Wikipedia, as a free encyclopedia that everyone can edit, inevitably incorporates biases that mirror society’s own; improving Wikipedia means confronting real world inequalities, and vice versa. WikiHBCUDIO is a coalition of Historically Black Colleges and Universities, along with other Departments, Institutions and Organizations representing people of color, leveraging their unique resources to address the under-representation of minorities on and off Wikipedia.

Join us for this first ever WikiHBCUDIO offline event, where technology, academia and activism intersect at Washington National Cathedral. A 30-minute panel kicks off the discussion on **how people of faith can lead the fight for equality in today’s digital world**, followed by two parallel sessions stretching into the afternoon:

Unconference (*just outside Perry Auditorium*): Focusing on WikiHBCUDIO’s role outside Wikipedia, attendees chat and mingle with each of the panelists/guests in an informal setting, generate ideas, and learn about the work of their respective organizations.

Edit-a-thon (*inside Perry Auditorium*): Led by seasoned Wikipedia editors, attendees gather in groups of three to five; each group edit/create a specific page/topic of interest to the Cathedral community.

Coffee and snacks are served. **First-timers welcome, no special skills required!** If you wish to participate in active editing, please bring your own laptop.

WikiHBCUDIO (I didn't coin it!)

- **Wiki = Wikipedia** (and, to a lesser extent, other Wikimedia projects: Commons, Wikidata, etc.)
- **HBCUDIO = HBCU + Historically Black Departments, Institutions, Organizations,** e.g. Union of Black Episcopalians, Congressional Black Caucus
- **Birthplace: WikiCon '18**

Why WikiHBCUDIO?

- Leveraging resources of HBCU/DIOs ...
 - Unique collections: archives, oral history, etc.
 - Formidable institutional presence
- ... to address inequality on/off Wikipedia
 - Wikipedia **mirrors** society's bias, and **projects** its bias back to society —Katherine Maher, WMF Exec. Dir.
 - *People of color* and *organized religion* being two of Wikipedia's "blind spots"
 - Female editors 13%, women's biographies 18%
 - Race/ethnicity not tracked in WMF stats

Why Cathedral? (1/2)

- Fulfilling the Cathedral's **racial justice mission**
 - Educational and eye-opening for congregation
 - Digital: a new frontier to combat racism

Why Cathedral? (2/2)

- Cementing the Cathedral's **leading** role in the discussion of social issues
 - Cathedral as a **crossroads** of secular organizations: *where cross the crowded ways of life, where sound the cries of race and clan (Hymn 609)*
 - A neutral and holy place

1. Welcome Speech

- Delivered by key Cathedral clergy
 - Dean/Provost/Canon Missioner
 - Need not stay until end of event
- Highlights Cathedral's involvement

2. Intro to Wikipedia

- Columbia Univ. Wikimedian-in-Residence
 - Expert in Wikipedia inequality
 - Fluent in Wikipedia editing (edit wars!)
 - Institutional presence (not just another nerd)



3. Panel discussion

- Panelists *on stage leading discussion*
 - Each representing separate discipline: church, Wiki, academia, activism
- Guests *may also answer question*
- People *ask questions*

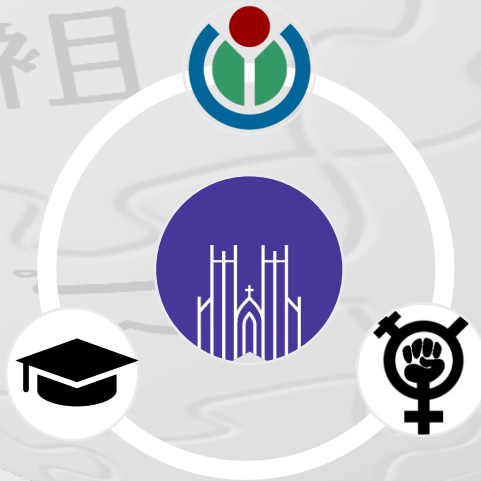

- Cathedral clergy biographies
 - Notability?

 - Wikipedia: separate from WNC main page
 - Commons: HD image of each window
 - Wikidata: artist, date of creation, etc.
- WikiProject Episcopal Church
 - Episcopal theology, notable church buildings
 - Commons: pictures of liturgy in action
 - Wikipedia Church Day?
