Manitoba Gold Strike Said to Be Record One

The Pas, Man., June 13.—(Canadian Press)—Additional information received here concerning the gold strike at Elbow Lake leads to the belief from the surface showings that the largest gold re body on the continent has been uncovered.

The dyke has been stripped of overburden for 350 feet in length and for 50 feet in width without encountering the walls in which gold is freely deposited throughout. The outcropping near the waters' edge, where the discovery was made, has developed into a rich pocket of gold which gradually lessens in quantity back to the discovery post, 350 feet away, where the body disappears under a heavy overburden.

The body is in a green stone formation and the mineralisation is in porphyry with quartz stringers. An attractive feature about this strike is the evident continuity of free gold for the length and width of the dyke, starting from the gold pocket where specimens were dug out with a gold volume of 55 per cent. The dyke, as uncovered, revealed small particles fairly regularly all along. A few shots were put in nearer the discovery post and the insterial shot out also contained free gold.

LEAGUE MEETING IN SEPTEMBER

The Assembly Will Consider Numerous Ouestions

Numerous Questions

Geneva, June 13.—The most important single problem that will be considered at the Second Assembly of the League of Nations called for September 5 is the establishment of the Permanent Court of International Justice.

The statutes of the court which were adopted by the First Assembly have now been signed by thirty-three states and are in process of ratification by members of the League.

While this is regarded as the most important subject, the provisional programme of the meeting which has Just been distributed to all Governments which are members of the League consists of twenty-five items. Among them are amendments to the Covenant, reduction of armaments, the request of Bolivia for mediation in her dispute with Chile, and the appointment of four non-permanent members of the Council.

Reports will, be received from technical organizations of the League such as those dealing with the suppression of the nopium traffic, the traffic in women and children, communications and transit, international health, registration of treaties, the economic blockade and the allocation of expenditures of the League.

INDUSTRIAL

LOSSES IN ITALY

Rome, June 13.—Italy lost 55,000,000 days of work last year because of strikes, according to figures just published by the Ministry of Labor. This figure includes labor disorders of every kind wage disputes, loss occasioned by the occupation of the factories by workmen from last July to September, and disorders in the farming districts.

Wage disputes caused the major part of the loss, with 16,500,000 days. The Communist agitations of last year when the factories were occupied are calculated to have resulted in 10,000,000 lost days. Political strikes and other suspensions, not included in the other classes, are said to have lost 15,500,000 days.

The textile workers engaged in 212 strikes, the largest number in any trade, throwing out of work nearly 150,000 workmen. The most costly dispute was that of the transportation workers, who had 137 strikes, affecting 241,358 workmen and losing 2,523,057 days of work.
