PUBLIC GROUNDS - MARINERS' CHURCH In compliance with the duty devolved on us, we beg to to call the attention of the general government to the public ground, whereon the Mariners' church is situated.

Be it premised that the executive branch of the government has no more right to make an appropriation of public lands than of public monies—that by the 4th article of the federal constitution, the right of disposing of public property is restricted solely Ito Congress.
