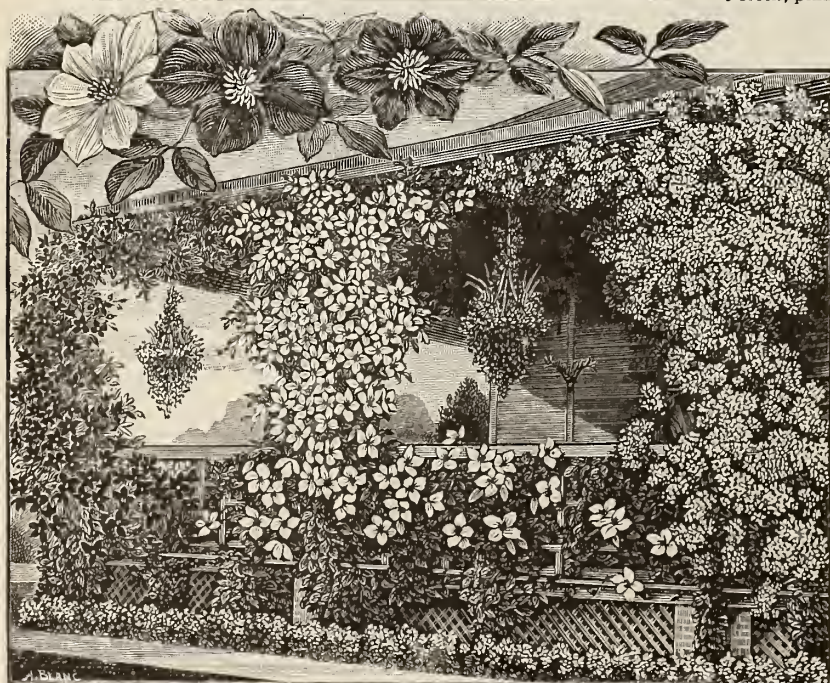

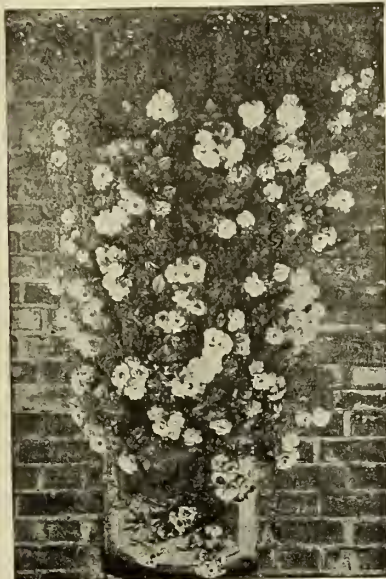


