





Sir Joseph Ward Makes Important Announcement Regarding Steamships.

Sir Joseph Ward has made an important announcement regarding negotiations between Canada, Australia and New Zealand, with a view to making New Zealand, with a Niew to making Auckland a port of call. Canada was favorable, while a reply was shortly expected from Australia. If such an arrangement could be made it would be very satisfactory, as there was little oubt that in any new contract with ne Union Company it would be pos-ble to arrange for an acclerated sersible to arrange for an acclerated service, reaching London in from thirty
to thirty-one days. He was hopeful of
securing closer connection at Fiji with
the Vancouver steamers, but the cost
appeared excessive. An attempt had
been made to establish again the line
between Auckland and San Francisco,
but there was no subsidy granted by
the American government to steamers

subsidy required would be from \$30,000 subsidy required would be from \$80,000 to £100,000, which was prohibitive. MASTS CARRIED AWAY **BUT NO ONE KILLED**

Vessel Left Here Fortnight Ago With Lumber From Chemainus.

(Times Leased Wire.)

Astoria, Ore. Jan. 17.—The American ship William H. Smith, from Puget Sound for Port Natal, South Africa, with a cargo of lumber, was towed into this port this morning by the oil tank steamer Washtenaw, having been picked up off the mouth of the Columitia river in a distressed condition yesterday. Her mainmast, mizzen and foretop masts had been carried away, and much of her rigging was hanging loose. No one on board was killed or injured during the storm that caused the havec on the Smith, which is one of the oil-timers in the coast sailing fleet. The storm was the same that sent the Czarina upon the bar in Coos Bay, when twenty-four persons lost their lives.

Steamer City of Puebla, of the Pa-Steamer City of Puebla, of the Pa-cific Coast Steamship Company, bound to this port, was the first to see the disabled vessel off the mouth of the Columbia River. She stood by and of-fered aid. This was refused, as the Puebla being a passenger steamer the salvage would have been so much higher than from a tug or freighter. The Puebla then used her wireless apparatus to send for a tug, but in the meantime the Washtenaw came along and took her in for.

SHIPPING TRADE

Demand for Tonnage Gradually Expanding—Not Good Year on North Atlantic.

Dispatches from England say: There are various signs which suggest that better times for the shipping industry lie immediately ahead. The trade of the world appears to to reviving. Big crops have to be moved from one end of the slobe to the other, and new sources of employment are quickly opening out. Hence the demand for tonnage is gradually expanding, and the tendency is in favor, of firmer freights. No doubt restricted building, coupled with natural wastage, has been steadily helping towards a cure, and the supply of shipping—including much that is obsolete, and must in due course be scrapbed—has ceased to be absolutely dispreportionate to the world's needs.

So many important influences are as

the world's needs.

So many important influences are at work that one of a modeat kind is in danger of being overlooked. It is the load-line-legislation of European countries. We set the fashfon in this matter, and for years it was a grievance that foreign ships could come into our ports laden deeper than our own. That is at an end, thanks to a clause in Mr. Lloyd George's Merchant Shipping Act, which came into force in October. Negotiations had been in progress with other maritime countries, with the result that several of them now have load-lines which are accepted as equal to our own. Their enforcement

irise, with the result that several of them now have load-lines which are accepted as equal to our own. Their enforcement means that, in the bulk, considerably more ships will now be needed to carry the same amount of cargo as formerly.

It has been said of the North Atlantic that it is the cockpit of merchant shipping. Of late yedis it has certainly merited that reputation, in view of the prolonged rate wars of which it has been the seene. It has also experienced the severity of the recent depression in a full decree. One of the startling jucidents of the year will be he had been the startling jucidents of the year will be he had been the startling incidents of the year will be not considered the severity of the recent depression in a full dended by the Norddeutscher-Lloyd and Hamburg-American lines, which own the flower of German merchant shipping. The way was to some extent paved for the subsequent announcements that the Cunard Company could make no distribution, and that the earnings of the White Star line. that the earnings of the White Star line had also shrunk enormously. The American financial crisit, with the practical suspension of emigrant traffic which ensuspension of emigrant traffic which ensued, was largely responsible for these results. But it was pretty generally acknowledged, not only that the Atlantic lines had to some extent weakened their resources by the prolonged wars in which they had engaged, but that the pace had been too great. The German companies in particular, perhaps, had extended their fleets of an extraordinarily rapid rate.

A good deal has been made of the fact that, with the return of prosperity to the United States, there has this year, been a A good deal has been made of the fact that, with the return of prosperity to the United States, there has this year been a great growth of enigrant traffic from Europe. But the comparison is with the exceptionally bad figures of 1908, and though the improvement is substantial, it is possible to make too much of it. If report speaks truly, it has not been at all a good year for North Atlastic trade in general. The economics in tootteed into the winter achedules of some of the passenger lines possess no exaggles of importance, but they may at least be noted. The last vestige of misundorstanding, as represented by the rate war in the Mediterranean-New York trade, was removed in the course of the year, but the conjoined effects of harmony and of good times have yet to be seen.



FACTS REGARDING

NICARAGUA STATE

Has But One Railway But **Good Waterway** Facilities.

Here are a few facts about the Re-

There is only four square miles dif ference between the area of Nicaragua and the State of New York, Take Connecticut out of New England and Nicaragua would cover the rest of it. It is approximately half the size of the State of Washington. To be exact, it covers 49,200 square miles, which is larger than Holland, Belgium and Denmark combined. It has a remarkable extent of coast line on two oceans On the Caribbean it reaches nearly 300 miles due north and south; on the Pa-cific it extends 225 miles. Its greatest width is 275 miles, or approximately the distance from Washington to New

York.

It has the smallest population of any respondingly capable of great material development. There are only about 600,000 people within its limits. Of these five-sixths are upon the western or Pacific side. The eastern or Caribor Pacific side. The eastern or Caribbean shore lies low and is drained by many rivers. The only industry of this sections is the growing of bananas, which were shipped in 1898 to the number of 1,500,000 bunches, valued at 50 cents a bunch. The principal town here is Bluefields, a little south of the centre, having 5,000 inhabitants. It is 1,186 miles from Colon. The only other important places on this east coast are Greetown, at the southern point, with 2,000 inhabitants, near the mouth of the San Juan river, which was to have been the course of the isthmian canal if built through Nicaragus, and Cape Gracias a Dios, at the northern point, with only 1,500 people.

On the populated Pacific slope the chief cities are Leon, the historic and linteresting old capital, with 60,000 in-

interesting old capital, with 60,000 in

chief cities are Leon, the historic and interesting old capital, with 16,000 inhabitants; Managua, with 16,000; Grandada, with 16,000 and several towns of from 5,000 to 10,000? The principal port or the Pacific side is Corinto, near the morthern end, with only about 2,000, people. At the southern end is the harbor of San Juan del Sur.

There is one railroad in Nicaragua, which starts at Corinto and runs to Managua and thence across to Grandada, on Lake Nicaragua, which is the largest inland body of water in all Latin-America. If one wishes to go to Nicaragua, he can take steamers on the Atlantic side from New York, New Orleans or Mobile. Going by Pacific he will take steamers from San Francisco or from coast points of other countries. Perhaps the quickest way to reach it to-day is either through Mexico by rail and by steamer from Santa Cruz to Corinto, or by steamer

from New Orleans direct to Blue-fields. The total value of the foreign trade of Nicaragua in 1908 amounted to \$7,500,000, of which exports were \$4.500,000 and imports, \$3,000,000. Nicaragua bought from the United States textiles, elothing, machinery, etc., valued at \$1,300,000. She sold to the United States bananas, coffee, rubber, wasterney, cattle, bides, etc. valued mahogany, cattle, hides, etc., valued at \$1,050,000.

HOW WILSON WON THE VICTORIA CROSS

Gallant Deed to the Record of the Admiral of the Fleet.

Admiral of the Fleet Sir Arthur Knyve Wilson is sixty-seven, and entered the navy in 1855. He has a long crimea, in China, in Egypt, and in th El Teb, when the "Fuzzy-wuzzies" broke into the British square. shattered his sword in meeting the rush, but held his ground magnificent-ity, ighting with his fists, to the ad-miration and wonder of all who wit-nessed his gallant deed, says the Lon-don Daily Mail.

He was promoted reur-admiral in 1895, and thereafter was almost continuously employed affoat in high commands. As second in command of the Reserve fleet in the manocuyres of 1896 he planned with Admiral Seymour the strategy of a very clever assn through the enemy into Lough Swilly. In 1991 he received command of the old home fleet, passing thence to the Channel fleet. With eight battleships he met and defeated a fleet of twelve battleand defeated a fleet of twelve battle-ships in the naval manoeuvres of 1901, working his force almost exactly as Togo handled the Japanese fleet at Tasahmia. He was selected as Admir-alissimo for the chief command of the entire British naval forces in the event of war, after he had given evidence of

of war, after he had given evidence of his consummate skill as a tactician. In 1907 he terminated his service afloat, handing over the Channel Sect-to Lord Charles Beresford, and early in the present year he was appointed to the defence committee.

He is known in the navy as "Tug" Wilson, or "Ard 'Eart," because of a certain sternness and austerity of tem-per. But he is honored and admired per. But he is honored and admired by the whole service for his seal and energy. He is an officer who never talks, like Moltke, he might be de-scribed as the embodiment of silence.
