at six o'clock a. m., for the following purposes, viz: To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting and all other meetings to be held under this warrant.

To choose by ballot the following town officers for the ensuing year, viz: Town Clerk, three Selectmen, one Assessor for three years, one Overseer of the Poor for three years, one School Committee for three years, Highway Surveyor for one year, two trustees of Flint Public Library for three years, Constable for one year, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, three Fence Viewers, Tree Warden, Superintendent of Burials, Janitor for Town Hall and one Water Commissioner for three years.

Also on the same ballot to give in their votes, "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following question: Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?

The Polls will be opened at six o'clock a. m. and may be closed at 2.30 p. m.

You are hereby required to notify and warn said qualified inhabitants to meet subsequently, at the Town Hall on Wednesday, March 5, 1913 at 7.30 o'clock p. m., for the following purposes, viz:

ART. 1. To choose such other town officers as are required to be chosen annually.

ART. 2. To see what action the Town will take in regard to defraying town expenses the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to enforcing the liquor law.

ART. 4. To see what action the Town will take in regard to interest on taxes.

ART 5. To see if the Town will vote to require the Highway Surveyor to provide a suitable quantity of sand and use the same on the sidewalks when covered with ice.

ART. 6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to compensation of Tax Collector.

ART. 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to letting the Town Hall.

ART. 8. To see what measures the Town will adopt for the removal of snow from the sidewalks.

ART. 9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to hiring money to meet current expenses the coming year.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Collector to use all means of collecting the taxes which Town Treasurer, when appointed, may use.

ART. 11. On petition of Amos T. Stocker and eleven others, to see if the Town will vote to extend the water pipe on Boston Street and appropriate money therefor.

## Report of the School Committee

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*To the Citizens of Middleton and the Secretary of State  
Board of Education:*

The School Committee is pleased to report in regard to the character of the schools that the high standard of previous years has been successfully and intelligently maintained.

At this time we would again take the opportunity to urge upon the parents of the pupils a continuance of their interest in the school. In this connection it may be well to call attention to a very excellent movement which was started early in the year by the formation of the Middleton Public School Association, an organization of ladies and gentlemen with the purpose of assisting in the maintenance and improvement of the standard of efficiency of our schools. We firmly believe that this association can be a great factor in helping keep our school where it belongs, at the head.

### Teachers

At the opening of the school term in September we were confronted with two vacancies in our corps of teachers, Miss Eva A. Fuller, who had been acting temporarily in charge of our eighth and ninth grades, decided not to remain. To fill this vacancy the Committee was very fortunate in securing the return to Middleton of Miss C. Alice Manning to take up her former work which she had so successfully performed in the past and concerning which our citizens had always held the highest opinions.

Miss Bertha M. Sperry, who had had charge of the sixth and seventh grades for about three years, resigned in June to

accept a position in the schools of the city of Beverly. Miss Sperry was ever conscientious, faithful and intelligent in the discharge of her duties, well liked by her pupils and their parents and her departure from our school was sincerely regretted by all.

To fill this vacancy the Committee selected Miss Carrie E. Knight, a Middleton girl, graduate of the Salem Normal School and highly recommended. We feel that our choice of Miss Knight was a happy one and that her success in her home town will be satisfactory alike to her townspeople and herself.

Later in the year Miss Richardson, chosen to fill the position temporarily held by Miss Mahan in charge of the fourth and fifth grades, was obliged to temporarily relinquish her position on account of illness and her place is being efficiently taken by Mrs. A. F. Henderson of this town.

The opening of the fall term saw one other change, this time in the position of teacher of music. In this position Mrs. Kimball takes the place of Mr. Henry L. Stone. This change was carefully considered before it was made and we feel sure that the new teacher will be able to demonstrate that we made no mistake.

Miss Solomon continues to do satisfactory work as teacher of drawing.

## Transportation

The question of transportation of the children by barges was considered very carefully. We were unanimous in the opinion that the system which had been in vogue was unsatisfactory and the equipment entirely inadequate. With this in mind and after going over the matter very carefully a set of specifications covering transportation, equipment to be used, maximum length of time for any child to be on the road, provision of robes for cold weather, etc., was drawn up and bids on the same were invited. Three bids were received from three

different parties in town and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder. The cost is somewhat larger than it has been in the past but the Committee is satisfied that the equipment is proper, that the contractor is living up to the terms of his agreement and that the children are being brought to school with the minimum of both discomfort and expenditure of time.

### Superintendent

Mr. Harvey R. Williams, our district Superintendent, continues to discharge his duties with benefit to the school and credit to himself. The towns of Topsfield and Lynnfield have been added to the district in the past year, making five towns in all, Wenham and Essex being the others beside Middleton.

In conclusion we would again extend our sincere thanks to Superintendent, teachers and parents for the spirit of genuine co-operation which has been of great value in maintaining the present high standard of our school.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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*To the School Committee of Middleton  
Gentlemen:*

I have the honor to submit my third annual report of the condition and progress of the Middleton schools.

It is a pleasure to record the same hearty co-operation during the past year that has characterized the work and administration of the school department in previous years. All have seemed to work for one united purpose, the highest efficiency of the schools, which means the greatest good for all the children. Such hearty co-operation is a constant source of encouragement in the responsibility of supervision.

### Teachers

Your committee has noted the changes in the teaching force and I wish simply to emphasize what has already been said, that the teachers at present are easily maintaining the same high standard of efficiency that has characterized the work of the schools in Middleton in past years. They are always ready and glad to receive suggestions and are to be highly commended for their promptness in using such suggestions for the betterment of the schools.

### Attendance

The good attendance noted in my last report was still better for the year 1911-12. Tardiness decreased from 255 to 106 and dismissals from 94 to 67. The fall term had the best record in recent years. The poor attendance is now confined to a very few pupils and their parents should realize that they



are depriving their children of advantages which can never be made up to them after they have passed the time when the school can no longer be of service to them.

### **Text Books and Supplies**

The only change in text books during the past year was the addition of new spellers in place of those that were worn beyond further usefulness, and a set of music books for the grammar school. Realizing that teachers can do little work without things to do with, the committee is always ready to supply such material as is needed to carry on all departments of the work successfully. The willingness of the committee to supply the schools so well with text books and appliances arises also from the further fact that the teachers and children exercise the utmost care in the use of the books and economy in the use of supplies. The children are taught that they must respect public property and use carefully whatever is loaned to them.

### **Free Industrial Schools**

It may be well for boys and girls over fourteen years of age to know that they may attend any of the new Industrial schools in Massachusetts at the expense of the Commonwealth.

Section 7 of Chapter 471, Acts of 1911, says:

Art. 1. Any resident of any city or town in Massachusetts which does not maintain an approved independent industrial, agricultural or household arts school, offering the type of training which he desires, may make application for admission to such a school maintained by another city or town. The board of education, whose decision shall be final, may approve or disapprove such application. In making such a decision the board of education shall take into consideration the opportunities for free vocational training in the community in which the applicant resides; the financial status of the community; the age, sex, preparation, aptitude and previous record of the applicant;

and all other relevant circumstances. Art. 2. The city or town in which the person resides, who has been admitted as above provided, to an approved independent industrial, agricultural or household arts school maintained by another city or town, shall pay such tuition fee as may be fixed by the board of education; and the commonwealth shall reimburse such city or town, as provided for in this act. If any city or town neglects or refuses to pay for such tuition, it shall be liable therefor in an action of contract to the city or town, or cities and towns, maintaining the school which the pupil, with the approval of the said board, attended.

The most available of the sixteen free industrial schools in the state for residents of Middleton are the Beverly Industrial School (for boys), the Boston School of Printing and Bookbinding (for boys and girls), the Boston Trade School for Girls and Lawrence Industrial School (for boys and girls).

Circulars describing the courses given in these schools may be obtained upon request.

### Home Gardens

Through the kindness of Cong. A. P. Gardner and in cooperation with Prof. Hart of the Amherst Agricultural College, hundreds of packages of seeds, potatoes, corn and beans, were given to the children last spring for their home gardens.

The exhibits of "Home Garden" products at the Topsfield Fair and the prizes awarded them showed that the home garden movement was a success. But to make this work of the most value to the children, there should be some plan for following up the work during the summer and giving the children help and encouragement at the time when they most need such help and encouragement. Some new plans are being formulated by the State College for the coming season and we very much hope that some way may be found to second those plans and carry them forward to most successful results.

### School Record System

There is in use in all but one of the towns of this district a card record system. This system consists of an "Admission, Discharge and Promotion" card for each pupil in the schools, which follows him through his entire course and contains important data concerning his attendance, standing and progress in every grade and room through which he passes. There is also a duplicate "Office Record" card in the hands of the superintendent. This card is kept up to date by means of reports from the teachers on a third card for that purpose. The "Office Record" card remains in the hands of the superintendent after the pupil has been graduated or has left school and to it may be added any important data concerning his after life. A little work in keeping track of the pupils who go out from our schools would furnish for this record much information that might be of value in later years.

We are also keeping a progressive card record of the results of the sight and hearing tests from year to year and duplicate card record of all text books used in the schools. Each teacher has in her room a set of cards, one card for each set of books giving the number of books in each set in the room, and the superintendent has duplicates of these cards giving, in addition to the number of books, the condition of all books. When any new books are added to the lists or books are transferred from room to room the cards are changed, thus revising the record to date.

### Course of Study

There has been but little change in the course of study since the last annual report was made. The course in Civics has been made more practical by the use of Dunn's Community and Citizen, a book introduced last year. The purpose of this work is to interest the pupils in the immediate life of the community rather than to give them so many facts about the structure of the State and National governments, which properly belong to the work of the high school.

### Manual Work

During the past year, the teachers of the intermediate and grammar grades have carried on most successfully much work in manual arts. To show the extent and variety of this work the following lists are given as prepared by the teachers:

## Fourth and Fifth grades

## Clay modelling

- Hemisphere Bowl, cup, bell.
- Cylinder Windmill, mallett, firecracker
- Cube Basket, house, etc.
- Relief Maps North America, United States.

## Loom Work

- 4 Jute mats different designs.
- Rag Rug by weaving strips of cloth or braided strips.

## Raffia Baskets.

- Sewing Stitches baste, backstitch, running and overcasting.
- Articles made Small aprons.

## Sixth and Seventh grades

## Wood Whittling

- Made garden sticks, key rings and paper knives.

## Raffia Baskets and doll hats

- Sewing Baste, running and hemstitches in making aprons.

Note. These pupils have not had the work now being given in the grade below.

## Eighth and Ninth grades

- Wood Bookracks and paper knives with original designs, table work baskets, frame for burlap for work display in primary room.

- Sewing Review all stitches, cutting and making sewing aprons.

Reed and raffia baskets.

It has been suggested that instead of having the music supervisor every week we have a lesson once in two weeks and a teacher of sewing be secured for the alternate weeks. I am in sympathy with this suggestion and recommend that the committee take the matter under consideration before the opening of another year. With this plan the sewing teacher could instruct the girls and the regular teacher could give her time to the boys, increasing the value of the work to both boys and girls.

### **The School Building**

I wish to call attention to some very pressing needs in the school building, and the most important is the matter of seats and desks. I have found that in the sixth and seventh grades the seats and desks are the same as were used when the fourth and fifth grade were in that room. They are much too small for the children that occupy them now and are wholly unsuited to the needs of the present time. The building should be refurnished with modern adjustable desks and seats. This could be done by fitting up one room a year and the expense would not be large. In the second place, the room now occupied by the fourth and fifth grades has exceedingly poor light. There is practically no light from the left of the children, the direction from which most of the light *should* come. There should be at least two more windows in this room and the seats should be changed so as to receive the light largely from the left.

Again, in a building of four rooms with two on the second floor, there should be an effective fire alarm bell and fire drills should be established. There should also be other signal bells. This bell system would be very inexpensive as it could be installed by the boys with very little help.

The janitor of this school is to be highly commended for the efficient service performed by him. He spares no pains to keep the building neat and clean and is always ready to render assistance to the teachers when needed.



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### In Closing

In conclusion I wish to express my highest appreciation of the support given me by the school committee, the co-operation of the teachers and children and the manifest interest of all the parents and citizens in the work of the schools.
