INTRODUCTION

Jurrent Annual Report

This report presents statistics on patients a private institutions for the care of the menally defective and epileptic. It is based on ata compiled in the 29th Annual Census of Paients in Mental Institutions, the eighth such ensus to be conducted by the National Institute f Mental Health.

The tabulations made are comparable to nose in earlier publications. They consist of bookkeeping account of the flow of patients a and out of private institutions and statistics n certain characteristics of first admissions. The generous cooperation of the superinendents and staffs of the individual private intitutions supplying data is gratefully acknowldged. Without their assistance this report ould not be made.

'revious Reports

A detailed historical account of the developaent of the Annual Census of Mental Patients can be found in "Patients in Mental Institutions: 1947" pp. 1-4, National Institute of Mental Health, Public Health Service.

From 1933, the first year in which annual enumerations of patients in private institutions for mental defectives and epileptics was begun, through 1938, data were published in a separate volume from the data on hospitals for mental disease. From 1937 through 1951 all data on the above types of facilities were published in one volume but in separate sections of the report.

This volume is entitled Part IV of P.H.S. publication No. 523. Prior parts supplied data on public institutions for mental defectives and epileptics (Part I), public hospitals for mental disease (Part II), and private hospitals for mental disease and general hospitals with psychiatric facilities (Part III).

One more part, Part V presenting trend tables for the period 1942 through 1954 and special tables based on 1954 data for all mental hospitals and institutions for mental defectives and epileptics will also be published.

SECTION II

SCOPE OF THE DATA

urpose

The survey is designed to provide on an nnual basis, information as to the extent of ne use of private institutional facilities in ach State and the United States, and to preent data for first admissions of mental deectives and epileptics by selected characterstics, such as mental status or clinical iagnosis and age and sex.

Coverage

The period covered in this report is for the alendar year ending December 31, 1954. Cerain of these private institutions have fiscal years ending within the year, but they are relatively few.

Reporting was 69 percent complete with 141 of the 204 known private institutions reporting. (See Table A below) While the percentage of nonreporting institutions is comparatively large, patients in all private institutions represent a very small proportion of all mental defectives and epileptics institutionalized. Therefore, the actual amount of underreporting for all institutionalized mentally defective and epileptic patients is small. First admission data for mental defectives were reported for 121 and first admission data for epileptics for 136 of the 141 reporting institutions.

SECTION III

DEFINITIONS

Type of Institution Included

Included in the scope of this report are all known private institutions for the care and treatment of mental defectives or epileptics.

Such institutions are limited to those providing residential care. There are a number of day centers and schools for the mentally handicapped from which the child returns home at the end of each day or school period. These non-residential schools are not included in this survey.

Data on Movement of Patient Population

Statistics on the movement of population present a formal accounting of the flow of patients into and out of institutions for mental defectives and epileptics during the year. The classification employed covers patients on the books at the beginning of the year, admission separations, and patients on the books at the en of the year. Each of the categories used together with its subclasses, is listed and de fined below.

1. Patients on the books at the Beginnin and End of the Year. All patients on the book by actual location as follows:

(a) <u>In institution</u>. Patients physically pres ent or accounted under the institution rule governing such matters (that is, ''residen patients'').

(b) In extramural care. Patients on the books of the institution but not in actua residence, (that is, subject to control bu residing in a location other than the institution proper).



2. Admissions other than transfers. All patients who enter an institution during the course of a year are designated as admissions. Admissions, other than transfers, are further classified as first admissions and readmissions.

(a) First admissions. Includes all patients admitted to an institution for mental defectives or epileptics without a record of previous care or training (that is, a record of an admission and a formal discharge) in such a public or private institution anywhere. The term is usually applied exclusively within a given type of institution, that is, a patient going from a hospital for mental disease to an institution for mental defectives and epileptics, or vice versa, is considered a discharge from the first institution and a first admission to the second, if he had not previously been resident in such institution.

(b) <u>Readmissions</u>. This category comprises patients admitted with a previous record of admission to, and discharge from any institution for mental defectives and epileptics.

3. Separations other than Transfers. All patients who are removed from the custody of the institution are designated as separations. Separations, other than transfers, are the result of discharge or death. The nature of the classification of deaths and discharges is indicated below:

(a) <u>Discharges</u>. These represent patients who are formally removed from the custody of the institution. Such patients may be discharged directly from the institution of from extramural care.

(b) <u>Deaths</u>. These represent patients who die while in the institution or while in extramural care.

4. Transfers. Those admissions and separations representing patients shifted within the same State from the supervision of one institution for mental defectives and epileptics to another, without a formal discharge, are designated as transfers. Since transfers do not represent additions to the total patient population of institutions within a given State and presumably have already appeared at some time in statistics on admission, they are not given detailed consideration in this report.

Tabulation of Patients with both Mental Deficiency and Epilepsy

In tabulating patients with both mental deficiency and epilepsy, institution officials were requested, as in previous years, to classify patients according to the primary cause of admission. The rules for such classification are as follows:

1. If the case history shows that the patient was primarily mentally defective and that epi-

lepsy developed at a later date, the patient should be reported on the schedules for mental defectives.

2. If the case history shows that the patient was primarily epileptic and that mental deterioration developed at a later period, the patient should be reported on the schedules for epileptics.

3. In all cases where epilepsy is definitely present, and where insufficient data are available to determine the patient's previous mental status, even though mental deficiency is now established, the patient should be reported on the schedule for epileptics.

4. Patients who are reported as "neither mentally defective nor epileptic" are indicated in totals in tables on movement of patient population and are not included in any other tables.

Characteristics of First Admissions

Age of first admissions is based on age as of last birthday prior to admission.

<u>Mental Defectives</u>. The classification of mental status used is based on that prepared by the American Association on Mental Deficiency in cooperation with the National Association for Mental Health, Inc., and published by the latter in the "Statistical Manual for the Use of Institutions for Mental Defectives" in 1946.

Mental status is indicative of the degree of intellectual impairment and is characterized as follows:

(a) Idiot. A mentally defective person usually having a mental age of less than 3 years or, if a child, an intelligence quotient of less than 20.

(b) Imbecile. A mentally defective person usually having a mental age of 3 to 7 years, inclusive, or if a child, an intelligence quotient of from 20 to 49, inclusive.

(c) Moron. A mentally defective person usually having a mental age of 8 to 11 years, inclusive, or, if a child, an intelligence quotient of 50 to 69. However, this upper limit is not to be adhered to where medical, social and other factors would clearly indicate that the patient is mentally defective.

<u>Epileptics</u>. The diagnoses used for epileptic first admissions are based on those adopted by the National Epilepsy League.¹ The major categories are as follows:

(a) Symptomatic. Cases in which the epileptic seizures are symptoms of a definite disease process, toxic condition, or structural defect.

(b) Idiopathic: Cases in which the seizures are not associated with a disease process, toxic condition, or structural defect.

SECTION IV

LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA

Variations in resident patient and first admission rates to all institutions provide, in theory, a basis for inference as to the variations in the prevalence and incidence of mental deficiency and epilepsy among the several States.

However, there are a number of reasons why such inferences cannot and should not be made for this purpose in our present state of knowledge. Some of these reasons are as follows:

1. The relationship between the number of mental defectives who are institutionalized and the number of persons with mental deficiency in the population is not known. This is also true for epileptics.

2. Not all persons who are seriously mentally defective or epileptic are institutionalized. Factors such as type of environment in which the person lives or availability of space or policy of institution may often govern admission practices in certain States.

3. The establishment of new institutions, or shifts in utilization of facilities may create large increases in admission or reduction in resident patients. Thus, the sudden increase in admissions would not imply increased incidence but absorption of patients who should have been admitted in prior years but for whom facilities were not available. Similar consideration applies to the concept of resident patients as an indication of prevalence.

4. In addition to the above stated factors private institutions do not confine their admissions to residents of the State in which they are located. Therefore, measures of such institutionalization which are classified by State are either overstated or understated to the extent that patients are from States other than the one in which the institution is located. Also, a patient remains in a given private institution only so long as the family or guardian wishes to keep him there. Financial or other considerations may dictate the transfer or removal of the patients as well as his recovery.

Institutions also vary in their definitions of the terms used to measure institutionalized incidence and prevalence. The definitions of first admission and resident patient are not standard and in some cases may vary so widely as to cause serious differences.

In conclusion it should be pointed out that reporting has never been complete for private institutions. Therefore, any attempt to draw conclusions or inferences for these institutions alone based on trends or comparisons between years or States must first take into account the extent of underreporting involved.
