

LA ABEJA.

NUEVA ORLEANS, 11 DE FEBRERO.

Nueva-Orleans y Febrero 5 de 1830.

En una junta celebrada, en casa del Señor Brinthal, por los cañeros, el Sr. Savage fue elegido para ocupar la silla presidencial; y habiendo reunido la comisión sometió las resoluciones siguientes; las que fueron, unanimemente, aprobadas.

Atendiendo a las tasas gravosas y opresivas que pesan, de algún tiempo a esta parte, sobre una población numerosa de habitantes ricos, etables de esta ciudad, que ejercen honradamente su industria con posadas, fundas, cafés, tiendas de convejables y cabarcos; ateniéndole igualmente a las medidas severas puestas en práctica contra esta clase de ciudadanos, sin haber dado margen a ellas de ningún modo, se ha juzgado conveniente formar una junta general, compuesta de otros individuos, para ponerse de acuerdo sobre los medios más eficaces para conseguir la reforma de este derecho tan injusto como arbitrante; al mismo tiempo para establecer, en cuanto sea posible, un sistema de igualdad entre estos y los demás, tanto en esta plaza como en las otras de la Unión, que ejercen igualmente su industria.— Sabemos, a no dudar, que varias personas, en la actualidad, tráfan en orgánica sumamente lacrimeada, sin que hallen fijada la atención en ellos la autoridad competente, como se ha hecho, tan justamente, con nosotros, y si se les notado, ha sido con tanta indiferencia que podemos, asegurar sin temor de error, que sofrié gravity sobre ellos un derecho puramente nominal. Sin estar poseídos de ningún sentimiento de equidad y preciándose de ridículas distinciones podríamos citar por ejemplo, a los propietarios de prensas de algodón, molinos de sierras y a los que importan efectos de mucho peso, cuyos secretos son, evidentemente, tan gravosísimos a la ciudad por la composición de las calles y caminos públicos. Si tratar de influenciar ni obligar a nadie a dar este mismo paso, los intereses humanos resulto representar, primariamente, de un modo muy respetuoso y sumiso al cabildo (conseil de ville) abín de conseguir la justicia, que implora mas, y de trasladarnos a casa de los Regidores (Aldermen) de nuestros respectivos distritos, con el objeto de suscitarles presentes la asistencia que en justicia juzgaren conveniente para obtener la reforma que aspiramos; y en caso que esta petición no surta un efecto favorable, en otros resultados, a punto en ejecución cuantos medios lícitos y legales sugiera la prudencia para alcanzar nuestro fin; consecuentemente, la comisión expuso ante la junta general, para su aprobación, las resoluciones siguientes:

1º. Que se nombrará un cierto número de directores con plenos poderes para actuar a favor de los tratantes, en general, del modo y según las circunstancias lo señalan.

2º. Que una petición concebida en los términos mas respectuosos al mismo tiempo energéticos, en la cual se respondan todas las causas que han motivado esta reunión, será presentada a los Sres. corregidores, (maires), presidente del cabildo, (recorder) y regidores, (aldermen) de esta ciudad; que en caso de presentarse la más leve dificultad en este asunto, la misma petición sería presentada ante los Ss. representantes del pueblo a fin de someterla a la consideración de la legislatura del Estado.

3º. Que se abre a una suscripción afín de crear las cantidades necesarias, no a la mitad para pagar a un abogado, sino para obtener el mas favorable éxito de las presentaciones de esta asamblea.

4º. Que se abran listas de suscripción en todos los cañeros, &c. &c. tanto en la ciudad como en sus arrabales (faubourgs) afín de recibir los nombres de las personas que tomen un empeño en la reforma de este negocio.

5º. Que en caso de hallar renuentes las autoridades, en conceder la justicia que se solicita de ellas, solo se apoye, en las próximas elecciones, a los que se manifiesten amigos de la justa reclamación que solicita una parte tan grande de esta vecindad.

6º. Que las resoluciones de esta comisión, sean impresas y publicadas en dos diarios, por lo menos, de esta ciudad en las lenguas francesa, inglesa y española; que el presidente quedó autorizado para nombrar una comisión competente de cinco personas por cada distrito, para que ésta se vea con los tratantes que crean pertenecientes en este asunto, afín de formar una suscripción y un fondo común para subvenir a los gastos que necesita la ejecución del proyecto de esta justa.

Resuelto: Que la reunión da las mas sinceras gracias al Sr. Brinthal por el favor que le ha dispensado en prestar su sala."

Humbug.—A solemn message was, as our readers are aware, sent on Tuesday by the President to the Congress of the United States, informing it that General Bolívar had offered him as a present, a gold medal. It being unconstitutional for any person holding any office of profit or trust under the United States, to accept, without the consent of Congress, any present from any foreign Government, and the acceptance of such a present being, under any circumstances, not exactly consonant with the spirit of our institutions, it has heretofore been the practice of our public men to decline, in respectful terms, any offer of the kind, and to say no more about it. But this was before the era of reform, humbug and display. The arch Purist now at the head of our Government, is, however, quite willing that a formal precedent should be set for the acceptance of foreign presents. His disinterested & magnanimous submission to the disposal of Congress, of a bauble which he had of himself no constitutional right to keep, is accompanied by a flaming enology on Bolívar—a man of whose principles and views the friends of liberty entertain a general and deep distrust. As this is the second time when Congress has been invoked to ratify foreign presents to General Jackson, and his first application was rejected, it may be expected that his friends will take care not to subject him to a second repulse. They should recollect that, even though the Bolívar medal should be confirmed to him, it will be but poor consolation for the loss of Indian nations of lands.

Another worthy, the Honorable Tom Moore, is a principal figure in this momentous message. It seems that since this extraordinary minister went to Colombia, the Government of that country has agreed to pay certain claims of American citizens in the cases of two vessels. The settlement of an Amer-

ican claim on a foreign Government being a thing entirely unprecedented in our history, was of course a fit subject of a message to Congress enologizing Mr. Moore, and must have the effect designed by it, of increasing the respect for him which had been previously excited in the public mind by his surprising ability and industry in franking.

London, Dec. 23.—We received last night the Paris paper by express, together with Austrian Observer of the 10th, and the Allgemeine Zeitung of the 15th.

Gen. Jackson appeals to his panegyric on Gen. Bolívar and Minister Moore, an affectionate epistle from the latter hero, in which he says—"I would have preferred sending the medal by a private conveyance; but opportunities of that kind seldom present themselves, and I have concluded that it may go as safely with the public despatches."

It seems, then, that Mr. Moore had entertained some doubts whether the conveyance by which public despatches were transmitted, would be as safe as a private conveyance, but that, after thinking, (whether so long as the Secretary of the Navy is accustomed to do, appears not,) after mature deliberation, he "concluded" in the affirmative. His indifference about the safety of the public despatches, when compared with his solicitude about the safety of the medal, is creditable to him as a Minister, that it cannot fail to confirm the existing opinion of the whole People of the United States, that he is "the wisest, virtuousest, discreetest and best" of Plenipot.

IN SENATE OF THE U. S.

JAN. 10, 1830.

Mr. Burton, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported the following bill which was read, and passed to a second reading:

A Bill.

To recompense the heirs of Robert Fulton, deceased.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. S. of America in Congress assembled, That, in consideration of the great benefits derived by the U. S. from the application of steam, by Robert Fulton, deceased, there be, and is hereby granted to the heirs of the said Robert Fulton, one township of the public lands of the U. S. to be located by them, or their guardians, or attorneys in fact, in either of the Territories of the United States, in quantities not less than a section or fractional section of lands, the sale of which is authorized by law, conformably to the lines of the public surveys, to all parties concerned.

SECT. 2. And be it further enacted, That the heirs aforesaid, or their guardians, or attorneys in fact, shall file of record, in the office of the Commissioner of the General Land Office of the U. S. within—after such locations shall have been made, a descriptive list thereof, to serve as evidence of such facts to all parties concerned.

"Berlin, Dec. 2.—The intelligence of the illness of his Majesty, the Emperor of Russia caused great alarm here at first, but according to the later accounts we may now make ourselves easy. At the first moment numerous reports, founded on suspicious conjectures, were in circulation, all of which have now disappeared. We hear that his Majesty's illness was caused by the following accident:—The Emperor and his August Consort sleep in the same wing of the palace. Between the bed-rooms on each side, in which the Princes and Princesses also sleep, next to their Majesties, is a large apartment or gallery, the floor of which is highly polished. During the night one of their Majesties children, raising up in bed, threw down a vase which stood on a bracket. The great noise caused by the fall, roused his Majesty from his sleep. He leaped out of bed in much alarm, and hastened to the room from which the noise proceeded, but slipped in the gallery and fell. The fright, the fall on his forehead, and the cold which he caught, produced his Majesty's indisposition. He derived great benefit from being bled immediately, and the fears of an inflammation of the brain, which might easily have been the consequence of the fall, are said to be now dispelled. In only a few hours the august Patient was delirious, and showed some symptoms of alarm of mind. It need not be stated that this unpleasant event excites general sorrow here; we, however, console ourselves with the hope that his majesty's vigorous constitution will overcome the effects of the accident, and we trust in the ability of his physicians. The life of the Emperor is of the highest importance to all Europe, and it cannot be denied that an event, which we trust is very distant, would lead to fresh embarrassments in the policy of Europe; and there is, therefore, but one unanimous wish for the speedy recovery of the universally beloved Monarch. The extraordinary interest that is felt for him here, more than any other place, is partly founded on the love and respect of the Prussians for the daughter of their King, the Empress of Russia.

It appears that the same method will be adopted in all the other offices of the kingdom.
