UNREST and agitation, chaos and confusion reign supreme in the so-called "liberated" countries of Europe at present. On Sunday, for example, Greek demonstrators held such a violent demonstration in Athens, that the British had to use armoured cars and the armed police of the puppet Greek Government in very large numbers to prevent the situation from getting out of control. In Rome, where the puppet Bonomi Government has collapsed without the Anglo-Americans being able to set up another puppet government, a full dress war is going on between the Italian civilian population on the one side and the Anglo-Americans and their supporters on the other. In Yugoslavia, in France and in Poland, there has been constant war and bloodshed between the so-called "liberators" and the freedom-loving populations.

The truth is that the leading anti-Axis nations are not in the least interested in the freedom or welfare of other nations. On the other hand, their real aim is to dominate and exploit them as much as they can. It is no wonder therefore that the peoples of the so-called "liberated" countries are violently revolting against the Anglo-Americans.

In striking contrast to the chaotic conditions prevailing in countries under anti-Axis occupation is the complete co-operation and unity between the nations of East Asia. That Nippon sincerely practises the policy of promoting the freedom and independence of the nations of East Asia needs no demonstration. In Burma and in the Philippines, in China and all the rest of East Asia, the close unity and co-operation existing between Nippon and the various nations of East Asia is the direct result and the most telling proof of Nippon's noble and sincere war aims.

The Anglo-Americans have not been able to obtain a strong foothold in Burma because the Nippon forces in Burma are not only formidable in themselves, but because they have the full co-operation of the Burmese people and all the peoples of East Asia. The Burmese have realised what freedom means and never will they allow their present freedom to be threatened by Anglo-American encroachment. With Nippon and Burma, all the other nations of East Asia and India also will ensure the security and freedom of all Asia by defeating and destroying the tyrant powers of Britain and America.

Most Impressive Naming Rites At Kallang Airbase

Large Crowd At Airport Sees Christening Of Donated War Planes

A colourful ceremony of a highly impressive nature attended with Shinto religious rituals was witnessed at the Kallang Air Port this morning, the occasion being the christening of the 14 planes of which ten were donated by Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose to the Imperial Nippon Air Force.

The function was largely attended by the representatives of the Army, the Air Force, the Mayor of the Syonan Tokubetsu, the representatives of the Indian Independence League, the representatives of the Azad Hind Fauj, and representatives of the local and Johore Chinese, Malai and Eurasian communities.

Hundreds of school children carrying miniature Hinomarus participated in the ceremony.

The ceremony began with Nippon priests chanting prayers and making offerings to the deities, when the christening was performed.

Following this, the various Nippon and other communal representatives paid their homage to the deities.

Out of the 14 planes four of them which were on the field then took to the air each of them piloted by R. Shirakawa, M. Nuibe, T. Seki and Y. Toya.

The planes went up the air one after the other and flew across the air port several times when the large gathering cheered them lustily with cries of "Banzai."

Dr. M. K. Lukshumeyah, Secretary-General, I.I.L., Rear Headquarters, East Asia, represented the Indian Independence League while the Azad Hind Fauj was represented by H.E. Col. J. K. Bhonsle, Chief of Staff, Col. Loganadan and Lt.-Col. Alagappan.

21 B-29's Shot Down Over Tokyo City

Tokyo, Dec. 4 (Domei)—Twenty-one enemy aircraft, including seven probables, were brought down by Nippon interception units when the Mariana-based enemy airforce raided Tokyo and adjacent areas yesterday, Nov. 3, Dai Honyei announced at 4.30 p.m. This figure includes 15 enemy aircraft shot down as announced yesterday by Dai Honyei.

BRITISH TYRANNY IN INDIA IS DENOUNCED; FREEDOM FIGHTERS ASSURED FULL AID

Federation Of Indian Associations Affirms Full Confidence In Congress

Whole-hearted support for India's struggle for freedom and vehement denunciation of the inhuman British tyranny in India, were the main features of the strongly-worded resolution passed by the first national conference of the Federation of Indian Associations in Britain which held its second session in Coventry yesterday morning.

According to a despatch from Coventry, the resolution affirmed the conference's full support for the policy and programme of the Indian National Congress in its struggle for Indian Independence. The resolution added: "The period of temporary lull which marked the Indian struggle after 1942 had strengthened the determination of the Indian people to rid India of the British Imperialistic rule. In spite of the brutal repressive measures and the regime of terror imposed upon the Indian masses by British Imperialism and in spite of their criminal policy resulting in famine, the spirit of the Indian masses is not broken." Continuing, the resolution stated: "We condemn British Imperialists who are responsible for the economic chaos in India today and for the brutal repressive regime imposed upon the Indian people. We demand an impartial investigation into the atrocities committed by British imperialism and adequate punishment

for those found guilty". Concluding, the resolution expressed the conference's firm belief that the Indian National Congress will relentlessly continue its struggle for the country's freedom, pledged its full support for such struggle, and called upon the people of Britain to abide by the "Quit India" Demand of the Indian National Congress before it is too late.

A second resolution passed unanimously by the Federation of the Indian Associations in Britain voiced their "firm conviction that Indian freedom is an essential pre-requisite for any just, stable and peaceful world order".

According to well-informed circles, the strong wording of these resolutions is in itself a clear indication that the waning power of British imperialism is no longer a secret to those in Britain and other countries except in India where the British have adopted the most rigorous form of censorship and suppression of truth.

Meanwhile, according to another despatch from London, the committee of Indian Congressmen in Britain has issued statements to every member of the committee asking for re-affirmation of his faith in the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi and his full support of the policy of the Indian National Congress in general and the "Quit India" Resolution in particular.

Nippon Air Arm Strikes At Enemy Mawlu Base; Equipments & Other Facilities Completely Destroyed

A Nippon Base in Burma, Dec. 4 (Domei)—Night bombers of the Nippon air force in Burma past midnight on December 3 attacked Mawlu airfield, in Northern Burma.

ducted by enemy planes yesterday, Nov. 3, against Tokyo and adjacent areas, including those announced yesterday, are 21 enemy aircraft, including seven probables shot down. Six of our planes either self-blasted against enemy objectives or have not yet returned to their base.

(This figure includes aircraft which employed bodycrashing tactics).

With the aid of the brilliant moonlight, our bombers dropped bombs on their targets with "pin-point" precision. One large-size aircraft was set ablaze, while many steam rollers and other equipment and facilities, which were stored up in the aerodrome area for the improvement of the airfield, were blasted.

All our bombers returned to their base safely.

It may be recalled that the enemy airfield at Mawlu, 25 kilometres north of Katha, was utilized as a glider-base under the command of Major-General Wingate who led paratroops in a counter-attack against Burma in March this year. At present the enemy day and night is reconstructing the airfield in order to utilize this airstrip as a forward airbase in his aerial sweeps over Northern Burma.

Crushing Blows Dealt On Enemy By Kaoru Troops

Enemy Forces Wiped Out; 6 Torpedo-Boats Sunk, Damaged Off Leyte

A Nippon Base in the Philippines, Dec. 3 (Domei)—Not a single plane was seen both in the north and south enemy airfields at Burauen, Leyte Island, where previously a number of planes had been parked, according to a report made by Nippon scouting planes which made a thorough reconnaissance over that sector yesterday.

This clearly indicates that the enemy at Burauen had been subjected to devastating blows and thrown into confusion by our "Kaoru" Airborne Squad of our Army Special Attack Corps which carried out daring assaults against enemy airfields on Leyte on November 26. The report of our scouting planes further revealed that there were signs indicating that our airborne troops were continuing their death-defying activities against the enemy.

A small enemy unit of about 50 troops who attempted to make a surprise attack on the Nippon positions in the Dagami sector, Leyte, on November 28 was completely wiped out.

Nippon's Leyte-based air units intercepting a flotilla of enemy torpedo-boats and other seacraft in waters surrounding Leyte Island from November 29 to December 2 sank or damaged six torpedo-boats and three other vessels.

Attacking several enemy torpedo-boats in Leyte Gulf on the night of November 29, Nippon airmen accounted for two sunk. On the evening of the following day, detecting five small enemy seacraft in Carigara Bay, Nippon air units assaulted and sank three.

On Saturday morning, our units sighting four enemy torpedo-boats near Poro Island fiercely pounded and bagged two of them, while on the night of the same day, our units sank or damaged two out of several torpedo-boats in Leyte Gulf.

Leyte Invaders Hard Pressed, Foe Admits

Lisbon, Dec. 3 (Domei)—Indicating that the Nipponese are actively carrying the fight to the Americans in the battle for Leyte Island, General Douglas MacArthur's Headquarters reported that Nipponese aircraft yesterday struck heavily at American positions along the Carigara Bay, on the north-west coast of Leyte.

Although blinding rains were said to be holding up American operations, Nipponese troops were reported to be pressing hard their attacks against American positions.

Police Open Fire Upon Greek Demonstrators

Lisbon, Dec. 3 (Domei)—That the British occupation of Greece only has served to accentuate the Greek political discord is reflected in a Reuter's dispatch from Athens which reports that the Greek Government police today opened fire with machine-guns and tommy guns on several thousand anti-Government demonstrators who conducted a march past the Royal Palace in Athens.

The police were said to have poured thousands of rounds into the mass demonstrators, including women and girls. Two lorry loads of dead and wounded were carried off from the scene of the demonstration, and British tanks and troops were called out to assist the police, the dispatch said.

Air Raid Practice Here Tomorrow, 6th December

An air raid practice, starting at 1 p.m. tomorrow, will be held on two days, December 6 and 7, when a plane representing an enemy "Flying Fortress" will fly over Syonan with a red trailer. At night the mock "raider" will display red lights.

The object of the practice is to train the public in orderly shelter-taking during the exercise, which will be announced as "Practice Precautionary," "Practice Alarm Signal," and "Practice All Clear."

During this practice no siren will be used but gongs, the radio, flags and bugles will be employed for giving signals.

Should a real raid occur during the practice period, the usual air raid signals will be preceded by the firing of three guns before the precautionary signal, and if by night, by the firing of three red rocket signals, when the practice will cease automatically.

All Passive Defence Services will be exercised during the practice with special emphasis on correct, orderly shelter-taking by the public under the direction of the A.R.P. service.

Colossal Enemy Loss On Western Front In Nov.

Lisbon, Dec. 3 (Domei)—One thousand five hundred and fifteen Anglo-American tanks and armoured cars were either captured or destroyed and more than 5,200 troops taken prisoner in the fighting on the Western Front during the month of November, the German High Command announced today. The number of Anglo-American dead and wounded is regarded to be far greater than those captured.

The Fuehrer's headquarters said the focal points of fierce fighting in the Aachen area were again north-east of Gellenkirchen and in the forest districts at Huertgen. Inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy, the German troops repulsed mass enemy attacks. On the Lorraine border strong enemy forces north-west of Warndt attempted to break through in the direction of Saarlautern but were stopped before German fortifications. Turning to the Italian front, the Fuehrer's headquarters said that the British attacks east of Faenza collapsed before fierce German fire.

Meanwhile, field dispatches reported that a battle of major importance developed in the Hungarian area as Soviet pressure south of Budapest was particularly strong. In the area west of Fuenfkirchen, a dispatch said, the Soviets employed several rifle formations and one tank corps.

The communique revealed that the German Luftwaffe during the month of November shot down 907 Anglo-American planes including 466 four-engined bombers over Western Europe and Reich territory. It said that German U-boats sank out of a Soviet minesweeper formation in the Gulf of Finland one mine-laying boat, one escort vessel, one minesweeper and a big transport. Another two units of the enemy naval formation received torpedo hits, the communique concluded.

Anti-Axis Concern Over Germany's New Weapon V3

Stockholm, December 3 (Domei)—Considerable anxiety has been caused in the United States as well as Britain by the dispatch filed by the Stockholm correspondent of the "London Daily Express", quoting German Minister of War Production Albert Speer as declaring at a recent war production conference that Germany is preparing a "V-3" with the object to launch an all-out rocket-offensive against New York sometime before the end of this year.

The American press is said to have given widespread prominence to the news, while the danger of the so-called V-3 fully has been recognized by the Britishers, who are now being harassed by Germany's destructive V-1 and V-2 flying-bombs. The new mystery missile is understood to be 50 feet longer than the present V-2, which is 45 feet in length, and to have destructive power several times greater.

Mahatma Gandhi To Observe "Work Fast"

Lisbon, Dec. 3 (Domei)—Mahatma Gandhi today announced that he has temporarily abandoned his intention of fasting and instead will observe a "work fast" from tomorrow to Dec. 31, according to a Reuter's message from Bombay.

Grave Political Crisis In "Liberated" Italy

Lisbon, Dec. 3 (Domei)—The political crisis in anti-Axis-occupied Italy, resulting from the resignation of Premier Orese Bonomi eight days ago, was further heightened today when Communist and Monarchist groups clashed in the streets of Rome, according to a Reuter's dispatch from Italy.

The rioting is said to have broken out when Communist elements challenged Monarchists emerging from their first major political meeting held in Rome. Mounted Carabinieri were called out to quell the street-fighting after the police had failed to disperse those engaged in the fight, the Reuter's dispatch said.

Imperial Nipponese Forces Occupy Pasai

A Nippon Base at the Kwangsi Front, December 4 (Domei)—Close on the heels of the reduction of Sanho in Kweichow Province, our hard-driving mobile units by 4.00 p.m. on December 2 occupied Pasai, 30 kilometres east of Tuyun.

Meanwhile, part of the enemy 27th Group Army are now being subjected to crushing blows at the hands of other Nippon units in the vicinity of Lipo, 50 kilometers south-east of Tushan.
