There are two types of quotations: single and double.


- Double quotations should be used when using words verbatim from any source.
- Single is used for quotes within quotes.

EXAMPLES

- "It's colder than the Arctic out here," Sasha said to me as we walked to school.
- The interviewer asked the footballer "How do you feel about being labeled the 'greatest of all time' by Time Magazine?"







HOW TO USE?

There are four prevalent ways writers use quotation marks:

- When directly quoting someone/thing
- When emphasizing a word
- When indicating a word is being used ironically
- When referencing the title of something that is part of a larger piece, such as articles or chapters

WHERE DO THEY GO?

Quotation marks are placed either inside or outside other punctuation marks, depending on which it is.

- They always go outside periods and commas
- They are placed inside question marks, semicolons, et cetera when these aren't in the sentence(s) being quoted.
- Single quotations go inside double quotations always



EXAMPLES

- -She specifically said I was "an outcast and a nobody"?
- The famous Samuel Adams quote "Give me Liberty or give me death."
