

November 2, 1908 Genulemen: — Enclosed find photograph of Exhibit No. 1453, of Vegetables grown from Holmes' Seeds, at the Chemung County Agricultural Fair, in which I was awarded \$90.75 cash prizes. Enclosed premiums were awarded against seven different counties, as follows: Chemung, Schuyler, Steuben, Tompkins and Yates, of New York; also Tioga and Bradford County, Pa. Some sections of these counties had plenty of rain, while we in Chemung County experienced the most severe and longest drought ever known. Your seeds all through were the best we have ever purchased; of course the season was against us—no rain of any account from July 6 to October 26. When two years old trans-plant into permanent beds, which should be well and deeply manured and trenched to the depth of t8 inches. Set the plants in rows from 3 to 4 feet apart and 2 feet in the row, spreading out the roots, and cover gradually during the season 6 or 8 inches. On the approach of winter cover with manure or compost, fork the beds early in spring, and apply a dressing of salt at the rate of 600 pounds to an acre. Cut for use the second year after planting.

POLE, or RUNNING BEANS

CULTURE,—Pole Beans are even more sensitive to cold and wet, as well as to drought and hot winds, than the dwarf varieties, but are of superior quality and productiveness. After settled warm weather, set poles 4 to 8 feet long in rows 4 feet apart and extending north and south, the poles being 3 feet apart in the row. Let the poles slant slightly toward the north. Set in this way the vines cling better, and the pols are straighter and more easily seen. Around each hill plant five to eight Beans 2 inches deep. When well started thin to four plants, and see that they all climb around the pole in the same way, for they will not grow if tied up in the opposite direction. Another plan is to plant in rows thickly enough so that there will be one plant to 8 or no inches. Set posts 5 feet high firmly ateach end of the rows and drive stakes made of 2 x 2 lumber at intervals of 16 feet along the rows. Stretch a wire, size number 10 or 13, between posts along each row, and fasten it to the tops of the stakes in the row with wire staples. Run a light wire or twine along the row about 6 inches from the ground and fasten to the posts and stakes with wire staples. The twine to the wire alove and the wire or twine below, wherever there is a plant. The vines will run up these until they reach the top wire, when they will care for themselves. Another way is to omit the bottom wire and stick small stakes 2 to 6 inches in the soil and fasten to the top owire. CUCUMBERS One ounce will plant about 50 hills; one to two pounds to the acre

To obtain early Cneumbers, and at the same time avoid most of the annoyance CULTURE.—To obtain early Cncumbers, and at the same time avoid most of the annoyance of the striped bug, it is a good plan to plant the seeds about the first of May in frames, without much hottom heat. Small sods, turned over, may be placed close together in the frames, and upon these the seeds may be planted; or small pots may be planged into the soil in the frame, and a few seeds placed in each. In three or four weeks these may be transplanted into open ground. Set without disturbing the plants, each piece of sod into hills made 3 or 4 feet apart each way. If transplanted in the evening, and one watering given, the plants will not droop When the plants have become well started, thin out, leaving four of the strongest in each hill Pick all Cncumbers when large enough for use, whether needed or not, for if leit on the vine to ripen they will cease to be productive. The seeds may be planted in the hills late in May, making the cop somewhat later. Use dry plaster or an infusion of powdered white hellebore in water to destroy the striped bug. 





SOIL. A crop of Onions can be grown on any good soil which will produce a full crop of corn. We prefer a rich loan with a slight nuxture of clay, manuting for two years previous, because if a sufficient quantity of manute to riske an ordinary soil to a proper degree of fertility is applied at once, it is bely to make the Onions soft. The same result will follow if we sow on rank, mucky ground

MANURING. There is no crop in which a liberal use of mannie is more essent of that in this, and it should be of the best quality, well fermented and shoveled over at least twice during the previous summer to kill weed seeds if trank, fresh mannie is used, it is liable to result in soft bulbs with many scallions

PREPARATION. Remove all refuse of previous crops in time to complete the work before the ground freezes up, and spread the compested manne evenly at the rate of about fifty cart loads to the acre. This should first be cultivated in, and then the ground plowed a moderate depth, taking a narrow furtow in order to thoroughly inix the manner with the soil.

SOWING THE SEED. This should be done as soon as the ground can be gotten ready, and can be done best by a hand seed-drift. This should be care-fully adjusted to sow the desired quantity of seed about one-half inch deep. The quantity needed will vary with the soil, the seed used, and the kind of

Onions desired Thin seeding gives much larger Durons than thick seeding. Four or five pointds per acre is the usual quantity needed to grow large Omons. **CULTIVATION.** Give the Onions the first beeng, just skimming the ground between the rows, as soon as they can be seen in the row. Hoe again in a few dive, after which weeding must be begun. The weeder must work on his knees astride the row, strining the earth to destroy any weeds that have just started. At this weeding, or the next, according to size of plants, the rows should be thurned, leaving from eight to twelve plants to the fort. In ten days or two weeks they will require another hoeing and weeding similar to the last. If the work has been thoroughly done at the proper time, the crop will not require further care until ready to gather.

will not require further care until ready to gather. **GATHERING.** As soon as the tops die and fail, the bulks should be gath-ered into windhows. If the weather is fine they will need no attention while enting. Cut of the tops, when perfectly div, about half an inch from the bulk. If will not do to store Onions in large piles or masses, particularly in warm weather or if they are in the least most, but if perfectly div when gathered and they are spread not to exceed a feet in depth, they can be kept in fine condition till spring. Any arrangement will do that will keep them div and at a uniform temperature of about (a - b), or they may be kept frozen, care being taken not to distub them. They should be thawed gradually. The importate of uniform attention to this detail is one that can only be learned by experience and observation. To omit a single watering, or a too frequent watering, usually leads to failure. Remove the glass after the seeds have germinated, and when the seedings are large enough to handle they should be trans-planted into similarly prepared boxe an inch apart each way, or put into small pots and keep in same until time to plant ont in the open ground. At all times they should have an abundance of air; otherwise the young seed-lings are liable to damp-off.


