## NEEDS OF CAMPBELL.

### *Suggestions of Desirable Improvements by a Number of Citizens.*

Believing it to be a desirable thing to improve our town in every possible way we have taken the trouble to interview a number of our prominent citizens as to the important things needed to advance the community's welfare and we would ask the new town committee to carefully consider the different suggestions with a view to encouraging such as may seem to it practicable. The views of the different citizens on the improvement subject are as follows:

B. Campbell—"One of the most important things needed is a new depot. We also need a road extended through to Hamilton avenue very badly."

E. E. White—"We need a good high school system. Our streets need to be cleaned and kept in a more tidy condition."

Charles Miller—"A planing mill with facilities for making trays, boxes etc., would be one of the most useful and paying enterprises we could secure in Campbell."

Dr. C. N. Cooper—"We need a good hotel. We also need to have our town kept free from saloons and lotteries."

W. W. Turney—"Our town is moving along about fast enough. Some such enterprise as a box factory and planing mill might be a good thing as it would furnish employment for idle hands."

W. H. Swope—"Campbell needs a good school building more than any other one thing. A building should be put up of sufficient size to supply our needs for the next ten or fifteen years, not a small affair that will have to be enlarged in a year or two."

C. H. Whitman—"Incorporation is the thing we need to make the

town what it should be. The extra amount of taxation would be as nothing compared to the advantages resulting from such a move."

R. K. Thomas—"There should be a street opened up from the Love Lady crossing to Hamilton avenue east of the railroad. The people in most instances are willing to give the right of way. This road would be the means of bringing more people into town and more trade to our merchants. A people's cannery should be started; we have plenty of fruits, plenty of idle hands and enough capital, all we lack is a little enterprise. We should have a new school and one that would stand without being propped up. We should all assist our local paper as it is the cheapest and best way to advertise our town."

### *Town Council Meeting.*

On last Tuesday afternoon a joint meeting was held of the old and new Town Councils. There were present Mrs. Bagwill, Mrs. Poor, Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Foote, Messrs. Righter, Ainsley, Rodeck, Turney, White and Duncan. In the absence of the chairman, B. Campbell, F. M. Righter was chosen to occupy the chair. The various committees acting under appointment from the old council gave their reports and were discharged.

The new Council was then organized with B. Campbell as President, John F. Duncan Clerk and Col. S. F. Cooper Treasurer. On motion it was decided that five standing committees be appointed by the president viz: Fire Committee, Park Committee, Electric Road Committee, Sidewalk Committee and Secret Committee on Law and Order. The matter of inducing the new Electric Light Company to bring their poles through Campbell was discussed. On motion the matter was left with the Electric Road

Committee. Regular meetings of the Council will be held the first and third Fridays of each month at 2 P. M.

### *County News.*

A meeting of the Y. P. S. C. E. workers of the county was held in San Jose this week to arrange for the State Convention to be held in San Jose in May.

The Republican and Democratic city convention were held in San Jose the past week and tickets put in the field for the city officers.

The desperate robber Halberstadt, was captured at Bakersfield and brought back to San Jose Wednesday.

The building for the Rose Carnival is now well under way and is to be an immense structure.

Two chinamen were shot last Tuesday near Santa Clara by one of their countrymen, one of them instantly killed and the other seriously wounded.

### *An Attempted Hold-Up.*

Two ladies, who did not give their names, reported to the police yesterday that on Tuesday night a man tried to hold them up at the corner of Willow street and the Los Gatos road. The man, who was described as being quite tall and wearing a long coat, pointed a pistol at the ladies and demanded that they hand over their money. Both screamed and attracted the attention of the occupants of some vehicles that were passing, and the footpad was frightened away.—S. J. Mercury.

A certain old soldier who lives near the place mentioned in the above report was walking down the highway on the evening named when he was run into by a horse driven by some ladies and quite severely shaken up. He no

It was very likely that the pistol was pointed at them in their imagination when the real victim in the incident threw up his hands to preserve his equilibrium as the horse struck him. MANY improvements are in prospect for the coming summer. The new Town Council will no doubt lead in much that is done.

THE advantages of Santa Clara County as a fruit growing section, says the Los Gatos Mail, were never so apparent as at present. Though early fruit has suffered from frost over almost the entire state Santa Clara orchards have remained untouched and our crops bid fair to be even larger than usual all of which should be taken into consideration by people looking for homes.

WHETHER or not any of the suggestions by the citizens on the improvement question can be carried out we will have to leave with the Town Council to determine. There will no doubt be improvements needed from time to time, however, that can, by a little pushing, be carried through. The Council can, in some instances, secure the assistance of the Supervisors in providing the means to push the improvements. They should see that our town secures its proper share of the financial aid provided for the public improvements and remember that it will not often be secured unless our claims are constantly and persistently set before the proper officers.

**LOTTERIES.**

An ordinance recently passed in the Common Council at San Jose makes it unlawful for any person to have in his possession a lottery ticket of any description. The reason for the passing of such an ordinance is not stated and there are a great many people, no doubt, who would think it very unreasonable even if an attempt had been made to point out the evils of the lottery business. If the information we get from those who seem to be pretty well informed on the subject is worth anything, there are thousands of lottery tickets sold in California every month. People who are highly respected and who have the reputation for honesty and uprightness in their ordinary dealings with their fellow men are among those who patronize the lottery. It seems to us there is need of education on this evil as much as on any other that we know of. Of the thousands of dollars that go out of our state every year to lottery companies we know there is but a small per cent given back in prizes. The bate is thrown out here and there so as to keep the people investing while the bank accounts of the men who run the game keep increasing until their wealth runs up into the tens of thousands. Where one person wins a thousand dollars two thousand or more each lose a dollar always leaving a balance in favor of the manipulator. It will readily be seen that a continuation of such a scheme will eventually bring great financial distress if not complete bankruptcy to the country which permits it to go on.

**CURRENT NEWS.**

Archbishop Kenrick of St. Louis is dead.

Revolutionists are losing ground in Nicaragua.

Two million dollars damage in New England by floods.

There is to be a railroad from Salt Lake to Los Angeles.

A narrow guage railroad is to be run into the Yosemite Valley from Merced.

An offensive-defensive alliance is said to have been formed between Russia and China.

Clara Barton of the Red Cross Society reports that she was very kindly received by the Sublime Porte.

Five thousand people assembled in Cooper Union, New York last Sunday night to give a sendoff to Ballington Booth's new religious movement.

Wisconsin convicts stole goods from the different work departments of the penitentiary at Waupun and through trustees arranged for their sale to outside parties.

More railroad franchise controversies are in sight at Riverside. The importance of the business of that city has prompted sharp competition for desirable depot sites.

The Escondido Fruit Exchange has shipped its first carload of oranges, the fruit being billed for Chicago. The second carload went out Wednesday evening, and is destined for Philadelphia.

Orange-growers on the peninsula of Lower California are cutting down their trees and will plant their acres with coffee, sugar cane and cotton. The low prices for Mexican oranges for several years have discouraged these growers. Cotton grows well along the coast. Plants 4 or 5 years old appear to bear as well as younger plants. The mildness of the climate affords few, if any, killing frosts.

White Caps attempted to run Bowen Sykes out of Hillsboro county, Florida, where he lives. Ten men went for that purpose; and when the battle was over four of them were dead and the other six so badly wounded, they could not be moved. There was a dead or wounded man for every house in the neighborhood. Sykes says he intends to stay if he has to kill every man in the neighborhood.

Italy's army has met with severe reverses in Abyssinia, losing 5,000 or more men in battle. There is great excitement, bordering on revolution. Crisp's cabinet has been overthrown, and a new one formed with Marquisdi Rudini at the head. There are rumors that the triple alliance will be dissolved, and an alliance formed with Russia, France and Italy as principals. The Italian people are bitterly opposed to further prosecution of the African war.

Wrathy Americans and wrathy Spaniards are enjoying themselves burning each other's flags. No one can tell how affairs are going in Cuba. The Spanish censorship seems to have shut off all news except those favorable to Spain. The most that has been learned is from an agent of the Cubans who has recently arrived, Maceo is five miles from Havana with 8,000 men. He has captured 2,800 Mansur and Rennington rifles from the Spaniards and several field pieces by waylaying and capturing supply trains. Of Maceo's men 6,000 are well armed. Since Weyler's Proclamation 8,000 men have joined the Cubans. The Cubans expect to have 40,000 men before Havana by April.

The members of the W. C. T. U. of Campbell cordially invite a perusal of this column, the matter for which is furnished by members of the society.

### A Converted Pocketbook.

The department of systematic and proportionate giving of the W. C. T. U. reports thirteen organizations of Christian women officially committed to the promotion of this reform. A women in Indiana attended a meeting whose theme was proportionate and systematic giving. She was, as she afterward said, "converted through and through." On going from the meeting she counted the money in her pocketbook, and at once laid aside a tenth for the Lord. Not only did she adopt the principal for herself, but she talked it up among her friends. When last heard from she had won to this method of Christian giving twenty-one persons, and still others are seriously considering the matter. Systematic and generous gifts to the Lord's work it is no more than our duty to give, but this duty-doing God rewards with a joy so overflowing and eager that it cannot help telling others about it. In this way the reform of the pocketbook will progress.

### Business Versus Business.

The liquor-dealers of Pennsylvania met at the State capital a few days ago to organize a co-operative league. The entire session was one of the best temperance lessons imaginable. The presiding officer was a notorious thug, and his gravel was a bung-starter. The president ignalized his election by drinking a small amount of water, "the first I've taken for a month." One especially significant sentence from his inaugural address is worth repeating: "I say to the temperance people, Attend to your business, and let us attend to ours." He did not mean that. It is not to the liquor dealer's interest to have the temperance people attending to their business of keeping pure the hearts and lips of the youth of the land, of promoting the purity of the home, the integrity of manhood. O no! These things cannot be done unless the vital blows are aimed at the

heart of the liquor traffic. The business of the temperance cause is to abolish the business of the rum-seller. "Let us attend to our business," say the liquor men; "our business of destroying homes, of casting down true manhood, blasting lives, filling the almshouses and jails, destroying the honor of the nation." Shall we, Christian citizens, shall we let this "business" go unhindered?

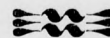

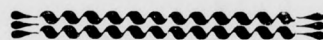

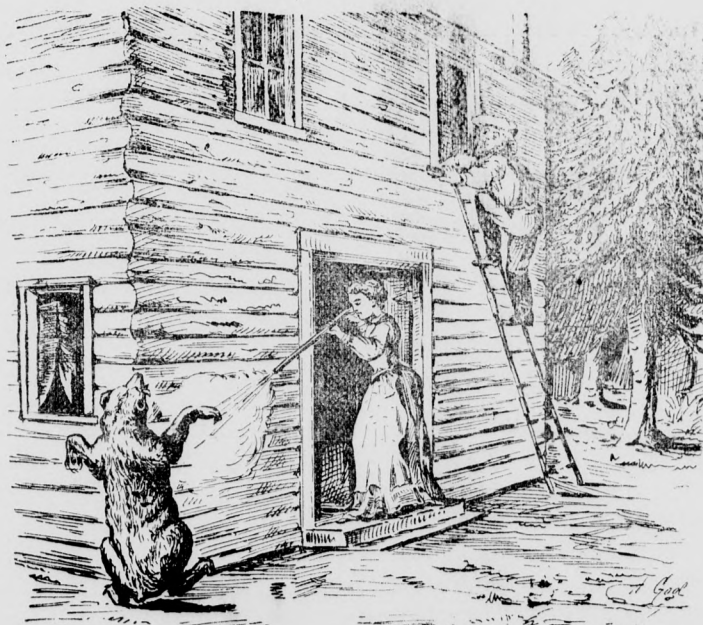
