

The enemy fled to Sheng Fang. Tei Lin was destroyed, but the large neighboring eity, Ching Hai, was spared, on condi-tion that Mr. Green, a missionary at Hase Nan Hsien, would be brought in safety to Tien Tšin. The mudarin ac-cepted the conditions. Shen Fang, 30 cepted the conditions. Shen Fang, 30 miles distant, is the last of the Boxers' strongholds near Tien Tsin."
