# THE POPE SAID TO

DOCTOR SAYS HE MAY LINGER FOR DAYS

There Has Been No Recurrence of the Periods of Delirium-To-Day's Bulletin.

(Associated Press.)

Rome, July 15, -- When Dr. Mazzon entered the Pope's sick room this morning, he found His Holiness in almost the same condition as last night. Pope Leo said: "I feel better than I did yester day." On leaving the Vatican, Dr. Mazzoni, in reply to the question "Is the end imminent?" apswered: "It cannot be called so." "Then is it near?" was asked. To this Dr. Mazzoni replied: "In order not to make a mistake, let us say it is not far distant."

Seemed Panic Stricken.

Rome, July 15.—The official news re-ceived by the Associated Press from the Vatican during the- past twenty-four hours states that in his delirium the Pope has spoke, and especially of pil-grimages, and recited disconnectedly Pope has spoke, and especially of pilgrimages, and recited disconnectedly Latin verses. He often seemed panic stricken, crying to Dr. Lapponi, his valet Centra, and Monsignor Angeli, one of his secretaries: "Where are you? Do you abandon me?" The delirium ceased entirely at 4 o'clock p. m., when His Holiness again revived. Having eaten nothing throughout the day, he was then given four spoonsful of meat broth and masticated some beef without swaillowing it. From midnight up to 5 o'clock lowing it. From midnight up to 5 o'clock this morning the Pontiff was comfortab-ly drowsy.

At 11.50 Dr. Lapponi left the Vatican

to pay another yisit to his daughter, who is suffering from a fever. He said, in reply to inquiries, that the Pope might linger some days longer.

Fatal Termination Imminent.

Paris, July 15.—The foreign office received dispatches from Rome to-day stating that the Pope is sinking fast and that while His Holiness may live a day or two, a fatal termination is imminent.

Over Thousand Cases Reported at Hongkong-Alleged Violations of Russian-Korean Treaty.

A British seaman named Harvey, 24 cars of age, belonging to the torpedo-Loat Virago, was drowned on the 14th Kobe, according to advices received by R. M. S. Empress of India. News comes by the Empress that there has been a disquicting increase in the number of plague cases among the European residents of Hongkong. On the 9th of June, of 26 fresh cases reported, nine were Europeans. Several cases occurred on H. B., M. battleship Ocean, and on the date mentioned five blue-inckets were removed from the ship. Early last month about 79 houses, with 350 inmates, were isolated. It is stated that no dead rats containing plague tacilli thave ever been found in that part of the city. The authorities are, there-

A Seoul dispatch says, "Nothing had seen heard of the Russo-Korean negobeen heard of the Russo-Korean nego-tiations as to Russia's quierprise at Yong-bahoi, although an official note was sent to the Russian minister by the Korean government under the date of May 28th. According to a rumor, an understanding has already been arrived at between Russia and Korea in the matter, the latter granting its secret ap-proval."

According to reliable intelligence received at Scoul from Antung prefecture, the Russians are buying up a vast tract of lifnd stretching from the Chinese frontier down to the banks of the Amnokgang, for the purpose of facilitating the timber cutting business in Korea. A number of soldiers are stationed on the land purchased. The cost is estimated at 25,000,000 roubles (or, according to another report, 5,000,000 roubles). She has not established a firm or an office as required under the contract, and has proceeded to cut down the timber in Palnumassas and other places along the bank of the Amnokgang, trespassing on the forest reserves, and has failed to fulfil the contract to pay to the gevernment a sum corresponding to 25 per cent, of the company's fund."
