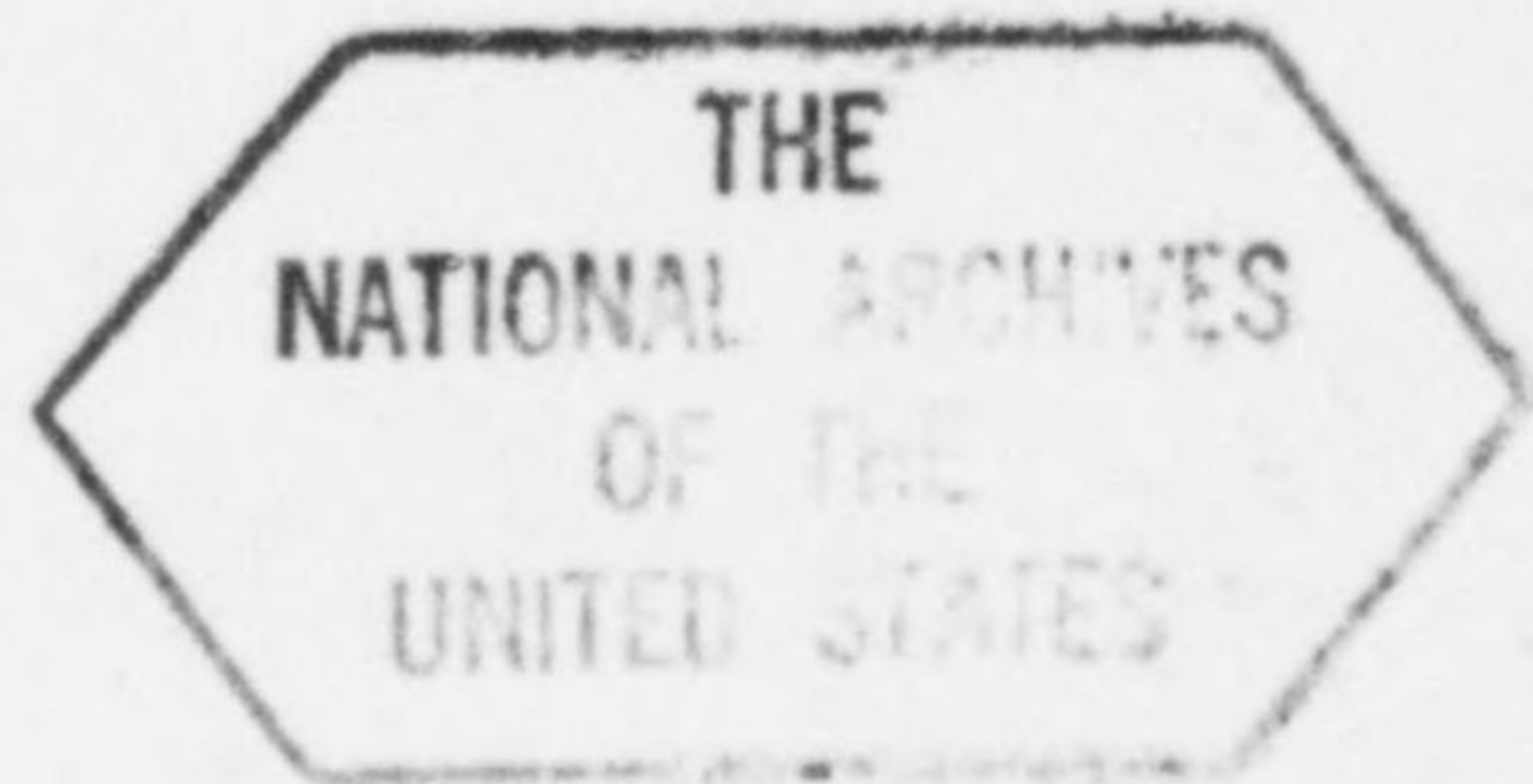

(1) The Jusan-jo which was established by Mrs. Tacheda last August was again visited and excellent results noted. 45 are enrolled in the sewing school, which is operated by village and prefectural funds. A new budget of 750,000 yen for 1948 has been approved by the village. Although production is good, the Jusan-jo is not self-supporting and the wages paid the sewing instructors are sometimes delayed. There is much difficulty securing materials and Mrs. Tacheda has requested prefecture for more of same. She also hopes to build another building for the Jusan-jo in the future; meanwhile the space allotted by the Occupation laborer's group in their building has been divided into 4 rooms - a cutting room, sewing room, classroom, and bedroom for the instructors. At present, there are 10 sewing machines. Mrs. T. has requested more.
