Repatriation of Austrian Nationals

1. 1. At present there are two former Austrian nationals, Otto Kresta and Joseph Kopetsky, who are classified as objectionable and subject to forcible repatriation. Both have requested exemption from repatriation. After investigation, G-2 has recommended that their requests be favorably considered and they be allowed to remain in Japan. Cases are as follows:

a. Kresta, Otto (Tab: Kresta) was Austrian honorary vice-consul in Japan until 1938. In 1940 he became a member of the Nazi Party. G-2 investigation has disclosed no evidence of political activity, and is of the opinion that Kresta became a member to avoid Nazi political pressure.

b. Kopetsky, Joseph (Tab: Kopetsky) is classified as objectionable, since he was in Germany or German controlled territory after 1 September 1939. Investigation has disclosed that his trip was a normal vacation, starting in May, 1939. When war broke out he made every effort to return to Japan immediately. Subject was not a party member, and there is no evidence of political activity.

2. In view of the facts disclosed by investigation of these former Austrians, G-1 concurs with G-2 in recommending that Kresta and Kopetsky be exempted from repatriation.

3 1. Two requests have been received from United Kingdom Liaison Mission concerning the entry of Mr. Lloyd, British Citizen, for the purpose of supervising the purchase of Japanese oak.

2. a. The first request was on an informal basis to ESS through G-2 Foreign Liaison in order to sound out the general view of this Headquarters as to the entry of some person in that capacity (Tab: First Br Rqst).

b. The second request was submitted as a formal request for the entry of Mr. Lloyd for this purpose and submits the details of Paragraph 7b SCAP Circular 8 on Mr. Lloyd (Tab: Second Br Rqst).

c. The first British request was forwarded to G-1 by ESS C/N No. 2 above. The second British request was received in G-1 without reference to ESS on 5 June.

3. a. ESS states in C/N No. 2 that entry of Mr. Lloyd for this purpose is desirable, but that his travel to Hokkaido as requested by the British is not considered essential in view of the aid that can be extended by Foreign Trade Division, ESS and in view of the restricted facilities for transportation and billeting in Hokkaido.

b. ESS (Mr. Pickelle) states that at present there are no members of a British Trade Mission in Japan. However, parallel action has been taken in a proposed memorandum to UKLM transmitted to the C/S by G-1 C/N 5 June recommending approval of entry of Mr. Thomson of Hong Kong in connection with the purchase of rayon and cotton yarn.

c. Entry of Mr. Lloyd may be authorized under the authority of Paragraph 7 Memorandum for Chiefs of Allied Missions in Japan dated 14 May (Tab: Memo 14 May). The aggregate of these two individuals will not exceed the number authorized under this Paragraph 7. Both Mr. Thomson and Mr. Lloyd should be considered commercial representatives, i.e. members of a Trade Mission of the United Kingdom.

4. G-4 (Col. Hutchison) concurs in last paragraph of memorandum to UKLM providing logistic support during travel in Japan where British support is not practicable.

1. Reference is made to your letter, File 17/412/47, 20 May, in which entry is requested of Mr. Lloyd for the purpose of supervising the purchase of Japanese oak for the United Kingdom.

2. Clearance is granted for the entry of Mr. Stanley Lloyd under the provisions of Paragraph 7 of Memorandum for Chiefs of Allied Missions in Japan, subject: Trade Representatives in Japan dated 14 May 47. Due to the restricted facilities for transportation and billeting in Hokkaido it will not be practicable to permit travel of Mr. Lloyd to Hokkaido in connection with the purchase of Japanese oak. Necessary aid in determining information required from Hokkaido will be extended by the Foreign Trade Division of the Economic and Scientific Section.

3. It is understood from the Mission's note that Mr. Lloyd will be supported logistically from British resources while in Tokyo. Should travel be required on the part of Mr. Lloyd within Japan, where support from British sources is not practicable, logistic support will be provided on a revenue basis from U.S. sources.

of Deceased Brother

1. 1. a. Ourads Z 48557 and Z 48558 of 28 May 47 authorized Jacob Kuang Dunn to travel via ATC on revenue basis from Korea to Tokyo-to the U.S.-to England-to Sweden for the purpose of attending the Olympics Conference to be held at Stockholm, Sweden on 9 June 1947.

b. Jacob Kuang Dunn was a casualty on the Korea-Tokyo flight 29 May. His remains are being held by U. S. Graves Registration Service at Yokohama pending arrival of a brother from Hawaii who will claim the remains and accompany same to Korea. (Info from 8th Army QM - Col Blacklock)

2. General Hodge received a telegram from K. U. Dunn, Honolulu, this morning. The telegram stated in effect that Dunn was being delayed by the State Department and requested issuance of permit which would enable him to depart Honolulu for Tokyo. (Info by telecon from USAPIK - Lt Col Gilchrist)

3. Diplomatic Section (Mr Sebald - Mr Johnson) informs that there is no State Department representative in Hawaii; therefore the true circumstances surrounding the delay in Honolulu are unknown.

4. It is believed desirable to attempt to expedite the clearance for K. U. Dunn to enter Japan to claim remains of his brother for return to Korea.

1. Such nationals of liberated areas, including Koreans, as are employed in foreign national positions by Occupation Forces may continue to be treated, for payroll and subsistence purposes, as "Foreign Nationals".

2. Personnel carried as "Foreign Nationals" must be held to a minimum, limited to individuals whose technical specialty is essential to the achievement of Occupation objectives, to provide services which cannot be supplied by the Japanese Government by established policy.

1. G-2 does not concur in the categorization of Koreans as foreign nationals for the purpose of employment as proposed by G-1 FEC Circular, subj: "Administration of Foreign Nationals", now under study in ESS based on SCAP 61223, 21 May 46, and WARCOS W89799, 31 May 46.

2. While dissenting under this basis in the categorization of Koreans as foreign nationals for the purpose of employment as proposed by G-1, FEC Circular, subj: "Administration of Foreign Nationals", as aforementioned, G-2 feels that an administrative exception to established policies will accomplish the local purpose of securing laborers, therefore, concurs in the proposed 4th indorsement to the Commanding General, Eighth Army.

3. In dissenting, G-2 reiterates the policy adopted by SCAP for the treatment of Koreans.

4. G-2 feels, however, that the instructions contained in par 2 of said indorsement should be strictly adhered to. Attrition and strict compliance with said instructions will speedily cause the number of Korean employees to be reduced to those few whose special and technical qualifications make them indispensable and irreplaceable by Japanese and foreign nationals.

5. Attention is invited to the undesirable character of the localized Koreans, as a high percentage of criminality, compared with other nationals, and notoriously involved in blacket market. See Civil Intelligence Summary No 8, December 1946, page 64.

Basic ltr fr 71st QM Base Depot, subj: Status of Korean Nat'ls, dtd 16 Nov 46, requesting "instr with reference to including Korean nat'ls on Japanese payroll and authority to furnish meals as authorized for foreign nat'ls", to T-KMG Tokyo Det; by 1st ind to T-KMG Dist; by 2nd ind to CG, 8th Army; by 3rd ind to SCAP. C/N #1 fr Dipl Sec to C/S thru Govt Sec and Legal Sec recommending that Koreans employed by occupation authorities continue to be treated as "foreign nat'ls", submitted for comment to Legal Sec, G-2, CPS, G-1 and G-4. All sections concurred with views expressed by Dipl Sec except G-2. Conference called by G-1, 4 Jun 47, for the purpose of (1) passing on a proposed 4th ind to basic ltr fr SCAP to 8th Army, which purported to categorize Koreans as foreign nat'ls for purposes of employment, and (2) to change that part of a proposed FEC Circular on Adminis of Foreign Nat'ls, initiated by G-1, to include Koreans. All conferees, except G-2 representative, agreed (1) to recommend approval of and dispatch by C/S of 4th ind to basic ltr fr 71st QM Depot authorizing continuation of employment of Koreans as foreign nat'ls, and (2) to recommend proposed change in FEC Circular to include Koreans as foreign nat'ls in said Circular. C/N #11 contains the views of G-2 on subject.

 1. Efficient operation of the missionary movement in Japan is being hampered by the inability of heads of the various Protestant Sects and Catholic Orders to travel throughout Japan to supervise the work of their subordinate elements.
 2.
 - a. Many of the Protestant Sects and Catholic Orders have branches or mission groups operating over wide-spread areas in Japan.
 - b. Under current policy, operating missionaries are not authorized to travel on military rail cars except from their port of debarkation to their ultimate destination in Japan when they arrive initially. Travel of representative missionaries is limited to trips in connection with surveys to determine availability of housing for missionaries who are being cleared for entry into Japan.
 - c. There are forty (40) individuals involved in this matter. They represent those Protestant Sects of the Foreign Missions Conference of North America and Catholic Orders having wide-spread activities throughout Japan. They are all occidentals.
 3.
 - a. It becomes necessary periodically for the senior missionaries of Protestant Sects and heads of Catholic Orders to visit their branches throughout Japan. It is physically impossible for the representative missionaries of these large groups to accomplish supervisory trips.
 - b. The majority of the senior missionaries and heads of Orders are elderly people and it entails real physical hardship and suffering when they are forced to travel long distances on crowded Japanese trains.
 - c. It is believed that a slight relaxation to allow periodic travel in military rail cars by the aforementioned individuals to the extent of one such trip per individual every four (4) months would place no strain on the military transportation system and would be too infrequent to cause criticism by the Japanese of the Occupation for assisting missionaries.

3. It was decided that ESS (Finance Division) would study the matter further in conjunction with representatives of U. S. Maritime Commission and 8th Army to determine a practicable method of operation.
4. ESS/Finance (Mr Yeomons) has indicated that the representative of the U. S. Maritime Commission (Mr Gabrielson) will call on him either today or tomorrow with his recommendations as to method of operation. As soon as ESS has integrated the financial arrangements into this recommended method of operation, it will be returned to G-1 for final conference and submission to the Chief of Staff for approval.



1. Background of this case is as follows:

- a. Menko and Kiipus, Russian citizens, were hired in U. S. by U. S. Maritime Commission in 1946, and signed 1-year contracts.
- b. One provision of their contracts requires that they be returned to continental limits of U.S. when the contract expires. The contract of Kiipus expired in February 1947; that of Menko will expire on 11 June 1947.
- c. When under contract to Army Transport Service, subject Russians have status of War Department civilian employees and are subject to SCAP regulations. SCAP policies violated by Menko and Kiipus are:
 - (1) No marriages permitted except with approval of SCAP. Neither Menko nor Kiipus requested permission prior to their marriage.
 - (2) No employees are permitted to remain in Japan upon expiration of contracts unless they have secured a position with the Occupation Forces. Neither Menko nor Kiipus has secured such employment.

 1. A request has been received from Major L. W. Moore that he be separated from the Service in Japan so that he may take a position as an operating missionary for the Presbyterian Church in Japan.
 2. Under current regulations (Paragraph 32, RR Circular 5, 13 April 1947) personnel of Services are not authorized to accept discharge in this theater unless they are to become employees of an agency of the U. S. Government.
 3. It is considered highly undesirable to allow an exception to RR Circular 5 in the case of Major Moore for the following reasons:
 - a. In the eyes of the Japanese this action would inevitably attach the prestige of the Occupation to one particular Christian sect. This would lead to criticism from other sects on grounds of discrimination, and from Japanese religious leaders on grounds of contravention of freedom of religion. In this connection Chaplain McKenzie advises that he denied informally similar requests of several of his Chaplains in the early days of the Occupation.
 - b. It would set a precedent which might allow individuals to exploit their intimate knowledge of the Occupation Forces and personal contacts to gain privileges not authorized under the missionary policy.
 - c. Our radio Z 47562, 19 May 1947 (approved by C/S) denied a similar request in case of Chaplain Watt of Christian Science Church.
 4. It is concluded that Major Moore's request should be denied. Concurrences: CIAE (Lt Col Rugent) and Chief Chaplain (Chaplain McKenzie).
