LEAGUE MEETING IN SEPTEMBER

Geneva, June 12.—The most important single problem that will be considered at the Second Assembly of the League of Nations called for September 5 is the establishment of the Permanent Court of International Justice. The statutes of the court which were adopted by the First Assembly have now been signed by thirty-three states and are in process of ratification by members of the League.

INDUSTRIAL LOSSES IN ITALY

Rome, June 12.—Italy lost 55,000,000 days of work last year because of strikes, according to figures just published by the Ministry of Labor. This figure includes labor disorders of every kind—wage disputes, loss of work by the occupation of the factories by workmen from last July to September, and disorders in the farming districts.

DEATH LIST IN IRELAND GROWS

Buildings in County Clare Were Burned
Belfast, June 12.—The question is being widely raised in Belfast as to whether the killings here over the week-end will interfere with the visit of King George to participate in the state opening of the Ulster Parliament on June 25. The series of tragedies during the week-end eclipsed in savagery any previous shootings. The victims included an aged clergyman and three young business men. The latter being found dead in the northern section of the city.

Rev. James Finlay, of Bawn Bay, County Cavan, eighty years old, former Dean of Leighlin, who had been a clergyman since 1867, on answering a knock at his door Saturday night, was confronted by a number of masked men. Without parley they took him outside, shot him dead and then battered his head to a pulp and buried his residence.

John Lucey was shot dead by crown forces here last night for failing to answer a challenge after the curfew hour. A shoemaker named Fitzgibbon was taken from his home in Lisacarril, Cork, by armed men and shot to death. The usual curfew notice was pinned to the body forbidding its removal.

Dublin, June 12.—An outbreak of arson occurred in the Scariff district, County Clare, Saturday. Several houses and the Scariff district workhouse and the Galley Head and King Bar coastguard stations were burned to the ground. The damage exceeds £100,000.

Belfast, June 12.—Sharp rioting occurred in the York Street area here yesterday, resulting in one man being shot in the stomach and thirteen others wounded. The disturbances began Saturday evening between a few persons and rapidly spread until both factions received reinforcements. During the rioting many bricks were thrown and revolver shots were common. A bomb thrown by one of the rioters blew off a man's hand and severely injured a woman. The police then fired a volley of shots among the rioters, finally clubbing the mob into quietness and dispersed them.

London, June 12.—A dispatch to the Press Association from Dublin today said that an American man, thirty-five, said to be an American navy pensioner, was shot to death yesterday evening at Lisacul, near Castle Reagh, by crown forces.

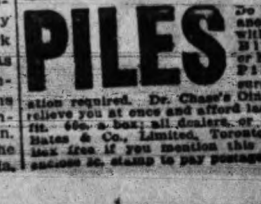

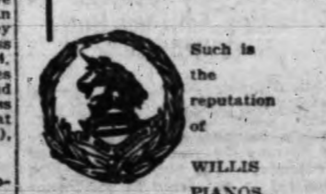

**CLASSIC LEGEND
IN MODERN TONGUE**

Danae, or The Birth of Perseus

(By George J. Dyke)
Part II.

"Now lies the earth all Danae to the stars,
And all thy heart lies open unto me."
—Tennyson.

In the issue of June 6 of this newspaper was given the object in presenting this article, conjointly embodying some thoughts on Greek mythology and the importance and special fondness of the Greek people in personifying the powers of Nature. The present chapter recounts the myth of the birth of Perseus and his first peculiar adventure when an infant. It sets forth also a brief synopsis as to "who's who" among the gods, goddesses and mortals, etc., mentioned in the translation of the pastoral play to be produced here at the end of this month.

Myth of the Birth
Akrisios was the king who ruled over Argos, an important centre in the south of Greece. He was told by an oracle that the son of his daughter, beautiful Princess Danae, would be the means of his death. To circumvent the prophecy he ordered a tower of brass to be built in which Danae was to be imprisoned and shut off from all human intercourse, but the scheme failed; for some say the maiden was corrupted by her uncle Proteus, while others claim that Jupiter, looking down from Olympus, saw Danae and, loving her, changed his form to a shower of gold and shone into the apartment of the captive girl.

Where no love was, loved a shower."

When she had given birth to a son, whom she called Perseus because of

his beauty, her father the king (briefly told in Part I) gave orders to place his daughter and her infant in a chest and sent adrift in the sea. But fortunately the chest drifted to the island of Seraphus and was dragged ashore by Dictys, a fisherman, and brother of Polydectes, the king of the island. Here Perseus, the golden-haired, grew to manhood and here made his first appearance in games and combats. In the meanwhile Polydectes had fallen in love with Danae, but the princess did not return his affections and would not consent to marriage. Becoming angry, he incurred the wrath of young

Perseus, who had now become quite capable of defending his mother, and, returning from a perilous journey and hearing of the king's ill-treatment of his mother, he changed that importunate monarch into a stone. Dictys now became king in place of his brother and, expressing a desire to marry the maiden he had rescued from the waters, Danae gladly gave him her hand and heart.

Hero Returns
Perseus, the hero of many adventures, after an absence of many years, returned to his native Argos. Akrisios, apprehending that the oracle might now be fulfilled fled to

Gods, Goddesses and Mortals
Akrisios (mortal), king who ruled over Argos, important district in south of Greece.
Danae (mortal), only child of King Akrisios, mother of Perseus, and became wife of Dictys, ruler of island of Seraphus.
Hestia or Vesta (goddess), daughter of Cronus and Rhea, deity presiding over fire and the family hearth and guardian angel of mankind, was worshipped principally throughout Italy and has shrines in Greece and Asia Minor. Maidens serving Hestia were known as Vestals or Vestal Virgins.
Athena or Minerva (goddess), the goddess of wisdom; widely worshipped; was the offspring of Jupiter without a mother. She sprang from his head, full-grown, clad in glittering armor with poised spear and chanting a triumphant song of victory. She presides over peace, defensive war and navigation. Her favorite bird was the owl, and the plant sacred to her was the olive.
Pandora (mortal) was the first woman created by the gods as punishment in council on Mount Olympus. A peerless creature, every god contributed something to perfect her; Venus gave her beauty, Mercury persuasion, and Apollo music. Thus equipped she was conveyed to earth. Her curiosity to peep at the contents of a mysterious box, given her by the gods, caused to fly out all the diseases, sorrows, vices and crimes that afflict poor humanity.

Pythia (mortal), same as above priestess at the oracle of Apollo at Delphi, a city built on the slopes of Parnassus in Phocia.
Andromeda (mortal), daughter of Cepheus, king of the Ethiopians, and Cassiopeia, his queen. To atone for the vanity of her mother, the queen, who had dared to compare herself to the sea-nymphs, Princess Andromeda was chained to an overhanging rock to become the prey of a prodigious sea monster. But the hero Perseus, looking down from his aerial height, beheld the fair maiden in her fearful captivity and flew down and gave battle to the approaching monster, giving the brute its death blow amid the shouts of joy from the people who had gathered on the shore. Perseus now liberated the Princess from her chains, claiming her hand.

FROM THE PUBLIC LIBRARY SHELVES
Now that a number of the very latest books have arrived from London and New York, book lovers will welcome the inauguration of a system which will enable them to secure new works without delay, no matter how popular they may be. Under the new plan, which was brought into effect this week, library patrons may secure any book in great demand by paying a charge of five cents. Of course, other copies of these books will be on the library shelves for free distribution as well, but extra copies will be purchased for quick distribution to those who are in a hurry to get them. It is planned thus to make the extra copies pay for themselves in the course of a few months.

With such books as "The Mirrors of Downing Street," which has caused an international sensation, now available, the new system doubtless will be widely used in future. "The Mirrors of Downing Street," by the way, is written by an anonymous author who styles himself "A Gentleman With a Duster," and who, in a most intimate and confident style, proceeds to analyze fearlessly and sparingly the works and characters of many of Britain's foremost statesmen. So great was the interest caused by the publication of this book that press associations wired the world when it appeared. Certainly the "Gentleman with a Duster" spares Mr. Lloyd George, his colleagues and many others not at all, though the book is written with a singular lack of bitterness or prejudice.

"Main Street," by Sinclair Lewis, the book which, some critics seem to think, has marked a very important development in American literature, also is on the library shelves now along with two of the most striking of latest English works—"Potterism," by Rose Macaulay, and "The Silence of Colonel Bramble," by A. Maurand. The irrepressible Arnold Bennett's newest work, "Our Women," which has arrived at the Library, should prove a popular work. More serious books include two timely works on free trade, a subject of particular importance to Canadians at the present time.

A record of the most widely read books at the Library forms an interesting commentary on the literary taste of Victorians. The record for the past month should be rather encouraging to library up-lifters, for light fiction for the most part is

away down on the list. "The Top of the World," Margot Asquith's now famous—or perhaps rather notorious—diary and Sir Philip Gibbs' great war book, "Now It Can Be Told," are in front rank of the favorites. Owen Wister's "Square Deal," probably the strongest book on British-American relations which has appeared in this decade, also is widely popular. "Outlines of History," the work to which H. G. Wells devoted himself for the last few years, is being read by many for, though historical in character, it has the charm of a novel. Princess Eugenie's memoirs, with a work on Madame Tussaud's celebrated

**Turn Nineteen Boards
of Trade Into
Chambers of Commerce**

Efforts of the Merchants' Association of Montreal to expand its membership and strengthen its resources have directed attention again to a "growth of an idea" which is now exercising some influence at least clear across the Dominion. From St. John, N. B., to Victoria, B. C., the "idea" of uniting communities to perform the function which has been described as "teaching the public to think, and in transforming that thought into action."

The associations of citizens which are putting the "idea" at work are called by various names. The most general is the "Chamber of Commerce," having found favor in most of the communities which have adopted the "idea." That is to say, the former Board of Trade has become the Chamber of Commerce.

St. John Pioneered. Historically, the "idea" has had an interesting development in the Dominion. In 1813 the citizens of St. John began to think collectively for the promotion of the common welfare, though the form of organization fell far short of that which has been the outgrowth of more actual experience and the result of many more and less costly experiments. Five years elapsed before another Canadian community caught the vision in October, 1818, and the "idea" was transferred to London, Ont., where it was embodied in a Chamber of Commerce, and since that time eighteen other municipalities in Canada have followed the example.

A Challenge. In other words, the new organization is a definite suggestion of a change of name to one more inclusive of all business and professional men.
