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## PREFACE.

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The eighth volume of the Naumkeag Directory, is a complete directory of the cities of Salem and Beverly, and the towns of Danvers, Marblehead, Peabody, Hamilton, Wenham, Middleton and Topsfield, nine places in all.

It contains over thirteen hundred pages, is the largest book of the kind ever issued for this district, and excels nearly all similar publications in accuracy and completeness of detail.

A careful examination of its various departments will give some idea of the labor involved in its production, but will not fully impress one with the great amount of care and detail essential thereto. The index to contents on pages 20 and 21 shows to some extent the diversified information contained herein.

Notwithstanding the depression in business circles, the patrons of the Naumkeag have increased in number, and have shown by their generous support, that the effort of the publisher to furnish a directory second to no other in the Commonwealth, is highly valued.

An examination of the census table on page 151, shows that the population of Salem and adjoining places, has materially increased during the ten years ending in 1895, Salem having gained 6383, Beverly 2620, Danvers 1120, Marblehead 154, and Peabody 977, or a total gain of 11,254 for the five places. The total population of the same places in 1895 was 72,638, and the same ratio of increase in the next as during the past ten years, will give a population in 1905 of 85,000, and in ten years later (1915) of 100,000 people. Although other places in the Commonwealth may have increased more rapidly this community is certainly to be congratulated upon its substantial growth during the past decade, and its adaptability for manufacturing and residential purposes, its well graded and lighted streets and good water supplies, ought to prove beneficial in promoting the growth expected.

Nearly all the old features of the directory have been retained in the present edition, and many new ones will be found. The historical events which formerly appeared in the front of the book have been separated, and the events of each place located with the city or town to which the same relates.

With this edition a Salem Directory and a Suburban Directory have been issued, the price being \$2 each or \$4 for both, while the price of the Naumkeag Directory which combines both the others in one volume has been increased from \$2 to \$3.

SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE.—The rate is the same as for printed matter, but the lowest charge is two cents. Limit of weight 8½ oz., except to Great Britain, France, Belgium, Ireland, Switzerland, Italy, Egypt, Austria-Hungary, Hawaii, and the Argentine Republic, to which countries the limit of weight is 12 oz.

## HISTORICAL AND INTERESTING EVENTS.

### SALEM.

1626 TO 1897.

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1626.  
Salem, then called Naumkeag, first settled by Roger Conant. John Woodbury, John Balch, Peter Palfrey, and others.
1628.  
Sept. 8. Arrival of Capt. John Endicott with a company of about one hundred.
1629.  
It was the rule of every inhabitant of the plantation to cease from labor at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, and make preparations for the Sabbath.  
Darby Fort erected at Naugus Head.  
April 30. Captain Endicott appointed Governor of the Plantation.  
June 29. Arrival of Rev. Francis Higginson, Rev. Samuel Skelton and a company of about three hundred and eighty.  
August 6. A church is established, the first organized Congregational Church in the country.
1630.  
June 12. Arrival of Gov. John Winthrop with the charter.  
August. Lady Arabella Johnson, a daughter of the Earl of Lincoln, died here.  
August 6. Rev. Mr. Higginson died, aged 43.
1631.  
Roger Williams came to Salem from Boston.  
August. Indian alarm.
1634.  
The congregation having worshipped from 1629 in an unfinished building of one story, agreed with Mr. Norton to build a suitable meeting house, not to cost more than £100.  
August 2. Rev. Mr. Skelton died.  
Oct. 20. Six Salem people in a canoe upset near Kettle Island and five drowned.  
12th month. "Its agreed that the townes neck of land shalbe preserved to feed the cattle on the Lords dayes and therefore particular men shall not feed their goates there at other tymes, but bring them to the (hill?) that grasse may grow against the Lords dayes."
1635.  
The township of Salem at this time included Salem, Beverly, Danvers, Manchester, Marblehead, Middleton, Peabody, and a part of Topsfield, Wenham and Lynn.  
Oct. 6. Arrival of Hugh Peters.
1636.  
First meeting house erected.  
June. Assembling of the first Quarterly Court.  
July 9. Visit of Sir Henry Vane, the new governor of the colony.  
Dec. 26. Ferry to Beverly from the Neck.
1637.  
June 1. Severe earthquake.  
Sept. 25. Ferry to Naugus Head from Turner's lane; abandoned about 1785.
1638.  
Glass works were erected off Boston st. previous to this year; probably the first in New England.
1639.  
First record of tanning business. Philemon Dickinson is granted land "to make tan-pits and to dress goatskins and hides."  
21st of 11th mo. "Granted to Roger Conant, the son of Roger Conant, being the first borne child in Salem, the som of 20 acres.
1641.  
First free school in Salem.
1643.  
May 10. Wenham set off and incorporated.
1644.  
25th of 1st mo. "It is ordered that every inhabitant in the towne shall procure a ladder for his house, before the xxiiiijth day of the 4th moneth next, upon the paine or penaltie of five shillings for defect heerof."  
7th of 5th mo. "Ordered that twoe be appointed every Lord's day to walk forth in time of God's worship, to take notice of such as either lye about the meeting-howse, without attending to the word or ordinances, or that lye at

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- home or in the fields, without giving good account thereof, and to take the names of such persons, and present them to the magistrate, whereby they may be accordingly proceeded against." 1645.
- Way laid out to Winter Island.  
May 14. Manchester set off and incorporated. 1648-9.
- March 12. "Its ordered that Marble Head, with the allowance of the gen'all court, shall be a towne, and the bounds to be the utmost extent of that land which was Mr. Humphries' farme and sould to Marble Head, and soe all the neck to the sea, reserving the disposing of the ferry and appoynting of the ferry man to Salem." The town contained 44 families. 1650.
- Sept. 22. Brethren at Bass River, Beverly, have liberty to obtain a minister.  
Oct. 18. Topsfield set off and incorporated. 1652.
- A captain was fined for sailing on the Sabbath. 1655.
- May 17. Winter Island appropriated for use of the fort; called "Fort William" in 1699.  
May 17. Burial place laid out at the hill above Francis Law's house. Broad st. ground. 1657.
- The Quakers began to arrive, and in 1658 the first law of penalty of death upon them was enacted, and in 1661 eighteen of them were publicly punished in Salem.  
8th of 4th mo. "It is ordered that if any inhabitant within this Jurisdiction of Salem shall at any time after the date hereof receive or take in any fforayner upon any pretence whatever without approbation of the selectmen shall pay for everie weeke continuance twentie shillings per weeke." 1658.
- June 29. Court punished people for attending Quaker meeting. 1659.
- Dec. 23. Rev. Edward Norris died. 1660.
- Baker's and Miserÿ Islands granted to Salem by Legislature.  
Aug. 29. Rev. John Higginson ordained minister of the First Church. 1664.
- Mill Bridge, over South River, built about this time. 1665.
- March 15. John Endicott died. 1667.
- July 4. Dismissal of Brethren from First Church to found a church at Bass River. 1668.
- Beverly originally called "Cape Ann Side" and "Bass River," set off and incorporated. 1670.
- Second meeting house erected on same spot as first. 1672.
- March 22. Permission for ministry at Salem Village. 1674.
- June 5. Capt. Walter Price died, aged 61. 1675.
- Sept. 18. Capt. Thomas Lathrop of Beverly and seventy men were killed by the Indians, at Bloody Brook (now Deerfield.)  
Dec. 19. Capt. Joseph Gardner and six others killed at the Narragansett swamp fight. 1677.
- First Court house built. 1680.
- Nov. 14. A blazing star appeared and continued until Feb. 10th, causing great alarm. 1681.
- June 28. William Hawthorne died lately, aged 73, having been in the town since 1636. 1683.
- Feb. 7. Ordered that Marblehead, Beverly, Gloucester, Ipswich, Rowley, Newbury and Salisbury, belong to the Salem port of entry. 1684.
- A prison built near corner of Federal and St. Peter streets, 20 feet square and 13 feet stud.  
Ten persons had liberty to erect wharves at Winter Island. 1685.
- Jan. 6. Capt. George Curwen died, aged 74, who came in 1638; and in 1688, Jan. 20, Hon. William Browne, aged 81 who arrived in 1635; these were the most noted persons in the town. 1686.
- Clergymen first authorized to solemnize marriages; authority continued by Act of 1692.  
Oct. 11. Deed of Salem given by the Indians for £40. Original deed now hangs on the walls of City Hall. 1689.
- Nov. 10. Persons dismissed to constitute a Church at Salem Village, now Danvers, where they had preaching years before.

Sept. 22. Miss Emma Leach, aged 52, and only 25 inches in height, visited Salem, and excited much curiosity.
1701.  
Carriages began to be used about this time.
- May 2. Remarkable hailstorm, lasting three days.
1706.  
Sept. 2. First Quarterly meeting of Friends held in this place.
1708.  
Dec. 7. Benjamin Brown died, aged 60; made liberal bequests to schools in Salem and to Harvard College.
- Dec. 9. Rev. John Higginson died, aged 92.
1712.  
First Grammar School, anciently called a writing school, established; Nathaniel Higginson, teacher.
1713.  
April 19. Ann, relict of Gov. Bradstreet, died, aged 79.
- April 24. Benjamin Gerrish, collector of the Port, died, aged 60.
- June 25. Persons dismissed to form a Church in the middle precinct, now Peabody.
- Nov. 16. The Common "shall be forever a training field for the use of Salem."
1714.  
May 13. Friends consider the building of a meeting house.
1716.  
Feb. 14. Hon. Wm. Browne died in his 78th year, leaving legacies to Harvard College and the Salem Grammar schools.
- Oct. 15. Governor Samuel Shute of New Hampshire entertained.

Third building of First Church Society erected.  
Second court house built.  
Jan. 7. Gen. Israel Putnam born  
May. East church, at corner of Essex and Hardy streets, opened for worship.

Small-pox at Marblehead, all intercourse prohibited; guards placed.

Sept. 29. Rev. Geo. Whitefield preached on the Common to about six thousand people.

 Feb. 26. Col. Leslie with 300 British soldiers land at Marblehead and march to Salem for the purpose of seizing cannon, causing a serious rencontre at North bridge.  
 Apr. 19. Battle of Lexington. Benjamin Pierce of Salem killed. Col. Pickering with 300 soldiers marched rapidly towards Lexington, but arrived too late for action.  
 Sept. 14. A detachment of troops commanded by Benedict Arnold, sent from Cambridge by Gen. Washington, stop for dinner at Salem, on their way to attempt the capture of Quebec.  
 1776.  
 First Tabernacle church erected at corner of Washington and Federal sts.  
 Barracks prepared at Juniper point (Fort Juniper.)  
 Aug. 15. Rev. Thomas Barnard, of the First Church, died.  
 Oct. 2. A privateer chased into Salem.  
 1777.  
 Feb. 17. John Pickering, celebrated philologist born.  
 June 14. Congress adopted the flag of the United States.

 Oct. 6. Privateer "Stark" chased into Salem by two British frigates.

### WARD BOUNDARIES.

WARD 1. All that portion of the city lying east of Washington street, and between Essex street and the South River; also, Salem Neck, and the islands.

WARD 2. All that portion of the city lying east of Washington street, and between Essex street and the North River.

WARD 3. All that portion of the city lying west of Washington street, south and east of Essex street and Highland avenue, and west of the B. & M. railroad main line.

WARD 4. All that portion of the city lying west of Washington street, north and west of Essex street and Highland avenue, and south and west of North River and the new canal.

WARD 5. All that portion of the city lying south of South River, and east of the B. & M. railroad main line, including South Salem.

WARD 6. All that portion of the city lying north of North River and the new canal, including North Salem.

### SALEM NICKNAMES.

(From the Salem News.)

Salem is unusually prolific in local nomenclature. There is hardly a lane or alley, hill or hollow, which has not borne some nickname more or less appropriate at some period of its history. In this age of directories such names become lost, giving place to the recognized title.

All down town, below Pleasant street, was formerly known as Wapping, so named from Wapping in London.

North Salem was christened Pigeonville, and many still call it North Fields, a later title.

Castletonville, now nicknamed Nauvoo, was a locality where Winthrop and Endicott streets now are. A man named Joe Smith built a house there about the same time that Joe Smith, the Mormon, settled Nauvoo.

Roast meat hill applied to the rising ground back of High street.

Knocker's hole was in the vicinity of Mill and Margin streets. There was a shipyard there in the last century.

Button hole was near the jail, and the Button hole toughs used to have fights with the Knocker's hole gang.

Vinegar hill was on Broad street. Circus lane is now Hathorne street, the fields out that way being let years ago for circus performances.

Liberty hill is in North Salem, off Appleton street. There was a little picnic ground there years ago and quite a story could be written of its history.

Buffum's corner was at the junction of Boston and Essex streets, named after a Buffum who kept store there about 150 years ago.

Neck gate denoted the end of Derby street.

Blubber hollow was from Federal to Goodhue street, also known as Town bridge.

Johnny Cake hill stood between Blubber hollow and the big tree on Boston street.

Carletonville is a section of North Salem on Mason street.

From the big tree to the Peabody burying ground was called Trask's plain.

The Nubble was a locality near the Peabody burying ground.

Goose lane ran from Federal to Fowler street.

Lovers' lane was off Tremont street. Plank alley was a part of Elm street between Charter and Essex.

Baptist hill, in the rear of Federal street, named from the First Baptist church, now called Odell square. They used to baptize in a pond near by.

Gallows hill, in the rear of Boston street, the scene of the witchcraft executions of 1692 is too well known to require anything beyond mere mention. As also the town pastures and Castle hill, which still hold their names.

Creek street is so named because it is built over what was a creek, but is now culverted over.

School house lane was the early name given Washington street, afterwards Court street.

"Nahum Keike," or Naumkeag, was the original Indian name for North river.

Federal street was so named in 1766, as an indication of the united feeling in favor of something better than an eight-foot way along the North River. The portion from Washington to North was previously called Marlborough street, and the eastern portion County street.

Old Paved street was the name of Essex between Washington and North for many years, it being paved about 1773. King street and Main street are also names which have been applied to Essex street.

PRECINCT FIVE, all that portion of Ward 3, lying east and south of a line commencing at the corner of Essex and Summerstreets, thence running through the centre of Summer street to Broad street, thence westerly through the centre of Broad street to Hathorne street, thence southeasterly through the centre of Hathorne street to the Mill Pond, and continuing in the same direction on a straight line to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

PRECINCT SIX, all that portion of Ward 3, lying west and north of a line commencing at the corner of Essex and Summer streets, thence running southerly through the centre of Summer street to Broad street, thence westerly through the centre of Broad street to Hathorne street, thence southeasterly through the centre of Hathorne street to the Mill Pond, and continuing in the same direction on a straight line to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

PRECINCT SEVEN, all that portion of Ward 4, within the following lines, viz:—commencing at the corner of Essex and Washington streets, thence running northerly through the centre of Washington street to North River, thence southwesterly and northwesterly by the line of North River and the North River canal, to Grove street, thence through the centre of Grove street to Goodhue street, thence through the centre of Goodhue street, to the junction of Goodhue and Bridge streets, thence by the northeast and southeast lines of Hose house No. 4 to Boston street, thence easterly through the centre of Boston street to Essex street, thence through the centre of Essex street to the corner of Essex and Washington streets and point begun at.

## REGULATIONS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES IN THE CITY OF SALEM.

Adopted January 31, 1881, by Board of Aldermen.

ORDERED. That, until otherwise ordered, the price or rates of fare, to be taken by, or paid to, the owner, driver, or other person having charge of any licensed hackney carriage, except omnibuses and barges, shall be as follows:

SECTION 1. For the conveyance, from one place to another within the limits of that part of the city, lying and being within the following described boundaries, viz.: Commencing at the junction of Essex and Webb street, thence running southerly through Webb street to Salem Harbor, thence westerly by said harbor to Union street bridge, thence easterly and southerly by said harbor to Ocean Avenue, thence by Ocean Avenue to the track of the Eastern Railroad Co., thence northerly by said track to Margin street, thence southerly and westerly by Margin street and the Mill Pond to the southern end of Hawthorne street; thence westerly by the eastern line of the Great Pastures to Highland Avenue, thence, by Essex, Boston, Grove, Mason, Barr, School and Orne streets to Walter street; thence through Walter street to the eastern end thereof, and continuing on the same course to North river, thence westerly by said river to the bridge on North street; thence easterly by the southern line of North River to the northern end of March street; thence by March, Bridge and Osgood streets to Collins Cove; thence westerly by Collins Cove to Webb street; thence southerly through Webb street to the point begun at; of one or more adult passengers, twenty-five cents each.

SECT. 2. For one or more adult passengers from any place in the city within said limits to any place in the city beyond said limits, but within Block-house square, the junction of Lafayette street and Lynn Road, the Glue Works on Highland Avenue, Prospect, Varney, Rawlins, Watson, Grove, Mason, Myrtle, School and Northend streets, Liberty Hill Road, Appleton and Orne streets, and Beverly Bridge, or vice versa; thirty-five cents each.

SECT. 3. For one or more adult passengers from one extreme to another extreme, of the limits described in the second section, fifty cents each.

SECT. 4. From Washington street to the depots, or any place in the city east of Washington street, and between North and South Rivers to the Willows, Juniper or Winter Island, or vice versa, for one adult passenger, seventy-five cents; or two adult passengers, fifty cents each;

for three or more adult passengers, thirty-five cents each.

From any place in the city beyond the limits hereinbefore stated in this section, but within Ocean Avenue, Boston, Grove, Mason, School and Orne streets, to the Willows, Juniper or Winter Island, or vice versa, for one adult passenger, one dollar; for two or more adult passengers, fifty cents each.

SECT. 5. From any place within the limits mentioned in Section One, to Harmony Grove, for one adult passenger, seventy-five cents; for two adult passengers, fifty cents each; for three or more adult passengers, thirty-five cents each. For returning therefrom with same passengers and without delay, fifty cents; whether for one or more passengers.

SECT. 6. For the conveyance of persons to any place not hereinbefore specified, and for funerals, special reasonable rates may be charged.

SECT. 7. The charge for hackney carriages drawn by two horses, when hired by the hour, shall be one dollar and one-half a dollar for each hour, and when drawn by one horse, one dollar for each hour; and for parts of hours after the first hour, a proportional part of the rate for one hour shall be charged.

SECT. 8. For children under six years of age, with an adult, no charge will be made. For children between six and twelve years of age when accompanied by an adult, the fare shall be half the price charged for an adult, and when not accompanied by an adult, full fare may be charged.

SECT. 9. Between the hours of ten o'clock at night and half past six o'clock in the morning, double the above established rates may be charged.

SECT. 10. No charge shall be made for one trunk, and the valise, carpet-bags, portmanteaus, bundles and baskets, of each passenger, but for each additional trunk, more than one, fifteen cents may be charged; and the owner or driver of any hackney carriage, shall not be required to take or deposit the baggage of any passenger, except from or in the hall or vestibule of any residence or building in the city.

SECT. 11. When any street is mentioned in this order as the boundary of any limit, both sides of the street shall be deemed to be, and is included, within such limit.
