1. At 260343Z (~~260343Z~~) an unidentified aerial object was observed through a Theodolite by one (1) maintenance man and two (2) weather observers while following an ipibal balloon.

Verbatim statements are as follows:

Weather man one: *XS*

"At 26/0343Z I sighted an unidentified object in the theodolite field of view while following ipibal balloon. The object was very bright silver color and appeared elliptical shaped. It seemed at a great distance from the station. I called the other weather observer to confirm the sighting and together we followed it for five (5) minutes during which time it moved at the same altitude in a south southwest direction at the same speed until the last minute (near end of sighting) when it picked up speed and faded from sight. The sky condition was scattered and the visibility unlimited. There were no stars visible at the time".

Weather man two:

"An unidentified object was encountered (observed) at approximately 26/0345Z. Description as seen: Object was silver blue in color and shape was similiar to a pear. Direction to which object was moving was 162 degrees according to the theodolite".

Maintenance man:

"On 260344Z this airman observed an unidentified object by way of theodolite. (Airman saw object three (3) times and convinced that it was not hysteria). To the best of my descriptive abilities I shall attempt to describe what I saw. It was a very small but very prominent object in the viewing instrument. It was silver in color and twinkled like a star only at a greater frequency (brilliance). It was also definitely moving. The shape was noted to be oblong and flat. I definitely and beyond a shadow of a doubt do not believe it was an aircraft such as I know".

2. "The detachment commander was unable to verify the sightings as the object was lost in the view of the theodolite in a matter of a few minutes".
