This is inspiriting and patriotic; and augurs well for the success of the project, and (as a necessary consequence) the health and wealth of the city.

THE GASLIGHT BANK .- Solicitous that justice and priv leges should be equally distributed to all skizage or compamiss of the state, we have been and are opposed to all charters in the shape or semblance of monopolies-except in cases of the utmost emergency or importance. Companie like that to construct a railroad hence to Nashville demand and deserve whatever protection and patronage can prudent vantages likely to accrue from the undertaking; and as the project could not auspiciously be commenced, nor successfully be completed, without the congession of exclusive privileges. But for lighting a city with gas, no such extraadmary protection or monopoly is required; although it has been too successfully requested—we had almost said unjustly and injuriously granted.

Gaslight companies require no extraneous support, when ever their objects are known. Here the experiment of intraducing gaslight had been tested and succeeded; and the me months would have rendered it abundantly lucrative to those engaged -as it has been in every other instance. Not two months have elaused since the books of a gas company were opened in Philadelphia; and now the shares are selling at 15 per cent premium. In New York and Boston similar results have followed; and in England, the gaslight companies have generally an annual dividenvarying from 10 to 20 per cent.

This is not surprising, when it is considered that the on's outlay on the part of gas companies is actually though not apparently for their gaswo ks; for customers have to have for pipes, lamps, etc. The coal used produces coal tar and coke, the sale of which indemnifies or more than counter. balances the original cost; and now '(however singular is may appear to our own citizens heretofore unapprized of the fact) the gas is used for cooking and for heating apartments. Knewing then the advantages of gas for heat and light-for obviating the necessity of culinary fires, of stores, candles eil, etc-can any imagine that gas works require any support than that of customers apprized of the manifold benefits of using gas ?

Gas companies even if not chartered have every chance of profit; -if chartered, they connot fail to succeed; -i shartered exclusively, their profits must be enormous; -an if chartered exclusively, with banking privilege, then divi dends must be beyond all customary bounds.

Yet from the duplicity of our legislators or their lobb monitors or clients, this company has got-lat, an exclusive privilege of lighing the city with gas in secula seculorum -and 2d, the banking privileges for 50 years, with a capital of only six millions! If ever there was a blot on any legis-lation, this is one on the acts of our last legislature. The corporation is completely prostrated at the pedestal of this moneter idol. The gaslight company may or may not light any part of the streets by contract with the ecoporation though in most other instances of gas companies, they required as a bonus to light the public streets efficiently and gratutously: yet here with the aid of a bank, the company may set ad libitum. No bonus whatever is required for state or city. By the enormous amount of its capital, and its several branches (which it may however kick overboard whenever found to be not lucrative), this hank has a prenderating influence over all other banks in the state. Its a mere matter of mounthine; and is but a subsidiary operation for trebling its dividends. In the city it can all the other banks ; as its capital is about one fifth of that of all the other banks put together ;- and throughout the parishes of the state, its numerous branches with large capitals can command for it a domineering influence.

But enough, capitalists have a fine medicine for lucrative speculation; merchants and bankers have palpable causes for apprehension; and enterprizing citizens have too much reason to complain that they have been unjustly treated; their priviledges have been bartered and forestalled, or left at the mercy of a pernicious monopoly. If the company succeed; of which unfortunately there appears no doubt-the dividends in 2 or 3 years will amount to 20 or 30 per cent. Would this he constitutional or legal?
