Without this we have no right here. And we have the privilege until He comes. Now we will go along further, into the future.

"This memorial is to be celebrated forever, through eternity. Now, we are right here; but we are going to celebrate it in the future in heaven. These other duties and functions end; but we will never be at the end of this, the memorial of the lamb that was slain.

"If this be the very last question I may ask you, I ask this: My brother, are you sheltered in the blood?"
