The second act opened with a

little body a fine medium for de-  
veloping the fiery spirit of this  
dance.

Inherent with the courtesy and  
chivalry of the olden days was the  
Cavotte, and it was given a most  
original setting.

Some liting phrases of Sinding's  
"Rustle of Spring," and Jeannette  
Hoagland stepped out robed in  
white, and gave us what Spring  
meant to her.

Schubert's "Moment Musical"  
displayed the talents of Naodine  
De Vega, Mary Falkner and Irene  
Gould.

Valentine McGillicuddy, lithe,  
slender, entered to music by Greig.  
Her "Dance Caprice" was elfin-  
like, with a touch of Nature's vir-  
ginity and abandon.

Perhaps the most generally pop-  
ular number was "A Wasted Sum-  
mer" by Jeannette Hoagland and  
Jean Jacques Pfister.

Opal Heron was the very Psyche  
of "Indian Summer." She was  
more than a dancer; she was a  
doyen, bringing gifts from a lost  
land.

The technique of dancing was  
shown to splendid advantage in  
the "Waltz from Faust Ballet."

Alice MacDougal lent a pleasing  
variation with an "Orientale" in-  
terpretation.

The "Greek Boy at Play" re-  
vealed Miss Hoagland in a stimu-  
lating surprise.

Tranquil and serenely restful  
was the "Pastoral," by six  
young ladies.

The programme closed with a  
"Reverie" by Katharine Cooke  
and Jeannette Hoagland.

The program was given artistic  
distinctiveness with the piano  
music rendered by Warren D.  
Allen; his rare touch and thorough  
musicianship was equal almost to  
a complete orchestra.

The Carmel Red Cross work rooms will be open every afternoon, except Saturday. The wool for sweaters and material for boys' blouse suits have arrived. Those wishing to make these suits at home will please come to rooms for instructions.

Carmel's revised quota for things to be ready by October 1, is: 25 boys' blouse suits, 75 children's petticoats, 50 pairs socks, 75 sweaters. The quota for gauze dressings will be announced later.

Visitors in Carmel, away from their home chapters, are invited to visit and work at local headquarters. There should be no vacation from this great work.

The annual moving picture show under the auspices of the Carmel Red Cross chapter and by the courtesy of the Manzanita Club and the Carmel Hall Association, will be given tonight. Clever Ann Pennington is the film star in "The Little Soldier Girl." There should be a packed house.

Henry P. Davidson, Chairman of the War Council, says, among other things, growing out of his recent visit to Europe:

"Our Home Communication Service has just been fully organized. It searches for American soldiers in all the hospitals, writes letters for them, and to any man, sick or well, offers home help in whatever form it may be needed."

Twenty dollars was realized from last Thursday night's dance, and Miss McLean has turned the coin over to Red Cross. The hall was donated by the Arts and Crafts Club, and the musicians contributed their services. Another dance will be given at the same place on Thursday, August 1.
