University High School is a variety of people: students, faculty, staff, student teachers, and observers. The student body is characterized by a greater diversity than most high schools. Uni's members come from many communities outside Champaign-Urbana, including Danville, Mahomet, Philo, Rantoul, St. Joseph, and Tolono. Students also come from Kenya, Mexico, Norway, and Iran. A wide age span exists with students ranging from eleven years old to eighteen. Because all this diversity is contained in a group of about two hundred and sixty persons and since students spend as long as five years together, Uni High maintains an atmosphere of friendly informality.

The Lounge and the Library have always been favorite places for students to converse and study. This year a visitor's center was installed in the Home Economics Room, and Room 207 was converted into a faculty lounge and library. Students and faculty worked together to organize a system of student monitors, and these monitors were placed in charge of the Lounge, the sophomore-junior study halls, and the halls at noon and after school.

The orientation program was especially successful this year in welcoming new students. The Fall Project, "An Evening in New Orleans," provided a chance for all students to work together and to become better acquainted. The Christmas holidays brought the traditional get together of students and alumni at the Christmas Dance, College Day, Madrigal Reunion, and Mikado Rehash. With such a variety, Uni High can best be described as a "friendly experiment."

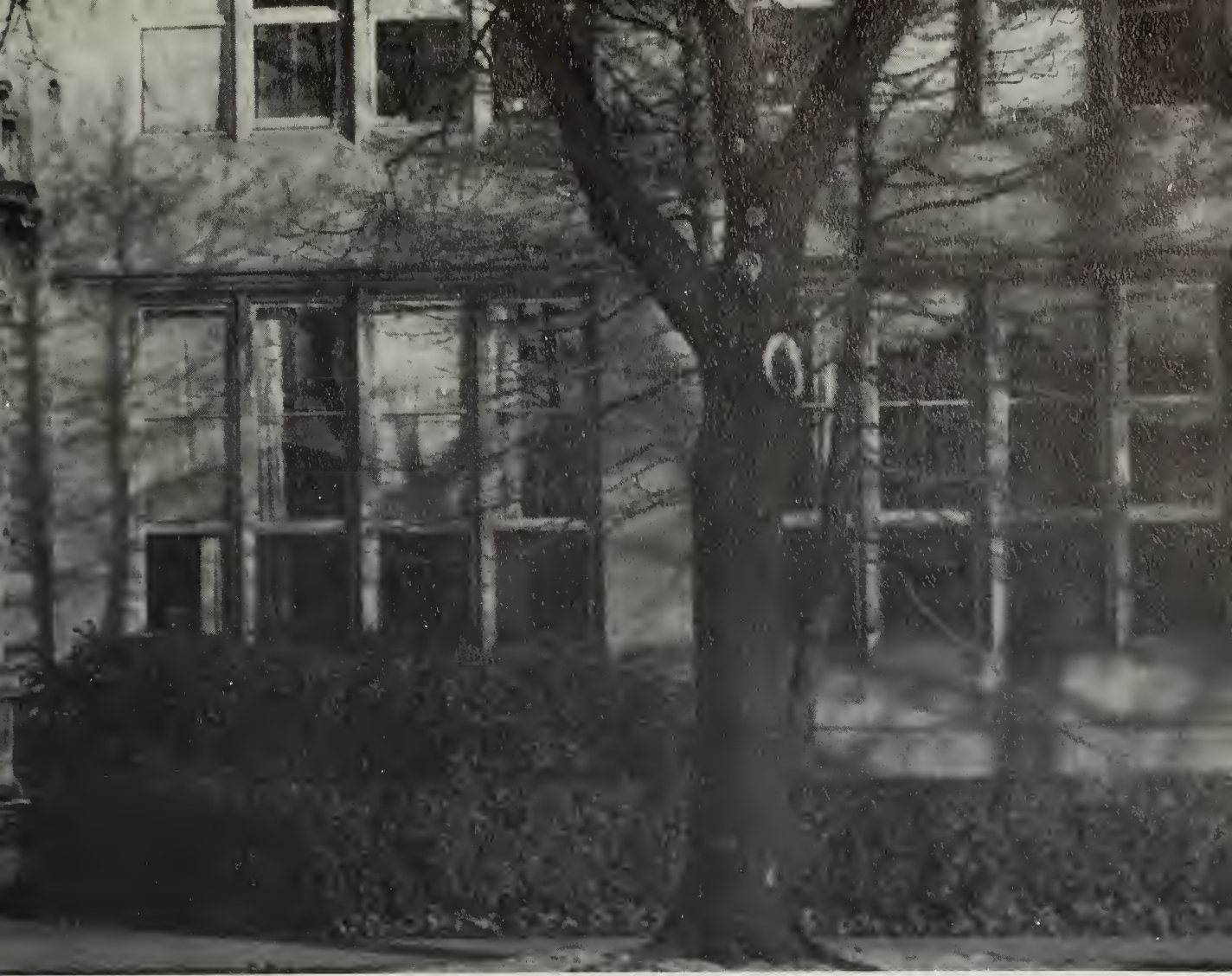


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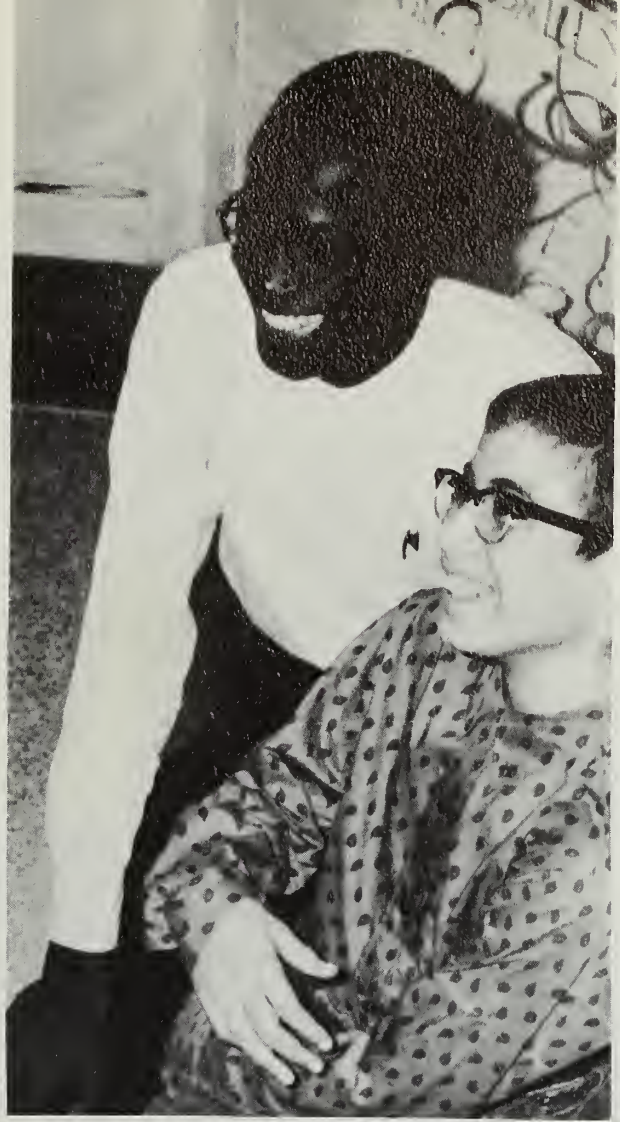

HOME ECONOMICS ROOM

One of the major improvements in Uni High is the remodeled Home Economics Room. It is organized into four activity areas. Two new model kitchens with sinks, refrigerators, ranges and wall ovens have been installed for the use of the subfreshmen home economics class. WORK AND RELAX

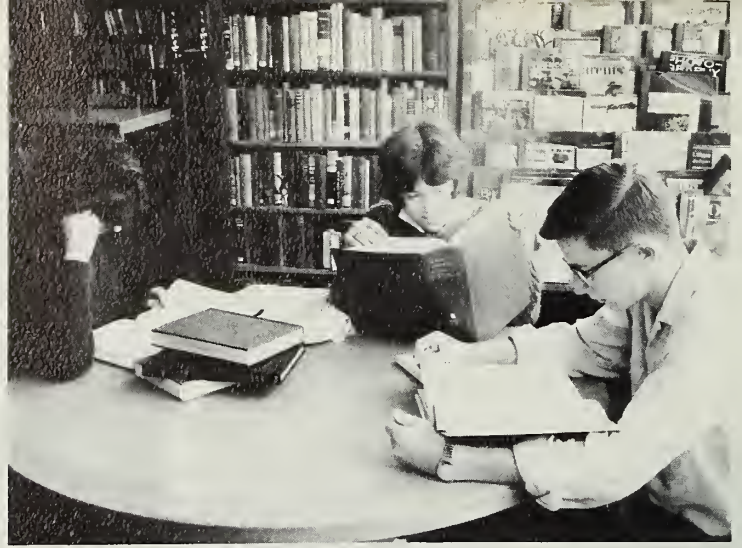

PROGRESS REPORTS

One institution of Uni High which seems to remain untouched in the midst of other changes is the quarterly distribution of progress reports. Four times each year the noon dismissal bell rings at 11:50, six minutes earlier than usual, and students apprehensively assemble in their class meeting rooms. The class sponsor arrives carrying the significant stack of reports and begins to call names. The wait is agonizing for those whose names are near the end of the alphabetical list. Although most students know what grades they will receive, a degree of doubt is always present, and there is the perpetual problem of a "4+" which could be a "5-" or vice-versa. Clutching their fateful slips of paper, the "scholars" retreat to examine their scores in private. The halls are lined and quiet. Soon, however, their grades examined and momentary elation or dejection controlled, students turn to lunch and comparison of results. Progress reports now belong to the finished quarter.

NATIONAL MERIT EXAM

The entire class of '63 took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in the spring of their junior year. Among these, five scored in the top one-half percentile becoming semi-finalists. Fifteen other seniors received Letters of Commendation on the basis of their scores. The semi-finalists sent personal, academic and financial forms to the Merit Corporation, and took the Scholastic Aptitude Test in December. In early February, they, along with eleven thousand other finalists received Certificates of Merit. The scholarship winners were determined by their academic and extra-curricular records. The amount of their scholarship was adjusted to need.

This year Citizenship Committee drastically revised the lunch clean-up program. The old system was felt to be insufficient, since no emphasis was placed on the students' picking up after themselves. A system of monitors was instituted to patrol the halls during the noon period to see that students picked up their own trash. Monitors were selected on a volunteer basis with each class responsible for a certain day of the week. The new system has met with student cooperation and has proved effective in keeping the halls free of litter.

BASKETBALL

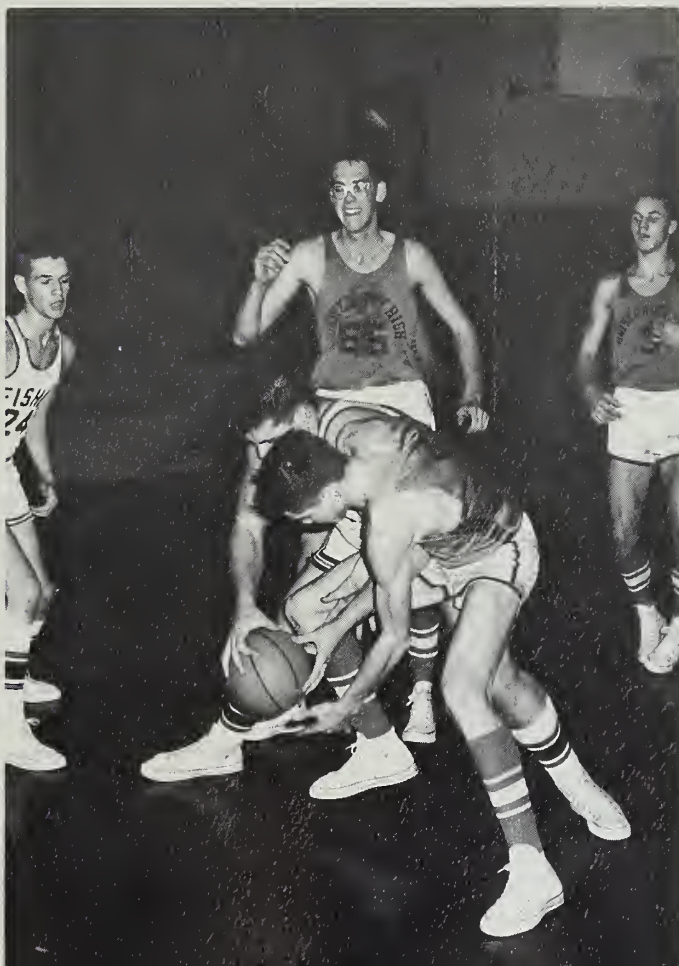

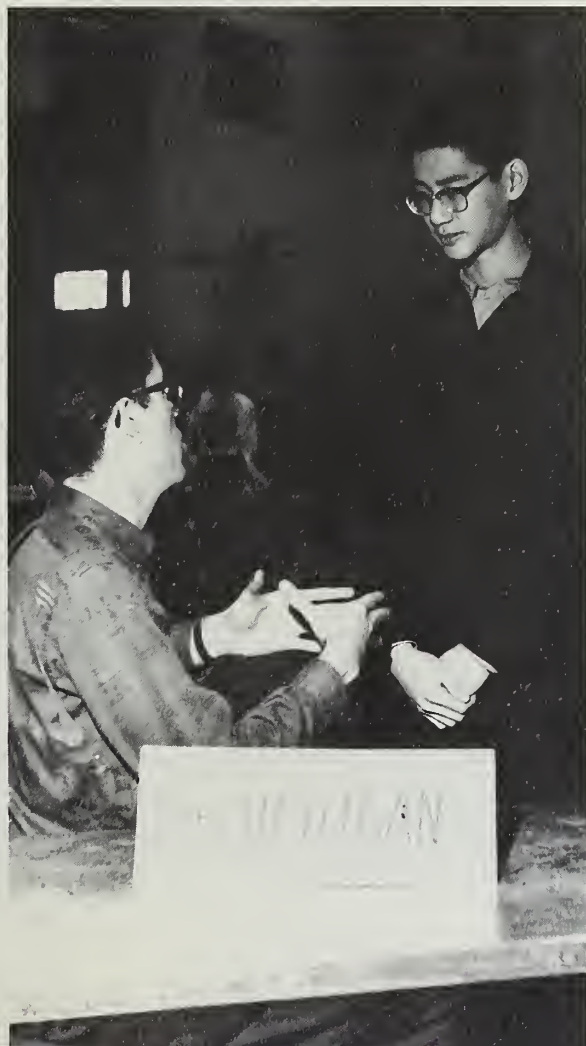

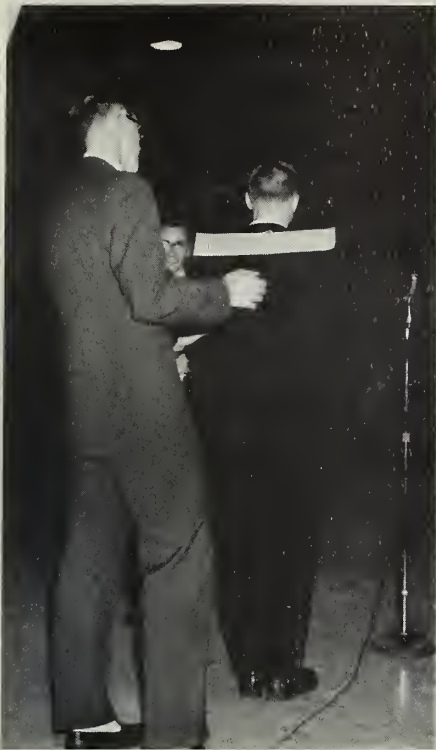

UNI ON TELEVISION

ECONOMICS PROGRAM

On January 14 the economics class appeared on the new CBS television series "The American Economy" which was broadcast locally over stations WCIA and WILL. Before the filming the class conducted extensive research into economic growth and prepared a policy statement. As the production date approached, class members were busy noon hours, after school and Saturdays preparing their speeches and discussion. On December 14, armed with charts and figures, and accompanied by Miss Leppert, by Mr. and Mrs. Hannagan and by Mr. and Mrs. Wagner, the class departed for Chicago. They watched the opening of the Chicago Board of Trade, toured the Harris Trust and Federal Reserve banks and then registered at the Sherman Hotel, guests of the College of the Air series. In the evening the students saw the movie "Mutiny on the Bounty." The following day was spent taping the economics program, which included introductory statements by Miss Leppert, presentation of the classes' economic proposals and a panel discussion of the proposed policy. 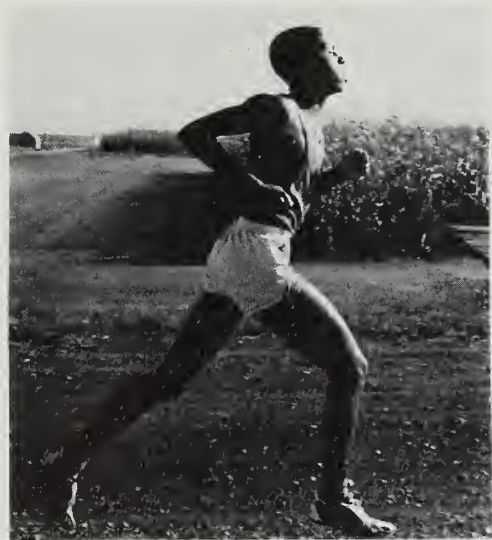
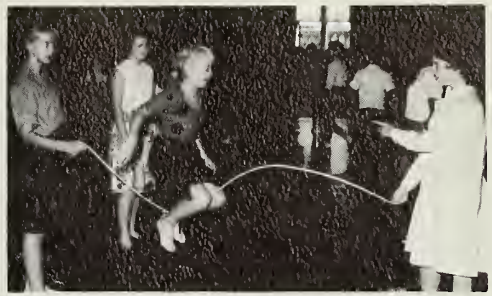

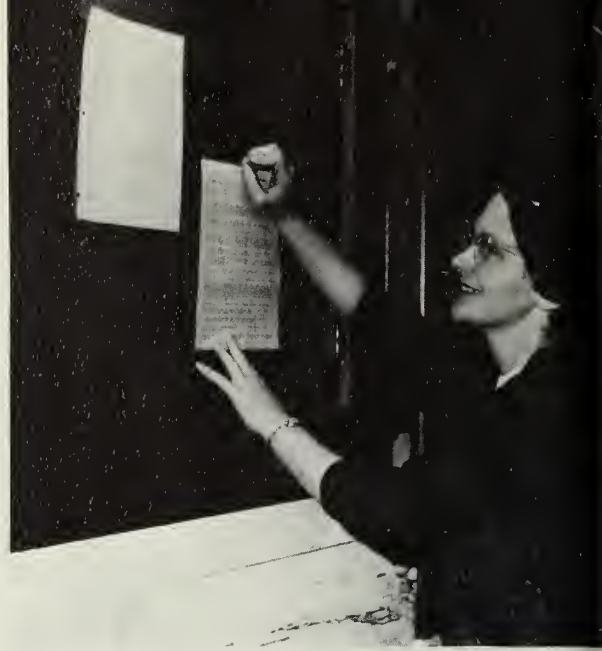

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

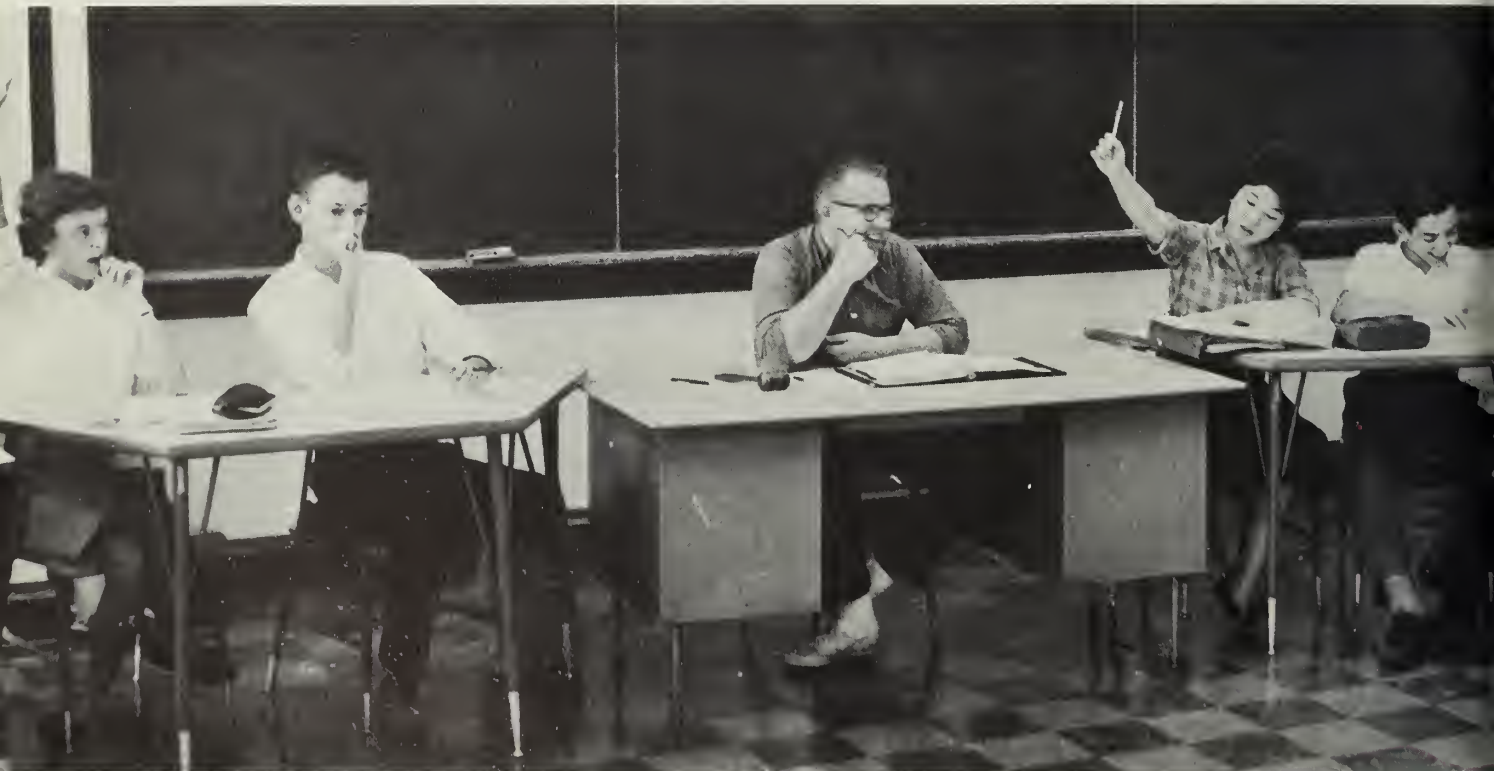

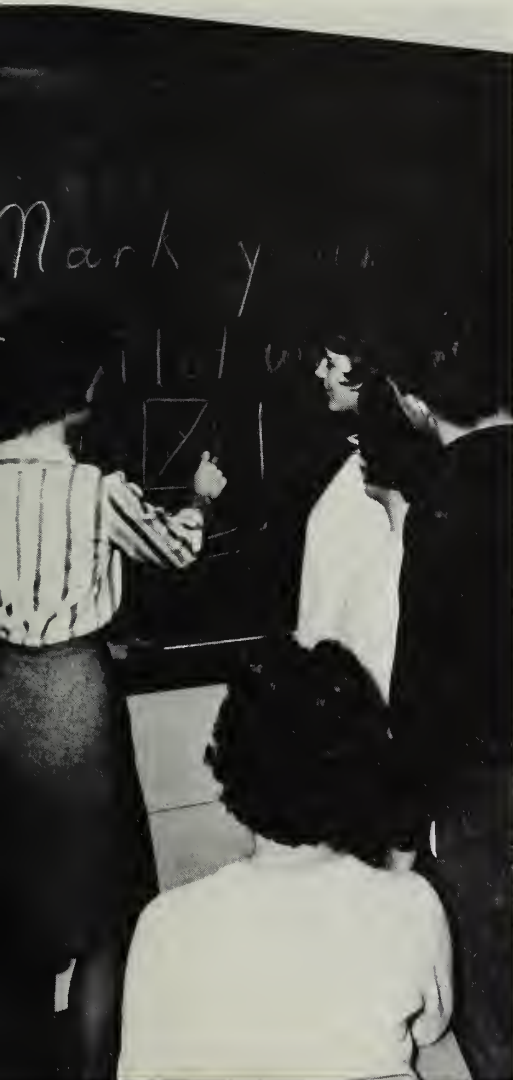

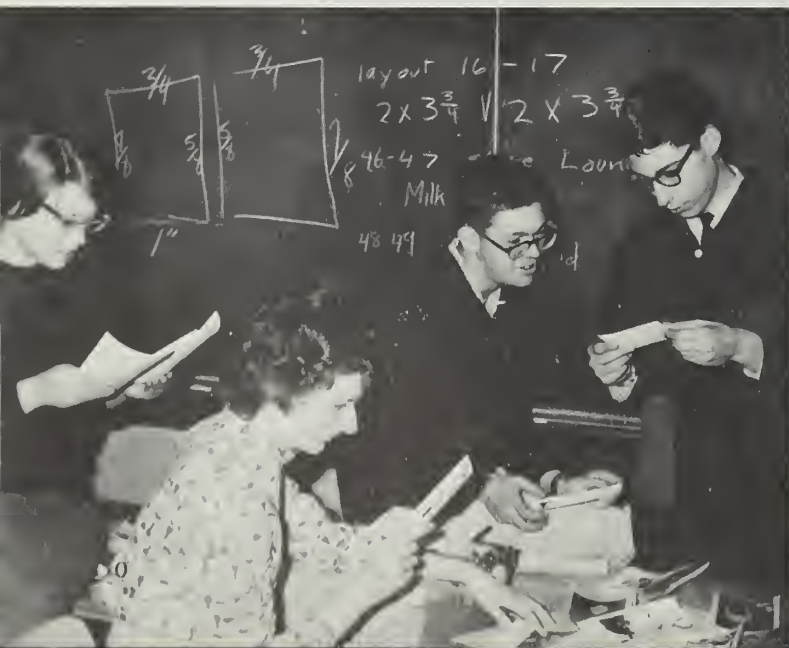

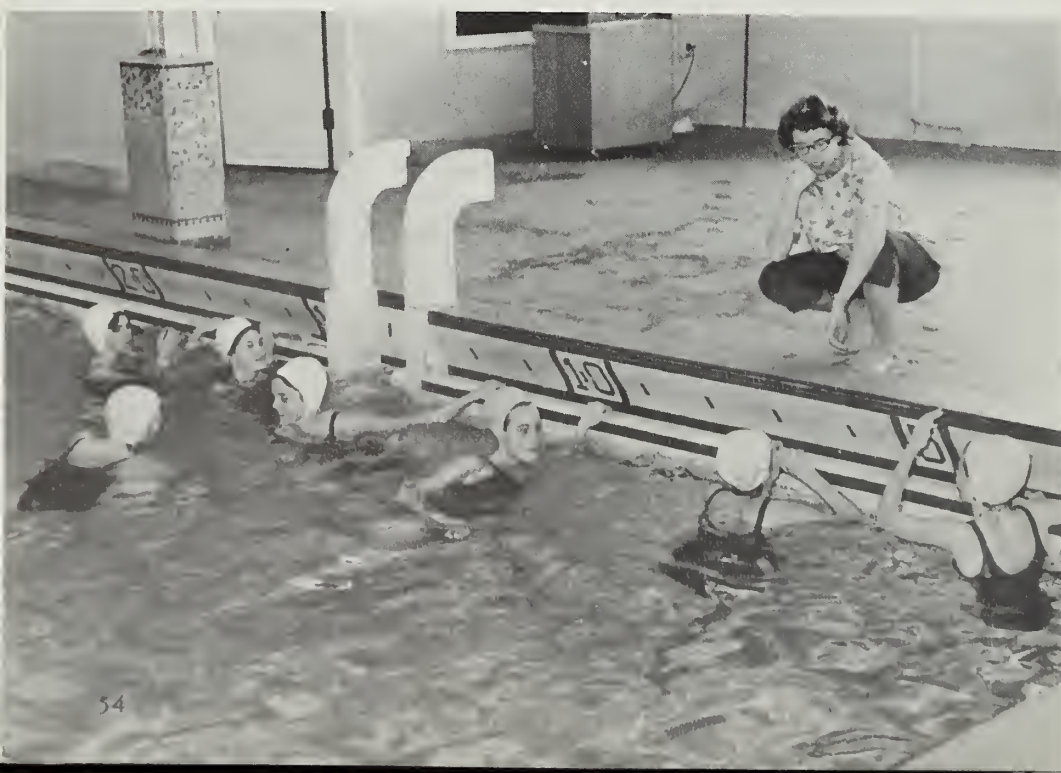

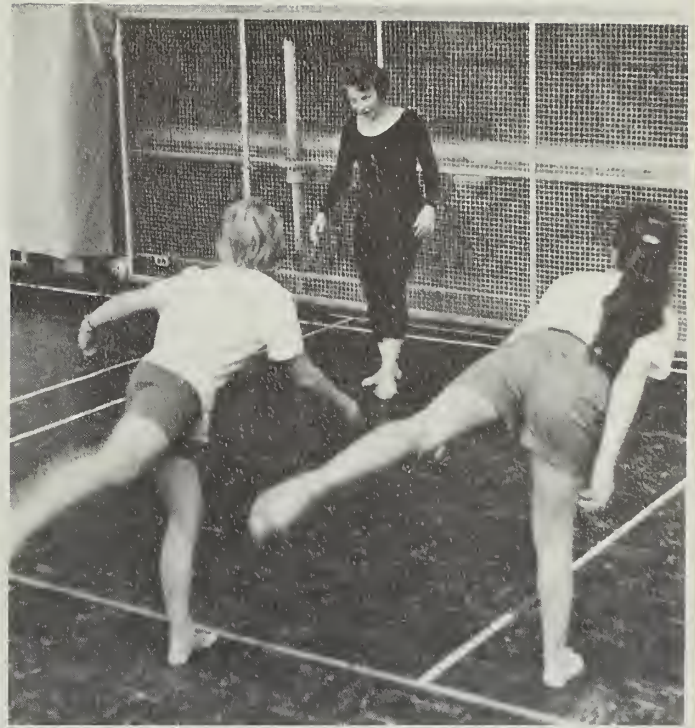

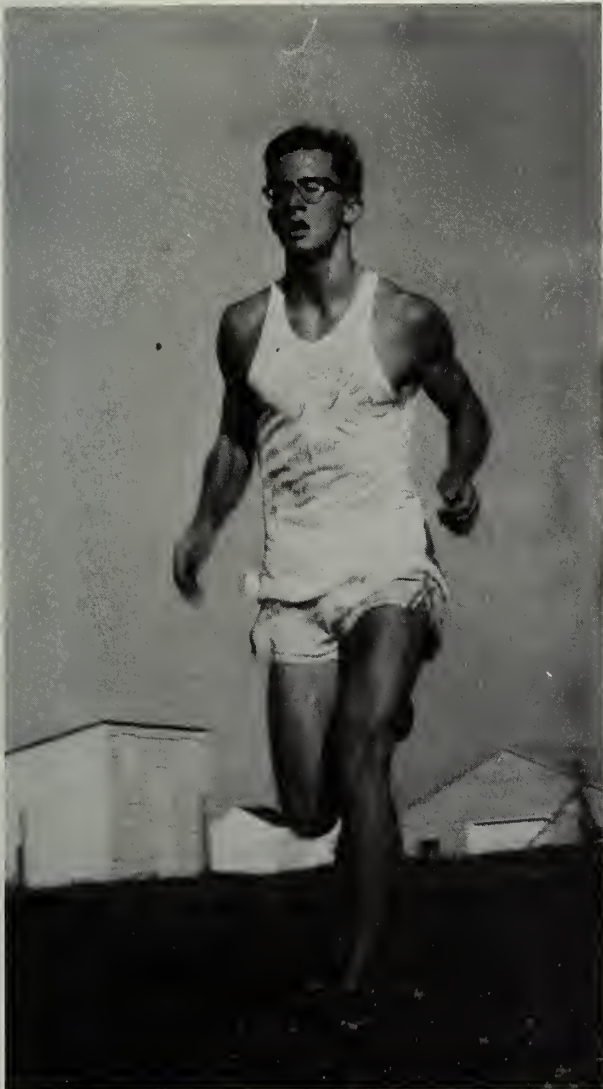

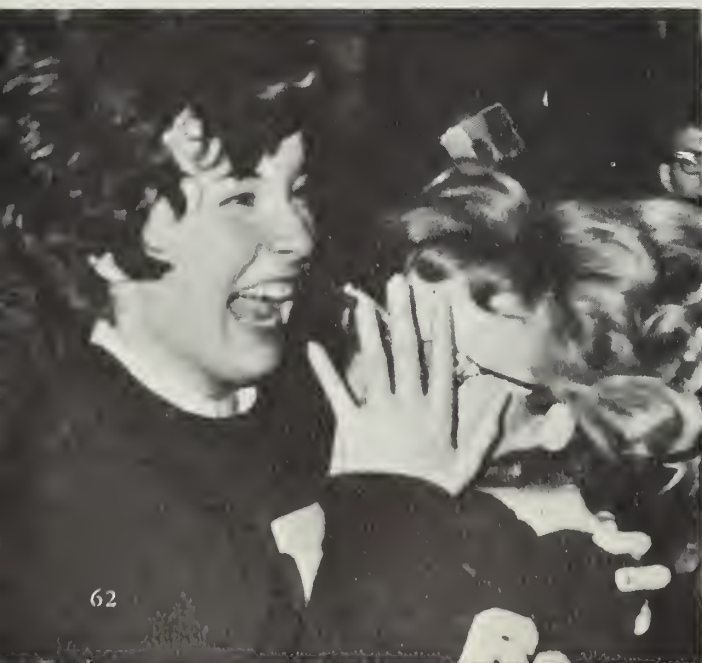

During the 1962-1963 season, Uni's Buckeyes carried off two tournament trophies. These were Uni High's first basketball trophies in six years.

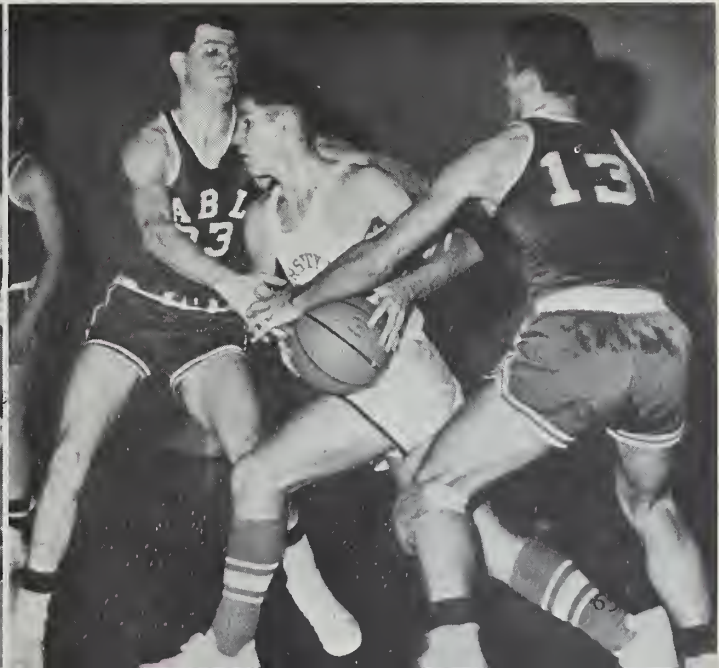
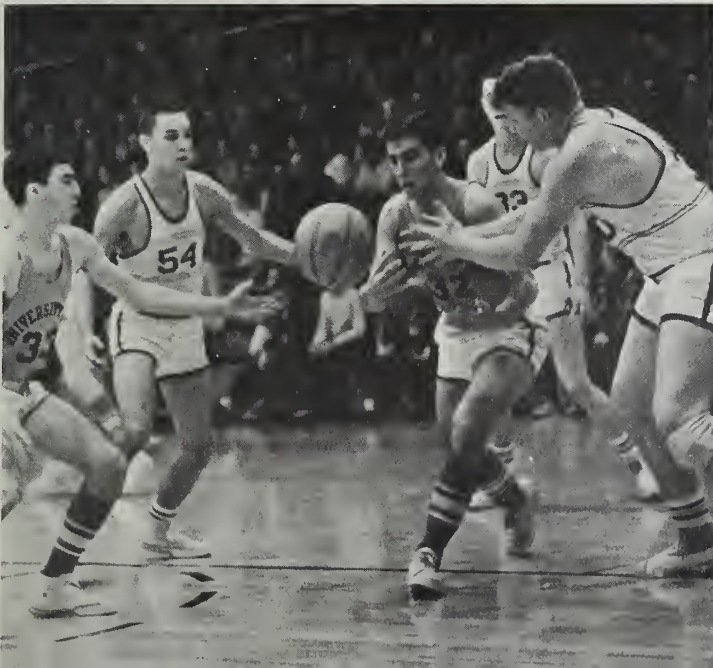
The Cerro Gordo Tournament took place during the Christmas holidays. Uni opened with an easy win over Lovington and advanced to the finals by nipping Mansfield by a slim 2-point margin when Bas Kruidenier sank a layup with ten seconds left in the game. However, in the finals, Cerro Gordo proved too much for the Bucks as they slipped past Uni with a score of 60-50. Uni trailed Cerro Gordo nearly the entire first half, with only a momentary lead of 34-33. In the second half the host team pulled away to leave Coach Carlier's forces with a hard-earned second place.

The County Tournament was the apogee of Uni's basketball season. The Buckeyes crushed Homer 71-48 in the first game and went on to defeat ABL 65-62 in one of the greatest upsets ever staged by a Uni quintet. In the ABL game the Trojans came on strong in the final quarter, even gaining a lead of 51-50 at one point, but Uni's valiant Bucks managed to stave them off. Bas Kruidenier's two free throws in the waning seconds iced the victory. This made only the second loss for ABL. In the tourney finals Uni was pitted against undefeated Mahomet-Seymour. Nearly the entire student body plus a large turnout of faculty attended the championship game. The Bulldogs pulled away from Uni and gained a lead of thirteen points by the end of the first half. The Bucks cut the margin to three points in the second half, but that was the closest they came and Uni went down to Mahomet-Seymour by a count of 56-46. Second place, however, was Uni's best showing in the county since 1945, and the school was justly proud of its team.

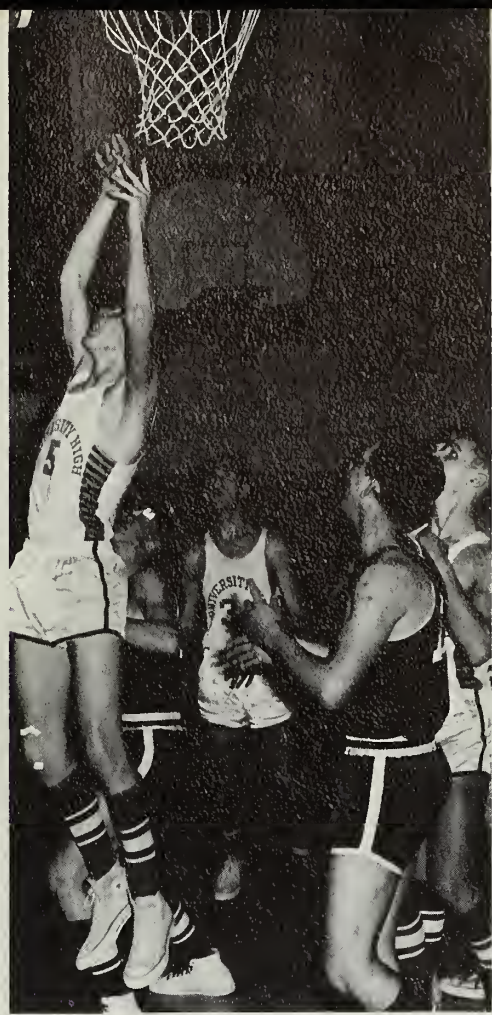
BASKETBALL SEASON

The '62-'63 basketball teams proved to be Uni's best in many years. The Varsity team compiled a 14-10 record for the first winning season in 18 years, and the J.V. squad showed themselves ready for coming competition.

The Buckeyes, coached by Robert Carlier, started the season by nipping Brocton-Redmon 64-63. In the Jamaica triumph, Captain Doug Brown contributed 38 points toward a conclusive 72-53 win to tie the school individual scoring record he had set the previous year. Uni's 96-95 defeat at the hands of St. Joseph was a heartbreaker, as the Bucks came within a point of tipping the highly-touted Indians. Our most disheartening loss was administered by Young America. Uni led throughout most of the game, but in the waning seconds the Eagles managed to tie the score and then went on to win in overtime. The Bucks finished their regular season play with two important victories.

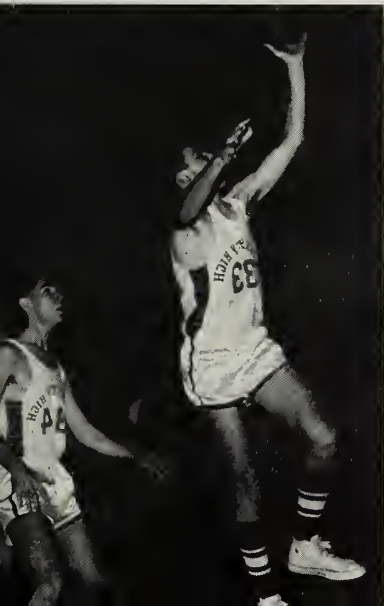
In the 94-60 trounce of Wapella, Uni set a new team scoring record, and Len Barker hooped 37 points. With a 57-41 victory over Mahomet-Seymour, the Bucks upset one of the area's best teams and avenged an earlier defeat. In the Regional Tourney, the season's finale, Uni play one of its best games. The Buckeyes were pitted against Urbana, traditionally a strong team. The Tigers took an early lead, but the Bucks roared back to capture a 16-12 first quarter advantage. They stretched the lead to 8 points second quarter, but Urbana rallied to finish 29-all at the half. In the third quarter the lead changed hands several times, but Urbana managed to salvage a 39-39 tie. The final quarter, however, proved fatal to Uni as they were outshot 22-7. Although the final score was 61-46, Uni came within a hair of another upset.

The Junior Varsity also had a successful season, proving itself one of the best J.V. teams Uni has had. The squad compiled a 10-7 winning season by triumphing in seven close conflicts. Highlights of the season included a two-point win over Fisher in the second overtime and a 70-40 smash of Wapella.

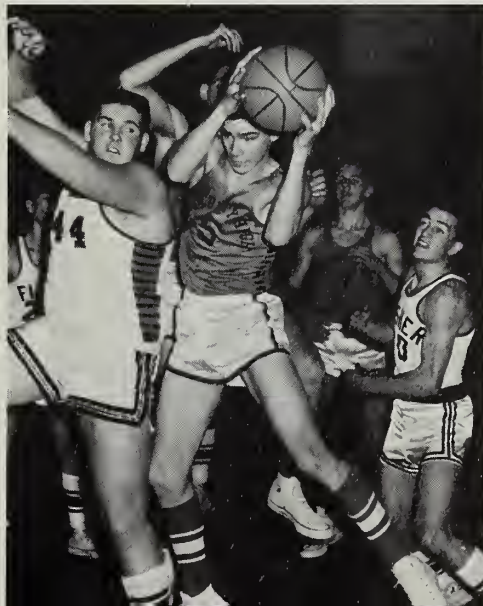


Bas Kruidenier leaps to control a rebound.

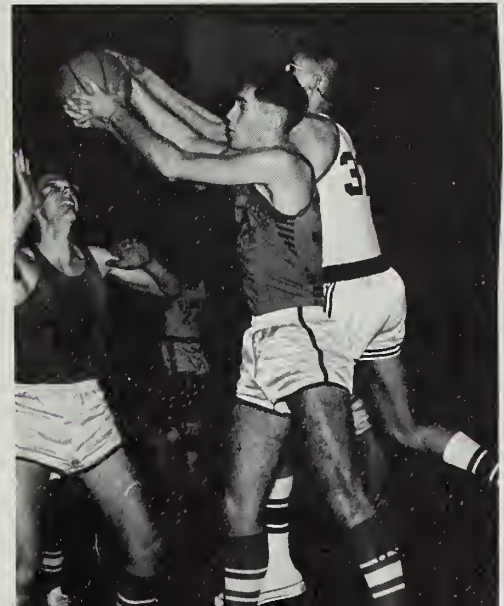
Wayne Rose sails high to receive a long pass.

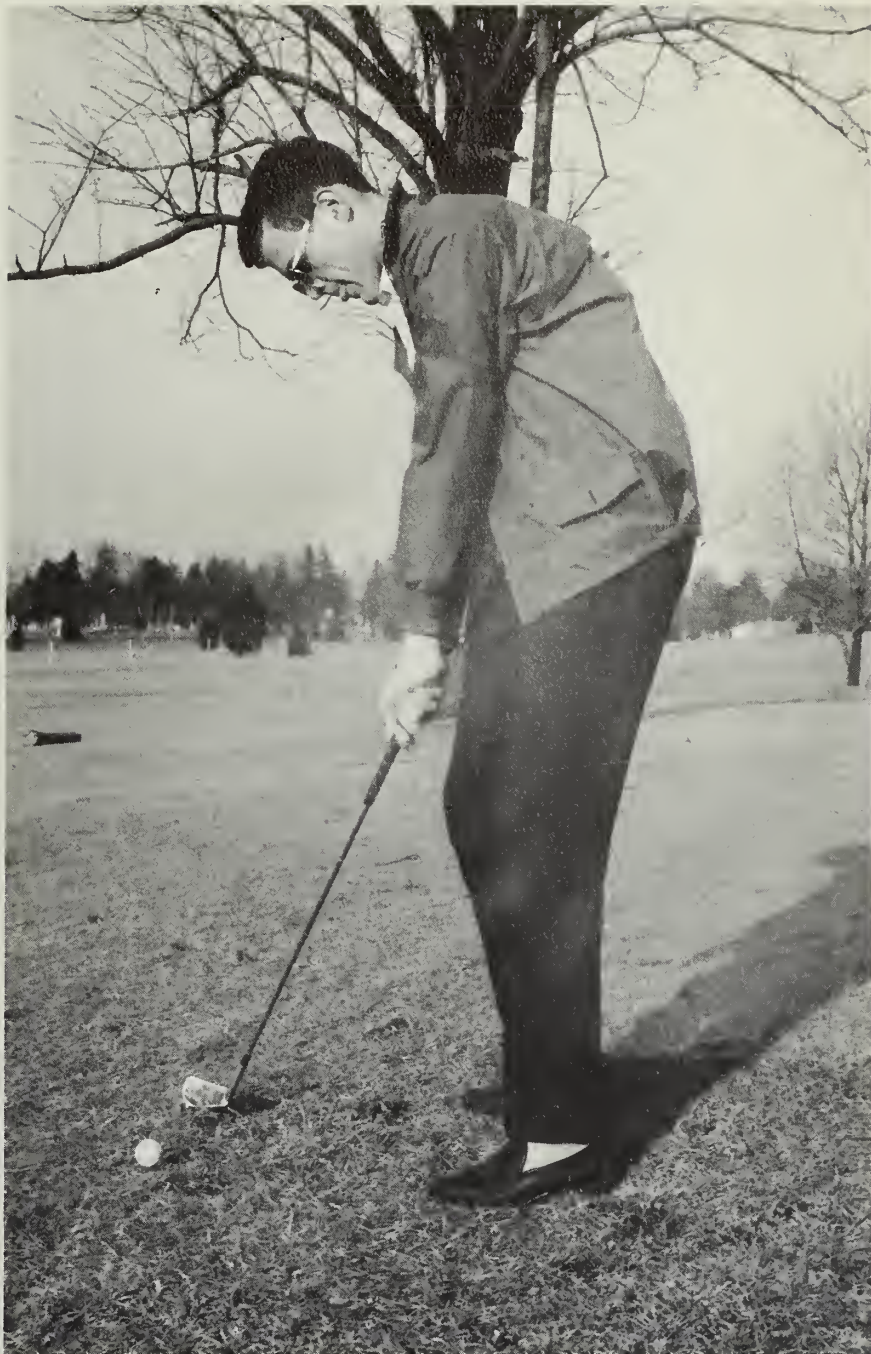


SPRING SPORTS

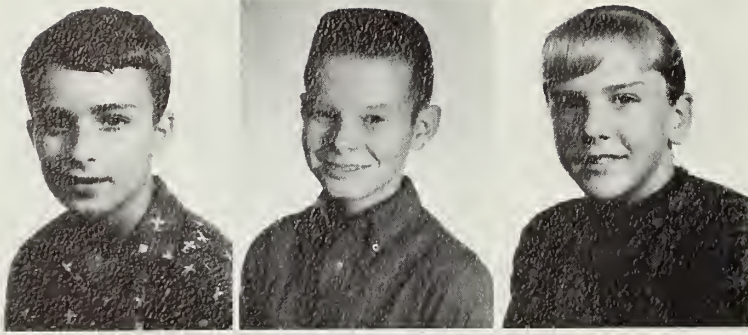

University High school serves as a demonstration center in developing secondary school programs for gifted students. Four projects resulted in prepared materials for use in other school: English Curriculum, Mathematics (UICSM), Social Science, and Science. Dr. Jackson is presently coordinator of the project staff for the State of Illinois Study of Gifted Children. Studies conducted under the program have led to a set of recommendations for state action to assist school districts in providing for gifted pupils.

ADMINISTRATION

The primary function of the administrator of an institution of learning is to select and work with faculty, for the quality of any school depends on its staff. The administrator is also responsible for the buildings and facilities and is in charge of research and special projects.

In December a committee headed by Dr. Jackson submitted a report to the Dean of the College of Education in which funds for a new school were urgently requested. The committee's tentative plan calls for an experimental school to accommodate an enrollment of 700 pupils from kindergarten through grade 12. A 25-acre site is requested. University High School is ranked the foremost laboratory school in the nation, and in view of the work being carried on the committee called for immediate allocation of funds for more detailed planning and for construction. MATH

During the academic year 1962-1963 the Mathematics Department has continued the use of text materials written by UCISM staff members. Materials for grades 9-12 are now published by the U. of I. Press. The UCISM project is now supported by the National Science Foundation. Activities during 1962-1963 included rewriting Unit I in self-instructional form, work on a new junior high sequence, and a senior high school course in vector geometry. The 7th grade course and the vector geometry will be tried at University High School during 1963-1964.

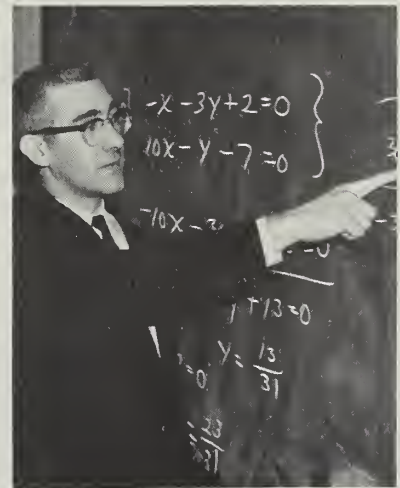

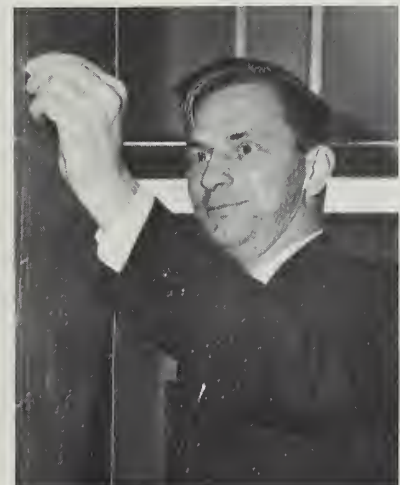

EXPERIMENT IN FRESHMAN SCIENCE

In Freshman science a new lab-centered course was developed with the students helping to design and evaluate the activities. The program is constructed with no regular text or workbook. The students are given a problem to solve using whatever lab techniques they can develop. The science staff has created working units which they hope to test in junior high around Illinois.

SCIENCE

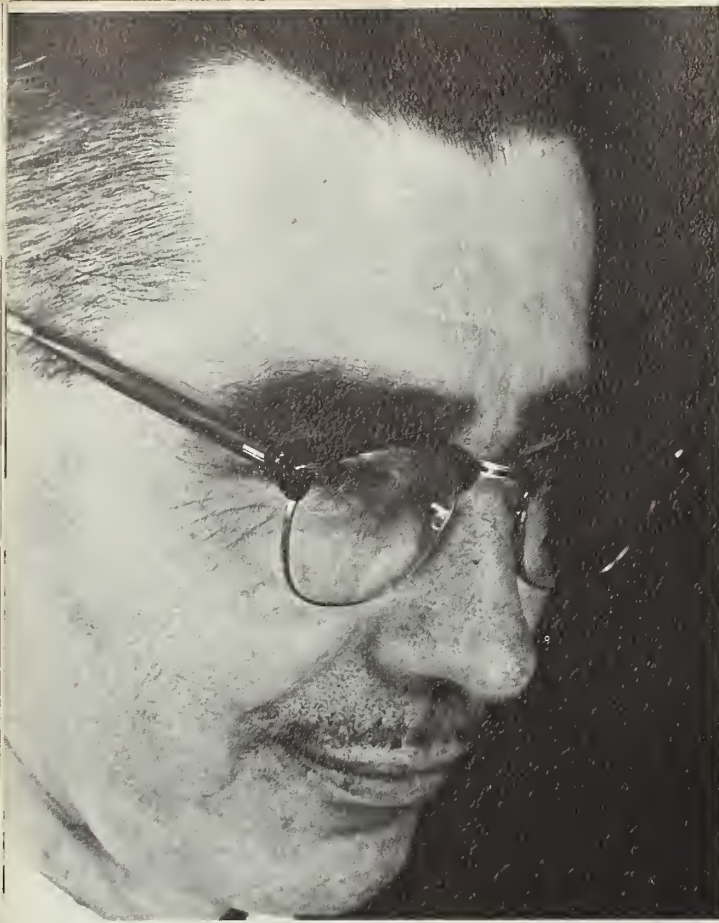
The Science Department experimented with programs which stressed independent thinking and research.

In biology classes the stress was placed on independent research, with the students designing and carrying out their own projects. The new Federal program "Project Talent" has become part of the biology program. Science teachers from other schools visit the biology classes to learn new teaching methods and techniques. A member of the science staff then returns to the visiting teacher's home school to help him set up a new program.

Chemistry classes studied the Chemical Bond Approach, a chemistry course which is still in the experimental stage. The students served as guinea pigs for new CBA ideas, using a new course in programmed learning and a unit of electro-chemistry.

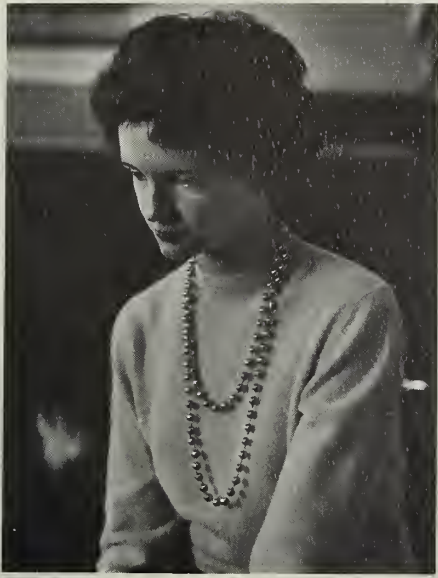

ENGLISH

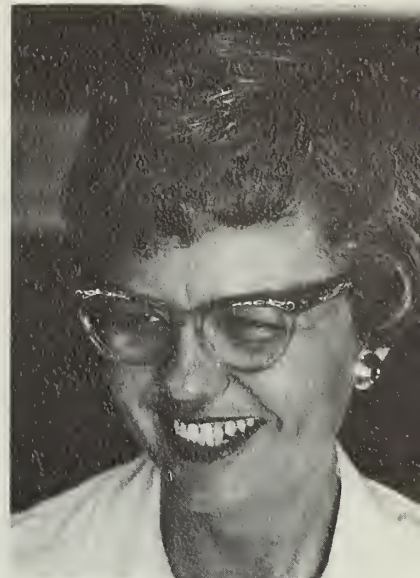

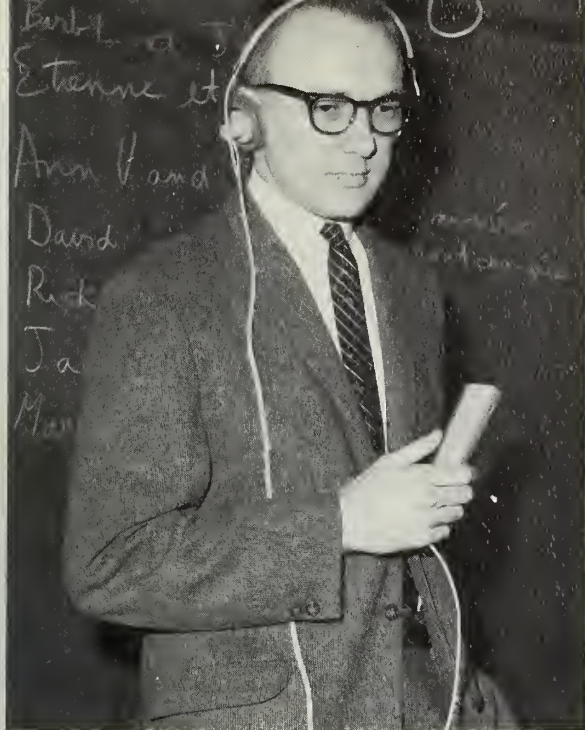

LANGUAGE

The most important development in the language department was the installation of the language laboratory to aid in oral study. The lab is used by Latin, French, German and Greek students.

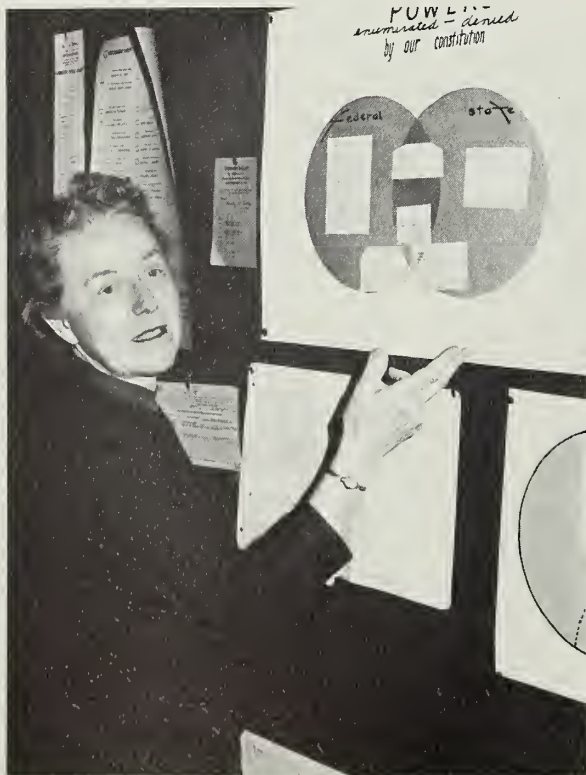
