MRS. MACREYNOLDS EMPLOYS CONTRACTOR YARD TO BUILD HOUSE ON MYRTLE STREET

A small but attractive house is being constructed at 320 Myrtle street by E. D. Yard for Mrs. MacReynolds of Kenwood street. It is to be 26 feet square with a 6 by 10 foot bathroom added at the rear and a cement front porch, 7 by 26 feet with pergola effect at front and over the drive. The outside rustic will be painted a light tan color and the roof will be red composition slate roofing. There will be three rooms beside the bath—a living room 13 1/2 by 26 feet, bedroom 12 1/2 by 15 feet and kitchen 11 by 12 1/2 feet.

The living room and bedroom will be finished with silver gray stain and papered; the kitchen and bath room finished in natural effect.

There will be several built-in features such as dressing room effect in the bedroom, book-case and desk in living room and the usual kitchen features of cupboards, closets and cooler. The bath tub and sink are to be wood enclosed and finished with wood stone. There will be a French front door, also the same style of windows as front.

Another good feature is the fact that the house is so constructed that additions can be easily made.

DECLARED INSANE

SLAYER OF ANTONIO CARUSO FOUND MENTALLY UNBALANCED

Francisco Cardillo was yesterday adjudged insane by the Lunacy Commission and sent to Patton. It was on Friday evening, April 2nd, that Cardillo shot and fatally wounded Antonio Caruso, cook and fellow employe on the Ross and Thom ranch in the northeastern part of Glendale. Caruso had gone to the poultry yard to gather the eggs when Cardillo suddenly appeared and opened fire on him after accusing him of persecution. Four shots were directed at Caruso, one breaking a finger, another entering just below the heart and the other two going wild. Caruso died the next morning. Cardillo was somewhat under the influence of liquor when the crime was committed and persisted in declaring that his victim had talked against this country and the president, which was stoutly denied by the other employes of the ranch. Caruso was a nephew of Joe Pagliuso and his young brother, Carl, was also an employe on the ranch. He had a wife and two children in Cosenza, Italy, which was also the home of his murderer.

Cardillo is of rather low mentality and was always of a morose disposition, not addicted to quarreling but keeping to himself.

The Conference Synod of the Presbyterian Churches of California is being held in Santa Barbara July 20th to 27th in the First Presbyterian Church. The entire party will make the trip by automobile and is the largest representation of elders from any church in the state, outside of the Santa Barbara church where the meetings will be held. The meeting this year combines the Annual Synod Meeting of California with a Practical Work Conference and promises to be of great interest. The various Presbyteries of the Synod will hold special meetings between the regular sessions. Rev. W. E. Edmonds, pastor of the Glendale Presbyterian Church, is moderator of the Los Angeles Presbytery and will preside over the business of this Presbytery, which includes the counties of Los Angeles, San Diego, Orange and Imperial.

WAGE INCREASE FOR RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

RAILWAY LABOR BOARD ANNOUNCED AWARDS FOR TRAIN EMPLOYEES TOTTALLING \$600,000,000 ANNUALLY

CHICAGO, July 20.—The United States Railway Labor Board announced wage increases today totalling six hundred millions annually for nearly 1,900,000 employes.

Railway Union leaders are considering this award with a view to determining whether or not a strike will be called. A decision is expected tomorrow night.

Increases were awarded as follows:
— Passenger engineers and firemen, 80 cents a day.
— Freight engineers and firemen, \$1.04 a day.
— Yardmen, 18 cents an hour.
— Passenger conductors, baggagemen, brakemen and flagmen, \$30 a month.
— Freight conductors, flagmen and brakemen, \$1.04 a day.

All clerical and station employes received a similar increase as well as all employes on railway owned steamship lines.

The Board's findings are based on general living costs and the comparison of railway employes' salaries with those of other industries. While the Board's report was not unanimous it was the "judgment of the majority."

SUPPORT FOR POLAND

FRANCE WILL CARRY OUT AGREEMENT TO AID IN THROWING OFF SOVIET RUSSIA

PARIS, July 20.—France is carrying out her agreement with Great Britain to furnish armed support to Poland in the event that the efforts to effect a settlement of the differences between Poland and Soviet Russia should fail, Premier Millerand announced today.

JACK JOHNSON IN U. S.

NEGRO PUGILIST ARRESTED ON WHITE SLAVE CHARGE AS HE STEPS ACROSS BORDER

SAN DIEGO, July 20.—Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, crossed the international boundary line today and was placed under arrest by the federal authorities as soon as he had crossed the line.

Johnson came across the line in charge of Sheriff Cline of Los Angeles and as he walked on United States soil after an absence of several years, he was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Cooley of San Diego county on a white slave charge. He was brought to the San Diego county jail.

It is expected that Johnson will be arraigned this afternoon and transferred to Chicago.

SHAMROCK ESTABLISHES A GOOD LEAD

CHALLENGER PASSES AMERICAN YACHT IN SECOND RACE OF SERIES WITH RESOLUTE

ABOARD U. S. DESTROYER GOLDSBOROUGH, (via Wireless to United Press)—July 20.—Hauled along by a little forestay sail, the Shamrock IV, challenger of America's cup established a lead of several hundred yards early in the second race in the series with the Resolute.

The Shamrock was 38 seconds ahead in crossing the starting line but due to some difficulty was passed by the Resolute. The Resolute hit a soft spot and the challenger forged ahead establishing a good lead. Unless the wind increases there are grave doubts that the race will be completed within the six-hour limit.

Prospects that there will be a prohibition ticket in the field went up when the statement was made that in order to poll the solid prohibition vote Warren G. Harding must give his promise to use his power to enforce and maintain the eighteenth amendment.

NEW DORMITORY

GLENDALE SANITARIUM AND HOSPITAL DORMITORY IN PROCESS OF CONSTRUCTION

For the last two weeks a dormitory for the lady nurses of the Glendale Sanitarium has been steadily going up, being located on the west side of North Jackson street near the corner of Wilson avenue. It is a two-story structure 137 feet long, including an 8-foot porch, and 34 feet wide and the outside finish will be rustic. It will probably be painted a light gray color or white. The building fronts east and will accommodate 54 nurses, with two girls to a room.

Each of the girls' rooms will contain two closets 4 1/2 by 6 feet making a very roomy and convenient dressing room.

Besides the nurses' rooms each floor plan calls for a six-foot hall running the length of the building with the rooms on either side; also utility rooms on each floor containing the usual accessories of sprays, lavatories, bath and toilets. The number of these accessories meets the state requirements for an accredited training school, the Glendale (Continued on Page 4)

HINDERS BUSINESS

BIG BEAR ACTIVITIES AFFECTED BY THE GASOLINE SHORTAGE

The shortage of gasoline is having a disastrous effect upon the business of the Bear Valley resort and has brought financial loss to quite a number who are located there. Miss Lura Hibben, who returned to her home at 123 East Laurel street Sunday night and her friend Miss Vera McPherson, who will also soon return, are doing so on account of the lack of tourist patronage which adversely affected their respective positions.

During the first two days of the gasoline shortage, the hotel manager received word to cancel not fewer than 35 reservations made by tourists who intended to come but could not get there. The grocer of the place laid in a stock of \$4,000 and now has \$3000 of it on his hands. Usually at the season's end his inventory would total about \$300.

While no earthquakes have been felt up there, an unpleasant, dry, electrical wind prevails rendering the atmosphere and ground very dusty.

Under ordinary conditions the Valley is very pretty and also populous at this season of the year, but the mode of entrance—the "gasoline river" having dried up, the motorists are stranded high and dry.

CHRISTMAS PEACHES

W. B. DAVIS PROMISES THEM TO GLENDALIANS IN THE NEAR FUTURE

A building permit was taken out yesterday by W. B. Davis in the name of the "Davis Glendale Co." for the erection of the first unit of his extensive greenhouses in the Grand View District of Glendale, between Sonora and Grand View avenues, along the San Fernando Road. The permit was for \$20,000. This unit is to be a green house, all of steel and glass construction, and a packing house. Mr. Davis purchased 20 acres of ground for this purpose a few months ago, as noted at the time in the Evening News. He expects to grow all sorts of hot house vegetables and fruits and promises luscious peaches at Christmas time, cucumbers, tomatoes, strawberries and the like all the year around, and flowers innumerable. He has greenhouses of this kind in Aurora and other Illinois cities and has had years of experience in this kind of culture. This will undoubtedly be one of the big industries of Glendale when all the buildings are completed and stocked with fruit and flowers.

What has been God's attitude to the liquor traffic through the ages? Who are proper candidates now? These are questions propounded by Rev. A. B. Smart and, he answers as follows: "Certainly they must be on God's ground, and His ground is clearly seen in the passages quoted below and many similar ones:"

Deut. XXIX, verse 1, "These are the words of the Covenant, which the Lord commanded Moses to make with the children of Israel, in the land of Moab, beside the covenant which He made with them in Horeb," 40 years before.

Verse 10, "Ye stand this day all of you, before the Lord your God; your captains, scribes, elders and officers, with all the men of Israel. Your little ones, your wives, and the stranger in thy camp. That thou shouldst enter into covenant with the Lord thy God, and into His oath"—of prohibition—"which the Lord thy God maketh with thee this day."

Verse 18, "Lest there should be among you, man or woman, family or tribe, whose heart turneth away this day from the Lord our God, to go and serve the gods of the nations; . . . And it came to pass when he heareth the words of this curse, that he blessed himself in his heart saying, 'I shall have peace, tho' I walk in the stubbornness of my heart, to add drunkenness to thirst. The Lord will not spare him, but the anger of the Lord and His jealousy shall smoke against that man, and all the curses that are written in this book shall lie upon him, and the Lord shall blot out his name from under heaven; and the Lord shall pick him out unto evil, out of all the tribes of Israel, according to all the curses written in this law.'"

This has been and is God's policy thru all history.

Again see Isaiah V: 11-14 and 20-25: "Woe unto them that rise up early in the morning, that they may follow strong drink; that continue till night, till wine inflame them! And the harp and the viol and the tabret and pipe and wine are in their feasts, but they regard not the work of the Lord, neither consider the operation of His hands."

13: "Therefore my people are gone into captivity because they have no knowledge, and their honorable men are famished and their multitude are dried up with thirst. Therefore, hell hath enlarged herself and opened her mouth without measure; and their glory and pomp, and multitude, and he that carouseth shall descend into it."

20: "Woe unto them that call evil good and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness, that put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter; woe unto them that are mighty to drink wine, and men of strength to mingle strong drink; who justify the wicked for reward, and take away the righteousness of the righteous from him. Therefore as the fire devoureth the stubble, and the flame consumeth the chaff, so their root shall be as rottenness and their blossom shall go up as dust. Because they have cast away the Lord of hosts and despised the word of the holy one of Israel. Therefore is the anger of the Lord kindled against His people, and He hath stretched forth His hand against them, and hath smitten them; and the hills did tremble and their carcasses are torn in the midst of the street." And His hand is stretched out still."

CITRUS GROWERS

THEY HOLD IMPORTANT MEETING AT COVINA TO CONSIDER FUMIGATION

An important meeting of citrus growers was held at Covina last Thursday to hear addresses on proper methods of fumigating citrus trees for scale pests, and to discuss the same topic. The meeting was called by H. J. Ryan, County Horticultural Commissioner, to afford an opportunity for citrus growers, fumigators and expert investigators to discuss the best methods of obtaining results with the \$750,000 spent annually for the fumigation of citrus orchards in Los Angeles county. J. B. Marleau, inspector for this district, who lives at 626 Howard St., Glendale, was one of those attending and he speaks in high terms of the addresses and discussions.

R. S. Woglum, entomologist of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in charge of citrus fruit insect investigation work in Southern California for the U. S. Bureau of Entomology, spoke on "Recommendations for Fumigation Procedure" and announced some of the results of his practical experimental work of the past season.

J. R. Leffingwell, foreman of pest control for the great Leffingwell Ranch at Whittier, talked of the results of three years' fumigation on the ranch. Mr. Ryan told of what had been accomplished in the way of killing insect pests and answered many questions put to him by interested growers. There were present between 150 and 200 persons, mostly citrus growers, some of them from groves near Glendale. Mr. Marleau said, and he thinks great good was accomplished by the meeting.
