Four FM-2s of VC-88, piloted by Lt. E. M. PECK and Ensigns W. G. HANCE, R. L. CANNON and E. W. SCHNIDER, on 29 March 1945, were assigned the mission of supporting UDT operations on southeastern beaches of Okinawa Shima. Eight VT of VC-87 participated in these operations. Cruisers and a battleship were shelling the beaches in the vicinity of B361. The planes flew up and down the beach area strafing and rocketing all targets of opportunity, particularly at Makape in 7658 and Kamescu in 7657. The VT attacked farther north on the beaches.

The planes flew below the overcast which was at 500 feet, often just off the ground. At the conclusion of the attack the CASCU controlling reported to the pilots that the job had been well done.
