THE TREATY OF INDEMNITY. - Those who were disposed to cry havoe, and let sho the dogs of war against France wild soon receive their quietus. No reasonable doubt can any longer be entertained as to the passage of the law of in demnity by the French chambers. On the 6th of February the report of the congress senate reached Paris; and this conjuined with the debates on the Russian claims, had a very avericious effect in deciding the wavering or doubtful in Lafayette. furt of the chambers in favor of our claims.

Memoria's have been presented to the chambers from Lyons, Marseilles and other manufacturing and commercial cities of France, to have the law of indemnity passed;only one member of the committee that had been appointed to investigate the documents on the subject is averse to the law; and Messre Wells & Co, American bankers at Paris, write that 'the indemnity bill will probably pass the combers in the month of February, by a majority o about 50 votes."

On Friday last we gave a brief detail of the last revenue law, imposing taxes for the charitable institutions of the city; and to subserve public education throughent the state. In doing so, we merely hinted our own disapprobation of the measure, by considering the impost on travellers an imposition; but as most of the members of both houses of the legislature had concurred in the opinion to their judgment-particularly when enforced by the financial abilities of the state treasurer, by whom the chief items of the bill were recommended and drafted. Indeed in the senate, there was only one member opposed the biil-Mr Johnson, from Feliciana; in East Feliciana on the Mississippi, that manifest injustice Presented a protest.

We did consider the measure of proposing an imposi on travellers as one inexpedient, and likely to prove odious or oppressive in operation; and believe that it is an incipient act of nonintercouse-which certainly should not be tolerated. The same freedom of travel and trade should exist between all states of the union-agreeably to the federal constitution; and if Louisiana commences a system of invidious impost against the citizens of other them. eta:es, these may feel disposed to retaliate: so that the imposts may become so enormous as to be tantamount to penintercourse, and eventually entaity or discord. This was clearly exemplified in the case of New York, where a similar impost was formerly legalized; but experience soon demanded its repeal. Of this our legislature should have been aware before they passed the law; and also pensed with; and the bill was passed. that such an impost ought never be introduced where the freedom of republican institutions should invariably prewail. Yet this measure is subversive of that freedom; and seems to have been suggested by the arbitrary profeedings of the monarchies of the old world, rather than the liberties of o r republic.

The difficulties of collecting the impost will absorb most of its revenue; and will alone demand its repeal-But why even citizens of this state should be included in the impost, is singular; considering that some of them may require to goor send almost every month to Natchez, Mobile or other places out of the state in pursuance of their busines; and will therefore be subject to a tax of at least I dollar a month. Is this justice!

Again the tax is imposed only on passengers arriving a the port of New Orleans, without considering that travelers arrive also by railroads or canals. This is therefore an invidious exemption. Nor is the impost improved in its tenor, by requiring travelers to support the primary schools of New Orleans-which must be considered a singular exaction to all disinterested.

But we willingly yield our opinions to those of the legislature; feeling confident that half a year's experience will demand the repeal of the law at the next session of 1836-particularly when it may be found that assuming a lien on ships and steamboats and giving maritime jurisdiction to the courts of New Orleans are not consistent with constitutional law. The legislature cannot give those rourts a privilege of which they are deprived by the constitution; nor can it deprive citizens of other states, of rights and immunities guaranteed to them by the federal constitution. All owners of vessels may therefore join on this issue, which will virtually annul the operation of the law. and may probably involve the state in debt in endeavoring legally to recover what is not constitutionally recoverable,


