Historical—Robert Cavalier de La Salle discovered the the Ohio kiver in 1670, on a journey of adventure, and followed its course to where Louisville now stands. In 1679 he sailed along the shore of Ohio on Lake Erie, on his way to the Mississippi Valley. In 1682 La Salle vested in France the title of the Mississippi Valley by discovery, Ohio became a French possession and remained such until the Treaty of Paris in 1673, when it became a territory of Great Britain. Ohio was the pioneer state of the old Northwest Territory, which embraced also what are now the States of Michigan.

which embraced also what are now the States of Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, and the northeast corner of

Minnesota, formed in 1786.

The first permanent settlement within the State was at Marietta, in 1788, by representatives of the National government, and colonists from Massachusetts. Cincinnati was founded about December 28, 1788, by Mathias Denman and 15 associates. Late in 1790 Gallipolis was settled. Chillicothe was founded in 1796, and on the 26th of July 1796, Gen. Moses Cleaveland, agent for the Connecticut Land Company, with 52 Connecticut emigrants laid out the chief settlement of the Western Reserve at the mouth of the Cuyahoga River, and called it Cleveland. the present boundaries of Obio were fixed, with the excep-

the present boundaries of Obio were fixed, with the exception of the northern, which was settled in 1836. Ohio became a State early in 1803, and was the seventeenth state to enter the Union. The capital was temporarily at Marietta, 1787, Cincinnati, 1799, Chillicothe, 1800, Zanesville, 1810, and permanently at Columbus since December 2, 1816.

The first church was erected in 1790 at Columbia. The first newspaper "The Sentinel of the Northwest Territory" was printed at Cincinnati, by Wm. Maxwell, November 9, 1793. The first blast furnace was operated in Mahoning County, and coal was first mined in Summit County in 1810. The first steamboat to navigate the Ohio River was launched The first steamboat to navigate the Ohio River was launched at Pittsburgh, 1810, called the New Orleans making trips between Cincinnati and Louisville. Ohio played an important part in the second war with England, 1812, especially through Oliver H. Perry, on Lake Erie, who destroyed English supremacy upon the northern lakes forever. In 1825 the State of Ohio began the construction of her canal system. The dispute between Michigan and Ohio over the northern boundary line involved a strip of land the whole northern boundary line involved a strip of land the whole length of the northern Ohio boundary, five miles wide at the west and over eight miles at the east end. It was finally terminated in favor of Ohio by Congress in June, 1836. During the Civil War in 1863, Ohio responded to Presidents Lincoln's call for troops magnificently. Of the Presidents of the United States eight were either born in Ohio or were residents of the State.

Ohio was visited by disastrous floods in 1913, the Miami and Scioto valleys suffering most. The soldiers and sailors of Ohio bore their part in the World War with heroism and

Area and Physical Features—Ohio, an east north central state, lies between latitudes 38° 37′ and 41° 57′ north, and between longitudes 80° 34' and 84° 49' west, and ranks 35th in gross area of the United States. Its total area is 41,040 square miles, of which 40,740 is land and 300 is water. The maximum length, north and south, is 205 miles; breadth, east and west, is 230 miles. Ohio has 88 counties.

The general surface is an undulating plain, divided into five main parts. The northern and northwestern portion is an old, almost completely level lake plain. The central and west portion consists of an elevated, undulating to rolling plateau land, the entire region covered with glacial drift and strewn with bowlders carried there by the ancient glaciers. Southeast and east is an unglaciated strip deeply dissected by a network of valleys and divided from the glaciated district by the terminal moraine, a deposit left by the glacier along its entire front and unmistakably marking the farthest extent of its advance. In the northeast is a gently rolling to hilly area, the border of the Appalachian Plateau. In the extreme southwest is a small loess-covered area on a thinly glaciated upland. Frontage on Lake Erie 230 miles; on Ohio River, 436 miles. The Muskingum River is navigable for 100 miles. The average elevation of the State above the sea is about 850 feet. Highest elevation, Hogue's Hill, 11/2 miles east of Bellefontaine, 1,540 feet; lowest, the shore of the Ohio River near Cincinnati.

Chief rivers are: Ohio, Muskingum, Miami, Little Miami, Scioto, Cuyahoga, Hocking, Maumee, and Mahoning. Ashtabula, Cleveland, Sandusky and Toledo all have good harbors on Lake Erie. There are no large lakes in Ohio, but several small ones are in Summit County, and there are a few large reservoirs in the west central section of the State.

Climate—The climate of northern Ohio is modified by Lake Erie, but colder by several degrees than the southern. Great extremes in temperature occur, but neither excessive heat nor cold is of long duration. The mean temperature of the State for July is 73, for January 26; the maximum temperature is 105, and the minimum 17. Rainfall is evenly distributed, and the annual average is 38.3 inches. Prevailing winds are westerly in most parts but at Cleveland vailing winds are westerly in most parts, but at Cleveland and Cincinnati the winds blow mostly from the southeast. The climate of the State on the whole is remarkably healthful.

Soil—The soil of a large part of the State is the deposit of the drift, and is very fertile. In the southeastern part it is composed of the decomposed sub-rock structure; there is considerable limestone in the east central section, and also in the west. The Great and Little Miami River valleys are

covered with alluvial deposits.

Agriculture—Ohio ranks high as an agricultural State. Of the entire land area, 26,073,600 acres, over nine-tenths is in farms; improved land in farms, 18,542,353 acres; woodland in farms, 3,198,929 acres; and other unimproved land in farms, 1,774,606 acres. Average acreage per farm, 91.6; average improved acreage per farm 72.2. The highest values are found in the west and north. Value of all farm property in the State \$3,095,666,336; land, \$2,015,112,999; buildings, \$646,322,950; implements and machinery, \$146,575,269; live

\$646,322,950; implements and machinery, \$146,575,269; live stock, \$287,655,118. Average value per farm, all farm property \$12,060; land, \$7,850; buildings, \$2,518; implements and machinery \$571; live stock \$1,121.

Ohio ranked sixth in cereal production in 1919. Over three-fifths of the total value of crops in the State is contributed by the cereals: over one-fifth by hay and forage; and less than one-tenth by potatoes and other vegetables. Production and value of crops are as follows: corn, 149,844,626 bushels, \$217,274,709; oats, 46,818,330 bushels, \$39,795-590; wheat, 58,124,351 bushels, \$127,873,574; barley, 2,412,196 bushels, \$3,256,468; rye, 1,666,449 bushels, \$2,582,-991; buckwheat, 640,662 bushels, \$993,034; mixed crops, 36,049 bushels, \$48,669; dry edible beans, 16,792 bushels, \$105,799; soy beans, 17,441 bushels, \$100,297; dry peas, 11,254 bushels, \$53,462; sugar-beet seed, 34,867 lbs., \$17,434; clover, timothy and other grass seeds, 309,968 bushels, \$5,-978,760; hay and forage, 7,661,890 tons, \$130,187,929;

potatoes, 7,513,960 bushels, \$17,657,811; sweet potatoes and yams, 224,774 bushels, \$528,225. The remainder is largely made up by tobacco, sugar beets, maple sugar, and broomcorn. Corn leads the cereals in quantity. Others are wheat, oats, rye, barley, and buckwheat. Tobacco amounted to nearly 64,500,000 pounds, valued at over \$13,528,000 in 1919. Timothy is the leading hay crop, 1919, \$3,682,781 tons.

Horticulture—In 1919 the following orchard fruit crops were produced. Apples. 2,976,436 bushels, \$6,845,811; peaches, 617,537 bushels, \$1,821,740; pears, 157,492 bushels, \$393.755; cherries, 149,911 bushels, \$584,663; plums and prunes, 84,602 bushels, \$245,347. Grapes, 41,722,796 pounds, \$2,920,600: Nuts, 622 pounds, \$177. Small fruits: strawberries, 7,165,957 quarts, \$1,361,527; raspberries and loganberries, 2,773,819 quarts, \$610,242; blackberries and dewberries, 1,481,447 quarts, \$281,476; currants, 431,152 quarts, \$86,231; other berries, 110,753 quarts, \$19,903. Grapes are grown chiefly in counties of Lake Erie; here also is grown over 90 per cent of the State's peach crop. Principal apple sections are in southeast part of the State, along the Ohio River, and in the northeastern counties; Lawrence County is noted for its Rome Beauty apples.

Forests and Forest Products—Ohio was once entirely covered with a dense hardwood forest. Most of this has been cut away to satisfy commercial demands. Of the trees remaining, the white oak is most common. Those now being cut are chiefly oak, walnut, beech, maple, yellow poplar, elm, ash, hickory, basswood, and sycamore. Forests occupy about 23 per cent of the total area of the State, or about

9,300 square miles.

Live Stock—Stock-raising is an important branch of agriculture in Ohio; and great attention is paid to pure-bred stock of horses, dairy cattle, sheep, and swine. Fisheries and Game—Fishing in Lake Erie is a very important industry; pike, perch, trout, and herring are the chief catches. Excellent hook and line fishing in streams and interior lakes—the latter largely artificial, once a part of the canal system, largest being St. Mary's Reservoir (about 16,000 acres). Game birds and animals increasing through restocking and protective measures to conserve wild life.

State has about 50 wild life sanctuaries.

Manufactures—Ohio is a State of exceptional industrial prominence. This is mainly due to the many natural resources, particularly the agricultural richness, supplemented by abundant supplies of fuel, coal. gas, oil, and hardwood

lumber, and excellent lake transportation, as well as railroads. The State ranks fourth in value of manufactured products

in the Union.

The leading industries in Ohio, 1919 were as follows: Iron and steel, steel works and rolling mills; rubber tires. tubes, and rubber goods; foundry and machine shop products; automobiles; iron and steel blast furnaces; slaughtering and meat packing; electrical machinery apparatus and supplies; cars and general shop construction and repairs by steamcars and general shop construction and repairs by steam-railroad companies; automobile bodies and parts; flour mill and grist mill products, bread and other bakery products; boots and shoes; machine tools; printing and publishing newspapers and periodicals; men's clothing; ship building, steel, new vessels and repair work; paper and wood pulp; women's clothing; coke; food preparations; petroleum refining; engines, steam, gas, and water; structural iron work, not made in steel works or rolling mills; butter; printing and publishing, book and job; confectionery and ice cream; paints; glass; furniture; chemicals; lumber and lumber products; brick and tile, and terra products; tobacco; pottery; and agricultural implements. and agricultural implements.

The great industrial cities of Ohio are Cleveland, Cincinnati. Youngstown, Akron, Toledo, Dayton, Columbus, Lorain, Canton, Sandusky, Steubenville, Springfield, Hamilton, Middleboro, Bellaire, Norwood, Zanesville, Ironton, and East Liverpool. Dayton is noted for its manufactures of cash registers, calculating machines, and aeroplanes; Cleveland, Youngstown, Bellaire, Steubenville, Lorain and Ironton for iron and steel; most of the automobiles are manufactured in Cleveland; East Liverpool leads in the pottery industry; rubber and elastic goods come from Akron; men's clothing and tobacco from Cincinnati; flour and grist mill products from Toledo; agricultural implements from Springfield.

In 1919 Ohio had 16,125 establishments, 882,918 persons engaged in manufactures, of whom 730,733 were wage earners. The establishments used 2,897,497 primary horse-power, with a capital of \$3,748,743,996, and paid wages amount to \$944,651,734; materials, \$2,911,947,871. The value of products totaled \$5,100,308,728 and value added by

manufacture, \$2,188,360,857.

Minerals—The mineral resources of Ohio are extensive, and have aided much in the rapid progress of the State's industrial development. The coal fields cover an area of about 12,500 square miles; there is considerable iron ore in the State. Petroleum and gas are produced, and there are many sandstone and limestone quarries. Other products are salt, clay for pottery, brick and tile, lime, grindstone, pulpstones, oilstones, scythestones and mineral waters. The State ranks seventh in value of mineral products for 1919 and fourth in total number of persons engaged in the mining industries. The gross value of mineral products in 1919 was \$134,518,505. Ohio ranked fourth among the States in value of products of coal mines, output 35,050,000 short tons, valued at \$77,988,602. The State ranked seventh in the production of petroleum and natural gas in 1919, output valued at \$42,390,958. Ohio ranked second in both limestone and sandstone industries; value of limestone products, \$6,742,496, and of sandstone, \$2,759,352.

Transportation and Commerce-Ohio is splendidly furnished with transportation facilities. Railroads are well developed, many of the great transcontinental lines traversing the State. It ranks sixth in steam railway mileage, having 9,520 miles in operation, January 1922. Ohio is third in rank in electric railway mileage, having 4,214 miles in operation, January, 1922. Two canals are within the State, one from Cleveland to Portson other from Toledo to Cincinnati, connect Lake Erie and the Ohio River. The

great lake ports are Cleveland, Sandusky, and Toledo, and the Ohio River port is Cincinnati. The value of domestic commerce passing through these ports is enormous and

increasing annually.

There are 31,800 miles of surfaced public roads in Ohio; motor bus transporation is in operation between all large centers of population. The most important public highways are the Dixie Highway, the Yellowstone Trail, Lincoln Highway, National Old Trails and Pike's Peak Ocean to

Ocean Highway.

Education—In 1785 the Continental Congress set apart one square mile in every township for school purposes. public school system was established in 1825. Education is compulsory for children between the ages of eight and four-teen. In 1920 the number attending school, was, 703,560 of ages from 7 to 13 inclusive; 14 and 15 years, 162,380; 16 and 17 years, 82,659; and 18 and 20 years, inclusive, 40,818. Teachers, 35,152; salaries of teachers, \$24,370,894; total expenditures, \$50,498,015.

Public schools in Ohio the last year reported, 10,908; high schools, 1,007, Public Normal schools, 25, Higher institutions of learning number 44 universities and colleges. Ohio University, at Athens; University of Cincinnati, at Cincinnati; Case School of Applied Science, and Western Reserve University, at Cleveland; Ohio State University, at Columbus; Ohio Wesleyan University, at Delaware; Miami University, at Oxford; Toledo University, at Toledo; Oberlin, at Oxford; There are many private and parish schools in the Oberlin. There are many private and parish schools in the State.

Religion—The membership of the various denominations in Ohio as last reported was as follows: Baptists, 105,753; Brethren, 11,944; Christian Church, 26,123; Church of Christ, 9,004; Congregationalists, 45,606; Disciples of Christ, 109,732; Evangelical Association, 18,029; Friends, 12,228; German Evangelical Synod, 40,458; Jewish Congregations, 20,151; Lutherans, 161,253; Methodists, 435,823; Presbyterians, 160,413; Protestant Episcopal, 47,175; Reformed, 56,101; Roman Catholic, 843,856; United Breth Reformed, 56,101; Roman Catholic, 843,856; United Brethren, 75,852; and all others, 112,952. Number of Sunday Schools for the State, 9,312; officers and teachers, 125,987;

scholars, 1,349,765.

Political—The government of the State is administered by the legislative, executive and the judicial departments. The Legislature consists of a Senate of 37 members and a House of Representatives of 125 members, both Houses being elected for two years. Sessions biennial, in even-numbered years. The Governor is elected for two years, and receives a salary of \$10,000. The State is represented in Congress by two Senators and 22 Representatives. Qualified as electors are all citizens 21 years of age who have resided in the State one year, in the county 30 days, in the town or city 20 days, and in the election district, precinct or ward 20 days Persons disquaified as electors (other than felons, idiots and insane) are U. S. soldiers and sailors. Voters are obliged to

Insane) are U. S. soldiers and sailors. Voters are obliged to register as required by law, in cities of 9,000 or over.

Legal—Statute of limitations: Judgments, 21 years: notes, 15 years: open accounts, 6 years. Legal rate of interest, 6 per cent: rate allowed by contract, 8.

Banks and Finances-Several private banking institutions were instituted before 1813; about 25 banks were established between 1816 and 1837. The State Bank of Ohio was chartered in 1845, which in 1863 with its branches, became

national banks, In 1929, Ohio had 1,145 banks (private, national and state), with deposits of \$1,828,463,000. United States postal savings banks in Ohio, June 30, 1920, had \$6,104,267 on deposit; building and loan associations, 692; 824,275 members, and \$381,478,703 assets.

Population—Ohio ranked fourth in the 1920 Census.



The State ranked 18th in 1800; 13th in 1810; 5th in 1820; 4th in 1830; 3d from 1840 to 1880; and 4th since 1890. The per cent of increase ranged from 408.7 in 1810 to 30.3 in 1850; 13.2 in 1900; 14.7 in 1910; and 20.8 in 1920. Ohio has 80 cities, of which Cleveland, with a population of 796,841 is the largest. Seven cities have more than 100,000 inhabitants each. Of these, Akron shows by far the greatest rate of growth during the past


decade, having more than trebled its population.

Urban population is that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population is that residing outside such incorporated places. The proportion of the population of Ohio living in places of 2,500 or more increased from 48.1 per cent in 1900, to 55.9 per cent in 1910, and to 63.8 per cent in 1920. The population in towns and villages of less than 2,500 inhabitants was 10.0 per cent of total population in 1900, decreased to 9.5 per cent in 1910, and to 8.2 per cent in 1920. Other rural territory was 41.9 per cent of total population in 1900, decreased to 34.6 per cent in 1910 and to 27.9 per cent in No changes in county boundaries have occurred since 1851. There were 151 Indians, 941 Chinese and 130 Japanese in Ohio in 1920. Further 1920 figures are: 2,955,980 male; 2,803,414 female; 4,893,196 native white; 678,697 foreign born white; 186,187 negroes; 814,114 under 7 years of age; 7 to 13 years inclusive, 732,550; 14 and 15 years 185,015; 16 and 17 years, 186,142; 18 to 20 years inclusive, 283,092; males over 21 years, 1,847,319; females over 21 years, 1,711,-162; illiterates, 131,006.
