1. The Chinese Mission obtained the approval of General Headquarters in August 1946 for the establishment of a branch office in Nagasaki for the performance of limited consular functions. Copy of a letter from the Diplomatic Section dtd 9 Aug 46 is attached hereto.

2. The former Chinese Consulate at Nagasaki was damaged beyond repair during the war. The military authorities there have orally expressed the opinion that the damaged building might have to be torn down for reasons of public safety.

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Chinese Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's memoranda of September 25, 1946, and January 3, 1947, regarding repair of the office quarters of the Osaka Branch of the Mission and the question of dependant housing for personnel of the Osaka Branch. There is no objection to maintenance by the Mission of a staff of fifteen members in Osaka. The Commanding General of the United States Eighth Army has been instructed to provide facilities for this personnel as the need arises and to rehabilitate the office quarters to accommodate a staff of fifteen persons.

With reference to the question of dependant housing, the Mission is informed that, in accordance with Memorandum to Chiefs of Missions, AG-620 (14 Jan 47)GA, 14 January 1947, subject: "Housing of Dependents", dependant housing cannot be allocated to the Osaka Branch of the Mission until requests for such housing are submitted to General Headquarters in conformity with the memorandum of January 14 and are approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in each case.

It is noted that the seven enclosures to the Mission's memorandum of January 3, 1947, signed by Mr. Matthew T. H. Liu, Chief of the Osaka Branch, are addressed to the Osaka Liaison Office of the Japanese Government, although the originals appear to have been forwarded through the Osaka Military Government Team. In this connection, the Mission's attention is invited to Memorandum for Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, AG 334 (9 Jun 46)GB, June 9, 1946, subject: "Official Relations and Contacts with the Imperial Japanese Government, with Staff Sections of GHQ, and with U.S. Occupation Forces", which informed Missions of the channels through which they are permitted to conduct business with General Headquarters and the Japanese Government. This matter was also brought to the Mission's attention in Memorandum for the Chief of the Chinese Mission in Japan, AG 130 (1 Oct 46)CPC/FP, 1 October 1946, subject: "Request for Transfer of Puppet Manchurian Consulate Funds to Chinese Mission, Tokyo". It is suggested that the Mission may desire to call to the attention of its Osaka Branch, the need for conformity with these memoranda.

1. Reference is made to the following:

a. 3rd Indorsement, General Headquarters, United States Army Forces, Pacific, dated 18 September 1946, to letter, Headquarters 25th Infantry Division, file AG 014.12 (23 Aug 46)GD, subject: "Status of Chinese Consular Affairs Officials in Osaka," dated 23 August 1946.

2. a. It is noted that the present strength of the Chinese Mission Branch in Osaka is as follows:

- (1) Mr. Lin Tsing-hua, with wife and three children.
- (2) Mr. Tai Kwang-ming, with no dependents.
- (3) Mr. Tai Kuo-Huei, with wife.

b. As indicated in reference 1 c, the Chinese Mission has submitted a table of organization for a staff of fifteen persons. No information has

been received as to when the expected strength will be attained, although such strength will probably not be reached for several months.

c. As indicated in reference 1 c, it is noted that the Chief of the Osaka Branch of the Chinese Mission has communicated through the Osaka Military Government Team direct with the Japanese Liaison Office in Osaka regarding the allocation of seven dependent houses, in violation of Memorandum for Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, file AG 334 (9 Jun 46)GD, subject: "Official Relations and Contacts with Imperial Japanese Government with, Staff Sections of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and with United States Occupation Forces," which informed foreign missions of the proper channels through which they should conduct official business.

3. a. There is no objection to establishment by the Chinese of a branch office of fifteen members in Osaka. Facilities for this personnel should be provided as the need therefor arises in accordance with reference 1 e. Rehabilitation of the Chinese Consular Affairs Office as requested in reference 1 b will be limited to meet the above requirements.

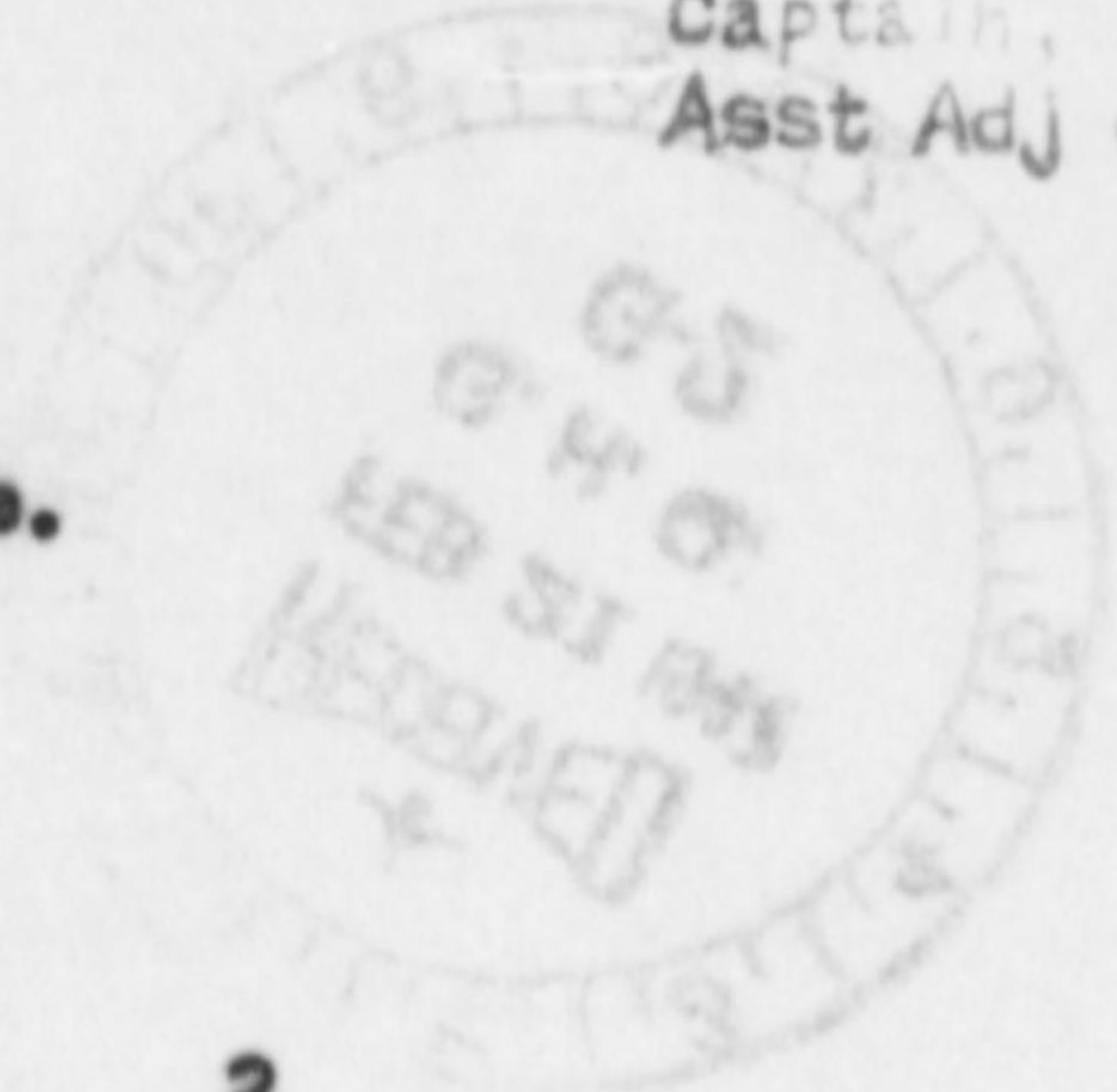
b. The Chinese Mission is being informed that dependent housing can be requested at present only for those members of the staff actually present in Osaka, in accordance with reference 1 f. No action should be taken with regard to the allocation of dependent housing requested in reference 1 c, until requests submitted in accordance with reference 1 f are approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in each case.

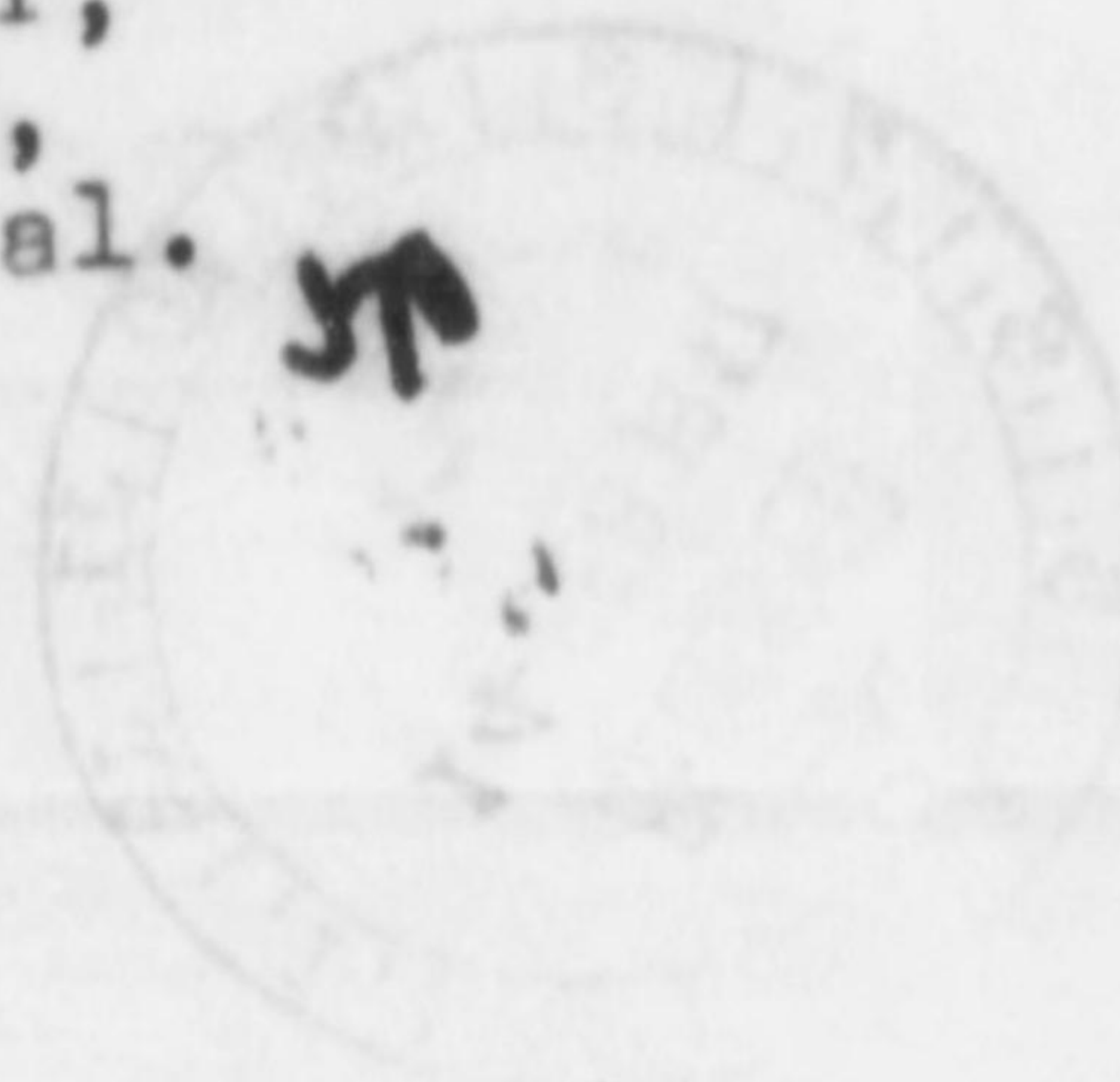

SUBJECT : Downtown Office Space

1. Reference is made to:
 - a. Letter, Chinese Mission in Japan, 093/YWS, 29 August 1946, subject "Housing Facilities for Consular Affairs Office."
 - b. Conference, General Chu - Colonel Eastwood, 1500 hours, 11 September 1946.
2. Confirming agreements reached at the conference referred to in paragraph 1b above concerning downtown office space for the Chinese Mission, offices number 210, 212, 214, and 234 on the fourth floor of the Mitsui Main Bank Building are hereby allocated to the Chinese Mission. This allocation, amounting to approximately 1900 square feet of office space, is made in lieu of the present office space occupied by the Chinese Mission in the NYK Building. The allocation of office space in the NYK Building to the Chinese Mission is hereby withdrawn.
3. It is anticipated that additional office space, adjacent to that assigned to the Chinese Mission in the Mitsui Main Bank Building, will be available in the near future. Should a requirement for additional downtown office space for the Chinese Mission exist at that time, such space will be allocated upon availability.

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief, Chinese Mission in Japan

SUBJECT: Assignment of Residence.

1. Reference is made to Memorandum, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, AG 601 (15 Jan 47)GD, 15 January 1947, subject: "Assignment of Residences."

2. Due to serious illness of members of the Kakiuchi family residing at 56 Honmura-cho, Azabu-ku, their evacuation at this time would result in undue hardship. In view of the foregoing it is considered advisable to revoke the requisition of this residence and withdraw its allocation to the Chinese Mission in Japan as accomplished by reference 1 above.

3. The residence of Naosaki Hoshiro, 35 Honmura-cho, Azabu-ku has been requisitioned from the Imperial Japanese Government in place of the above named residence and is allocated to the Chinese Mission in Japan for use as dependent housing.

4. The Hoshiro residence will be evacuated on 24 February 1947, and will be ready for occupancy as soon thereafter as the necessary rehabilitation and renovation can be accomplished. It is requested that a representative of the Chinese Mission communicate directly with the appropriate representative of the Headquarters Commandant, General Headquarters, Far East Command, to arrange for details of rehabilitation and date of occupancy.

1. The Chinese Mission plan to have a total staff of fifteen (15) in Osaka, however, at present there are only four (4) persons assigned to Osaka. A request has been received for dependent housing for fifteen (15) members. 1
2. DS has no objection to a maximum staff of fifteen (15) persons for the Osaka branch, but recommends that requisition for dependent housing for Chinese should be made only on the same basis as for any Allied official. Accordingly, it may be desirable to inform the Chinese Mission that dependent housing can be requested at present only for those members of the staff actually present in Osaka and that future requirements will be considered upon application by members of the staff after their arrival in Osaka and after they qualify under the uniform priority rule.
3. G-4 recommends that only the requests of the staff presently in Osaka be approved and future requirements be considered under the uniform priority rule.
4. Request approval of letter to CG, 8th Army (Tab A) by approval and signature of Check Note No. 4 (Tab B).

2. 1. It is noted that the originals of the 7 inclosures to attached letter from Chinese Mission, although forwarded through the Osaka Military Government Team, are addressed by the Chief of the Osaka Branch of the Chinese Mission directly to the Japanese Liaison Office in Osaka. In this connection, reference is made to letter of GHQ, SCAP to CG 8th Army, AG 123.7 (21 Aug 46) CPC/FP, basic: letter from HQ I Corps to CG 8th Army, file AG 130-BA, subject: "Request for Transfer of Funds of Chinese Mission in Japan", dated 21 Aug 46. This letter called attention to Memorandum for Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, File AG 334 (9 Jun 46), GB, 9 June 46, subject: "Official Relations and Contacts with the Imperial Japanese Government, with Staff Sections of GHQ, and with U.S. Occupation Forces", which informed foreign missions of the proper channels through which they should conduct official business. Likewise, a letter to the Chief of the Chinese Mission in Japan, AG 130 (date unknown, but presumably end of August or September 46) CPC/FP, subject: "Request for Transfer of Puppet Manchurian Consulate Funds to Chinese Mission Tokyo" requested that the Mission's representative in Osaka and all other members of the Chinese Mission in Japan be instructed that they have no authority to conduct official business directly with any representative of the Imperial Japanese Government.

2. On the basis of paragraph 1 above, it may be desirable again to call the attention of the Chinese Mission to the Memorandum for Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, dated 9 June 46.

3. Recent information from the Chinese Mission that it plans to have a total staff of 15 in Osaka is not in accord with information supplied by G-2 in note 1 above indicating a total staff of 4. This section has no objection to a maximum staff of 15 persons for the Osaka Branch of the Chinese Mission. In this connection, reference is made to check note 3, DS to G-4, in sequence to check note 1, G-2 to G-4 through DS, 26 Sept 46, subject: "Repair of Chinese Consulate Building in Osaka", to which is attached documentation supporting the Chinese case for a maximum staff of 15 persons for the Mission's Osaka office.

4. Requisition of dependent housing for the Chinese should presumably be made only on the same basis as for any Allied official. Accordingly, it may be desirable to inform the Chinese Mission that dependent housing can be requested at present only for those members of the staff actually present in Osaka and that future requirements will be considered upon application by members of the staff after their arrival in Osaka and after they qualify under the uniform priority rule.

2. a. It is noted that the present strength of the Chinese Mission Branch in Osaka is as follows:

- (2) Mr. Tai Kwang-ming, with no dependents.
- (3) Mr. Tai Kuo-Luei, with wife.

b. As indicated in reference 1 c, the Chinese Mission has

submitted a table of organization for a staff of fifteen persons. No information has been received as to when the expected strength will be attained, although such strength will probably not be reached for several months.

e. As indicated in reference 1 c, it is noted that the Chief of the Osaka Branch of the Chinese Mission has communicated through the Osaka Military Government Team direct with the Japanese Liaison Office in Osaka regarding the allocation of seven dependent houses, in violation of Memorandum for Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, File AG 334 (9 Jun 46)GD, subject: "Official Relations and Contacts with Imperial Japanese Government with, Staff Sections of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and with United States Occupation Forces," which informed foreign missions of the proper channels through which they should conduct official business.

3. a. There is no objection to establishment by the Chinese of a branch office of fifteen members in Osaka. Facilities for this personnel should be provided as the need therefor arises in accordance with reference 1 e. Rehabilitation of the Chinese Consular Affairs Office as requested in reference 1 b will be limited to meet the above requirements.

b. The Chinese Mission is being informed that dependent housing can be requested at present only for those members of the staff actually present in Osaka, in accordance with reference 1 f. No action should be taken with regard to the allocation of dependent housing requested in reference 1 c, until requests submitted in accordance, with reference 1 f are approved by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in each case.

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Chinese Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's note No. 0186/ST of December 2, 1946, concerning the requisitioning of 559 tsubo of land at 80 Yamashita-cho, Yokohama, belonging to a Chinese national, Mrs. Wen Wang Shu-nien.

Headquarters, United States Eighth Army, has reported that 124,600 square feet of land area, which includes 80 Yamashita-cho, was allocated to the Headquarters Commandant, Headquarters, Eighth Army, on a Procurement Demand of July 20, 1946, and that bachelor officers' quarters are presently under construction on this property.

The provision of adequate troop housing for the Occupation Forces is considered a military necessity, and the requisition of the property in question is therefore in conformity with the policy set forth in Circular No. 9, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated September 18, 1946, subject, "Requisition of Real Property in Japan Owned or Occupied by Allied, Neutral and Enemy Nationals; Private Rental or Lease Facilities".

In regard to the question of compensation for Mrs. Wen, the matter at this time rests between the individual concerned and the Japanese Government.

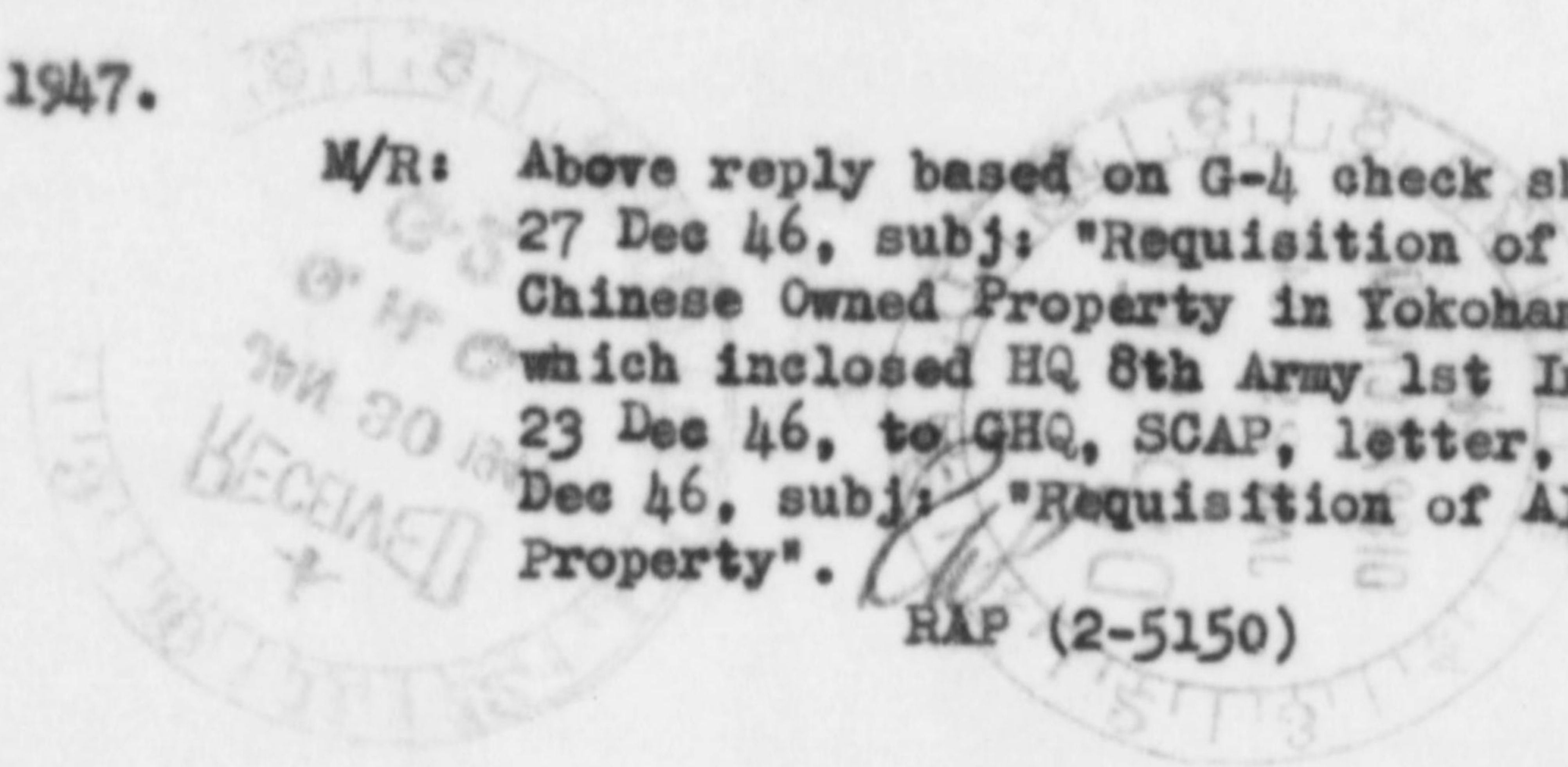
