## ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1826.

asHERE will be Five Eclipses in the Year 1826: Three of the Sun and Two of the Moon, in the following order.

1st. The first will be of the Moon, May 21st, at 10 hours 52 minutes in the morning, consequently invisible.

2d. The second will be of the Sun, June 5th in the aftern:00n at 0 hours 50 minutes, invisible here, owing to the Moon's great South Latitude.

3d. The third will be of the Sun, October 30th, at 8 hours 58 minutes, in the afternoon, invisible.

4th. The fourth will be of the Moon, on the morning of the 14 th of Nov. at 11 hours 45 minutes, consequently invisible.

5th. The fifth and last will be of the Sun, November 29th, at 7 hours 14 minutes in the morning, invisible, the centre of the Moon at Sun rising will pass 43 minutes of a degree North of the Sun's centre, leaving an interval of 10 minutes between their nearest limbs.

of Venus will be Morning Star until the 10th of March from that time Evening Star until the 23d of December, after that, Morning Star until the end of the Year.

The planet Venus which for the last year, made so refulgen aq appearance in the heavens both as Morning and Evening Star, often appearing in full Day, will at the commencement of the Year 1826 be in that part of her orbit which is furthest from the Sun, and diminished of mest part of her lustre, she will uppear as Morning Star, until the 10th of March which will be the time of her sunerior conjunction with the Sun. She will begin to emerge from the Sun's rays about the 10th of April, and shine as Evening Star, gradually increasing in splendour as she recedes from the Sun; the time of her greatest elongation from the Sun will be the 13th day of O-tober, she will then begin to approach the Sun, retaining her full splendour until the l0th of 1) erember, when she will have nearly :mmersed in the Sun's riess, and on the 28d of December, the time of her inferior conjunction will pass 3 degree North of his centre, and then. resume her appearance as Morning Star.

April. "Look before you leap, as Pompey the great remarked to Lerid Cornwallis, the evening before the battle of Azincout w!en Joan of Acc cone to the English canp, with a polite invitation to the offeers fom the irereh King to sup with him.- Don't sow betore your ground is properiy prerame!," said uncle Rubby to his neighbour Hurriem Thatildo, who had ns much iter: of his plough's going below the surface of the ground, as his sen Goslington had of his mammy's breaking the skin, in taking a splinter out wi"h foot.

Dress your winter grain with plaster, if it was not done at seed time. Your mowing lands too if of a dry soil, will amply repay the esnerse of one or two bushels of plaster to the acre-or a few of lime or leached ashes. Nurse your stock with potatoes, or carrots if you have them. As soon as the grcard is bare let your sheop rarge on your ntubble fieds, if not sown with clover for mowing. Green herbage is the most natural feed for weop. If you hare no such fields, give them potatoes and carrots, (but not turnid's, as a substitute. Keep them from your mowing crounds.

Plough for spring grain. Sow all your spring grains as carly as possible, with due caution against frosts. Be especially carcful to catch a dry ree.! time, if you can. A strict attention to this part of good farming, will well pay your care, by the difference in tha value of your crop. If whent be washed in clear spring water the water being changed two or three tiones, and It be well rubbed and stired about in each change of the water, the grain may be entirely cleansed from smut. Ross your old fruit trees. Set cabbage stumps and onions for seed. Sow early pease, salads, turnips, rodishes, and cabbage; sage, thyme, mint, sumolsavoury; spinach, parsley, and colery. Plant potatoes ir, this month, it practicable. Choose a warm rich piece ot' ground near the house, of one, tivo, three, or four rods; render it, rich with horse or hog manure.

If you sinear your seed-corn all over with tar, and sprinkle ashes or plaster on it before planting, to prevent the birds or squarrels from digging it up, you must remember that it will be necessary first to soak it enongh to make it vegetate, for, otherwise, the coat of tar will keep out the moisture, and hinder the seed's sprouting. Soaking seed-corn in copperas-water just previously to planting it, is said to be highly beneficial; as it not only hastas vegetation, but also prevents the worms destroying the young plants. Aut ounce of copperas may be sufficient for every quart of seed, and it uught to be steeped about twenty-four hours.

June. Others soak it in a decoction of sweet elder. Corn should not be planted deep. The roots always run to a proper depth, if the seeds be planted near the surface. Plant sced-potatoes whole.

Thin out, and earth up, all your plants : frequent hoeing is both rain and manure to them, especially in dry weather, and if done early in the morning. Dress your cornhills, at the hoeings, with a handful of plaster, or lire or lcached ashes, if it be needed. Have no loitering while having drives. Harvest your grain early. All that is gained, perhaps, by late harvesting. is only an addition to the skin of the grain.

August. "First follow nature, and your judgment frame By her just standard, which is still the same, Unerring nature, still divinely bright, One clear, unchanged, and universal light, Life, force, and beauty, must to all impart, At once the source, and end, and test of art, Those rules, of old discover'd, not de vis'd, Are nature still, but nnture methodiz'd: Nature like liberty, is but restrain'd By the same laws which first herself ordain'd."

Don't plough in January, nor sow in February, nor reap in March, nor make fence in July, nor sled your winter's wood in August, nor go a hunting in June, nor set off on a hundred mile visit in May ; for all this runs a little counter to Nature's instructions. Neither commence quarrels in a frolic, nor frolics in a meeting-lhouse, nor mischicfs in the court-house, nor crimes in the jail. Begin no friendships to spite enemies, nor avinosities :" humour friends. Enter not on lawsuits in a passion, nor become a surety in lipuor, nor lay plans in a consumption. - Tho clerey, who live by our sins, the medical faculty, who live by our diseases, , nd the law gentry, who live by our misfortunes, are wise in their generation, and manage these things bet-ter."-" Keep your hend cool; your feet dry and warm; your body open ar nature would have it ; and then youmay bid the faculty kiss your toe, nititas good a grace as the Pope himselt-uch nearly werc the only contents of a scaled volune which the celebrated Bocrlhave left as a rich legacy to posterity."
It is better to cut grain early, because, though it whl be somewhat harder to tiwash, yet there will bo less waste, in its shelling out, in harvesting and ciarting in. Plants may be watered a little, carly in the morning, or at
evening, if in a dry soi!, and the weather beconce very dry, Nurse with the hoe such potatoes as are not fit to be dug. Sow turnips for winter.

Septrmber. "Fye! Millions of hands labour daily for us. How many animals lose their lives to support ours! and in how many other ways of which we are ignorant, may not nature be active in our favour! May it teach us to value as we ought the goodness of our merciful Father, and to be sensible of our own happiness.

Plough up, clean and deep, before the ground becomes too much frozen, such stubble or sward grounds, as you intend for indian corn next season; especially if they be such as are apt to be infested with the grub, or eutworm.

## AGRICULTURAL.

Mr. J. Nelson, of Mecklenburg, Virginia, has published the following cure for the rot and scab in sheep, which he has made use of with very great success:
"In the year 1806, my flock was so very indifferent, that from ninety sheep I sheared only 130 weight of wool, so sorry as to be barely fit to make clothing for young negroes. Immediately after shearing, I made use of the following mixture: Three gallons of tar, and three do. of train oil, boiled together, to which was added three pounds of roll brimstone finely powdered and stirred in. This quantity was sufficient for the above number, and was poured on with a kitchen ladle, from the top of the head along the back bone to the tail. At the next shearing (in 1807) from 78 of the same sheep, I sheared 360 pounds of very good wool, and instead of 20 to 25 sorry lambs, commonly raised from my flock, I raised 55 as fine as I ever saw. Since this application I have been frequently asked by my neighbors, where I got such fine sheep from. This remedy was taken from an old eastern paper, which I am sorry to say I have lost or mislaid. It may be necessary to add, that I have continued to make use of this application with the same success, and that when train oil is difficult to be had, any kind of grease, such as is used for plantation leather will answer.'

## VALUABLE EXPERIMENTS.

 To show the diffcrence between raw corn, and corn meal cooked, as feed for hogs.Extract of l letier to the Editor of the American Farmer, dated Dec. 18, 1824. " Some two years ago, while I was confined to the fire-side by a cold, I amused myself with several experiments, to find the increase by weight of corn, rye, shorts, \&c. by boiling and cooking, with a view to economising hog food. I soon became convinced, that wonderful effects might be easily produced; and though I then made a regular record of what I did, strange to tell, I have never, till lately, attempted to put my theory into practice. I have had, since the first day of December, an actual experiment going on between raw com, and meal made into good thick mush ; two pigs, of about one hundred weight each, have been eating, seven pounds each, of raw corn, per twentyfour hours; and two others of near the same size, have had exactly seven pounds of meal made into good mush, between them. These seven pounds of meal, cooked into the state of good stiff' mush, weigh from 28 to 33 pounds. I weighed my pigs accurately, at beginning, and weighed again two days since, to mark the progress. The two eating fourteen pounds of corn per day, had increased seventeen pounds in sixteen days; the two eating seven pounds of cooked meal per day, had increased twenty-four pounds in the same time. Here is a saving of one half the corn. I shall carry them on till early in January, when I shall kill them."

Directions for raising Cabbages.-Take from the stumps of old cabbages which you generally set out early in the spring, the most prominent shoots, after they have sufficiently expanded themselves, and set them out in the same manner you do your plants, and they will immediately take root and afford you a very early and luxuriant cabbage. Those who have tried this method affirm that they are much earlier and by far superior to any that can be raised from the plants. They must be broken from the stumps, and not cut off, as their small fibres greatly facilitate their taking root.

To remove Chilblains.-Take an ounce of white copperas, dissolved in a quart of water, and occasionally apply it to the part affected. This will ultimately remove the most obstinate blains. N. B. This application must be used before they break, otherwise it will do injury.
