Nothing But Steady and Increasingly Rapid Improvement on Victoria's **Horizon Now**

British Columbia is at present experiencing the greatest build ing activity since the prosperous days of a decade ago.

This is the summary of condi tions by John Graham, financial journalist of Vancouver. His business is to keep in touch with the buildings trades and to know exactly what is going on.

Construction work estimated at \$27,000,000 is now under way as Winter approaches, he says. A large part of this is being ex pended for fundamental industries, sawmills, pulpmills, grain elevators, docks. Besides there are projects proposed and soon to begin amounting to \$23,000,000. The work is well distributed over the Province from Prince George to Victoria.

All this work is being under taken now because financial people who hold the purse strings know that the reverberations of what has been going on down the Coast are beginning to be sensed in this northern part. They know that the man with confidence to go ahead will soon be in the same comfortable position as the man who got in early on the ground floor in California,

J. D. McNiven, Deputy Minister of Labor for B. C., re-inforces good news which comes in from other sources.

Labor conditions in Victoria and on the Island are better now than they have been since the shipbuilding boom, Mr. McNiven says. In fact, things are so satisfactory that little unemployment is anticipated this Winter. Logging camps and mills are running full time and constantly qxpanding their operations. There is actually a slight shortage of plasterers, masons and good building laborers.

Little barometers in the offices of the transportation companies forecast the trend of business and development. These barometers are the monthly and other reports which go into the company's treasury. These forecasts are all for fair and better.


Most Beautiful City in America, Says Winnipeg Lady Writer

KNOCKING THE LEAGUE

Some of the commentators on international affairs are advancing a number of novel reasons why the League of Nations is not yet able to enforce its decrees to the extent that such an organization must eventually do if it is to fulfill the hope which humanity has for it.

To the suggestion that it will not be able to function on the grand scale, until our neighbor to the South and Russia and Germany are members of the League, a writer in The Empire Review replies with the query as to why the organization "has striven so feebly to draw those potential partners in." He declares without in the least attempting to explain his reasoning that "instead of an apparent partisanship of murder in Greece, it might have wrought to win back the United States or to reconcile the Allies to the return of Russia." Or, "better still," he continues, "it might have given Europe a lead over the issue of the Ruhr."
