CCCC Wikipedia Initiative Mission

Established in 2019, the CCCC Wikipedia Initiative proceeds from the conviction that it matters to edit Wikipedia, especially for field experts committed to knowledge equity as a fundamental groundwork for social justice.

Writing expert knowledge into Wikipedia is one important way we can address knowledge gaps, imbalances, and misinformation online.



Improving Knowledge Equity with Scholars

Scholars have important access to knowledge and beliefs about topics and figures often undocumented on Wikipedia.

- 1. Unique community engagement.
- 2. Publicizing knowledge often kept behind paywalls.
- 3. Greater understanding of content gaps and how to fix them.
- 4. Power to bolster curriculum revisions at all levels.



Wikipedia: What is it exactly?

- 1. An online, multilingual encyclopedia maintained and edited entirely by volunteers.
- 2. A wiki-based website run by the Wikimedia Foundation (WMF), a nonprofit that supports several other open content platforms.
- 3. The flagship project in a global movement to create robust and accessible sources of free and open knowledge content.
- 4. Currently 58 million articles created across 300 different language version Wikipedias—all freely licensed under Creative Commons (CC-BY-SA).

Key Policies & Guidelines





The Five Pillars

- 1. Wikipedia is an encyclopedia.
- 2. Wikipedia is written from a neutral point of view.
- 3. Wikipedia is free content that anyone can use, edit, and distribute.
- 4. Wikipedia editors should treat each other with respect and civility.
- 5. Wikipedia has no firm rules.



Core Content Policies

- Verifiability only draw facts from reliable sources
- 2. Notability plenty of independent sources
- 3. No original research no claims without reliable sources



Article Quality Assessment

WikiProjects—a group of Wikipedia editors focused on improving articles around a specific topic or field of interest—review and assess article content.

Notability: What can be added?

If a topic or person is considered notable by Wikipedia's community-curated guidelines, it can be added

"A topic is presumed to be suitable for a stand-alone article or list when it has received significant coverage in reliable sources that are independent of the subject"

Subject-specific notability guides govern specific types of articles

WP:N

Academic Notability Criteria

- Reproduces structures of discrimination that exist in traditional academic reward systems and leans too heavily on metrics catered to scholars in STEM fields.
- 2. Take into account nationally recognized awards, editorship of a major academic journal, and use of scholarship in course curricula as justification for academic notability.

Creating an Account





Choosing a Username

Be mindful of...

- 1. Using your real name in/as your username.
- 2. Your account linking to other Wikimedia projects Policies...
- 1. Pick a username that refers to an individual or single entity (no institutions, groups, etc).
- 2. No disruptive, misleading, or offensive names



Changing a Username

If you have not been editing for very long, it is easier to create a new account than to change your username.



Create an Account or Log in

- 1. Go to en.wikipedia.org and click on 'Create account' found on the top right.
- 2. Although it is not required to add an email address, it is highly recommended to receive notifications about changes to your watched articles.





# The oldest version of the Wikipedia article on Writing documented in March 2001:








### Visual vs. Source Editing



#### Early life and education [edit | edit | source]

Anita Hill was born to a family of farmers in Lone Tree, Oklahoma, the youngest of Albert and Err grandparents had been born into slavery.<sup>[5]</sup> Hill was raised in the Baptist faith.<sup>[3]</sup>

Hill graduated from Morris High School, Oklahoma in 1973, where she was class valedictorian. [6]

1977. [3][4] She went on to Yale Law School, obtaining her Juris Doctor degree with honors in 1980. [3][7]



- Add a heading for 'References' at the bottom of an article.
- Place cursor below the heading and select 'References list' from the 'Insert' drop down menu.
- 3. A list of all in-line citations will auto populate in this area.








### Adding Wiki Links

- 2. If an article cannot be found and is considered notable, you can create a red link signalling to the community that the article needs to be created



Wikipedia article: Teaching Writing in the United States






#### Creating Article Drafts (1)

#### Creating article drafts in your sandbox:

- 1. Click on your "sandbox" in the top right next to your username.
- 2. When you are done drafting your article, you can either move your article to the draft or mainspace.
- 3. Select "More" and then "Move" from the dropdown menu next to the star icon.

## Creating Article Drafts (3)


#### Moving your article to the mainspace:

- 1. Select "Article" under "New Title."
- 2. Add the article title next to this field.
- 3. Add your reason for moving, either 'Ready for draftspace" or "Ready for mainspace" are sufficient.
- 4. Uncheck "Move associated talk page" if you have existing content on your user talk page unrelated to the article.
