JAMAICA.-The abolition of slavery in the West Indies has not been productive of the beneficial effects anticipated by its advocates. It is not often safe and seldom prudent to attempt suddenly a rackcal alteration in the customs of any country or people. To abolish slavery might be a desirable object in any nation; but the means should not only be commensurate with the end, but should be of that precautionary or preventive pature as not to cause an equal or greater calamity. In Jamaica manumission had produced indolence and insurrection by removing the coercive restraints essential in every well regulated community, relative to the discipline of different classes of society.
