Shipwrecked in a smugglers' cove is not an event that occurs in the lives of many missionaries, but such was the experience of Dr. W. O. Ballantyne, who, accompanied by his wife, was wrecked on Oplum Island during a typhoon while en route to Victoria.

Here To-day

Dr. Ballantyne related his experiences to The Times to-day on the arrival of the Yokohama Maru. Some time ago he left India for Japan to visit his two sons, who are both in the consular service there, traveling, on the steamship Namshung. During the passage north along the China coast they were struck by a typhoon the force of which was so great that the vessel could not travel against it. The boat was driven before the typhoon until the mariners came in sight of Opium Island, which is fifteen miles north of Swatow. Here they put into Opium Bay, after-battling with huge seas. The boat had full steam on, but it took many hours to guide the vessel into safety. Great damage was done, the anchors falling to hold her, and all but one boat was smashed on the rocks, as the passengers and crew sought safety.

Monthly Tax Collection Endorsed by House

Saanich Fights Sewer Rental: Relief Plans Go Into Effect

Important changes in the city's taxation and business methods are provided in the Victoria private bill, brought before the Private Bills. She and Three of Gang Were British Missionary Says They Wounded; Escaped Number 30,000

Hongkong, Nov. 21 .- Storie of a female pirate leader and her desperate band of Chinese buccaneers who on Sunday seized the British steamship Suian, overcame the crew after a sanguinary battle and then escaped with all the cash and valuables on board, were related by the passengers who were landed from the vessel.

Throughout the piratical adventure the woman leader is said to have calmly directed the movements of her band and was wounded, together with three of the buccaneers, when the passengers and crew engaged them in battle.

The ship passed a few miles south of Hongkong unobserved. At daybreak she arrived at Bias Bay, north of Hongkong, where the pirates, taking their wounded and their loot, rowed ashore in small boats and disappeared.

Headquarters in Ottawa; Early Inspection Trip

Insurance men of Vancouver, represented by H. B. Robertson, K. C., appeared before the Municipal Committee of the Legislature to-day to complain that although the private bills committee of the House last year turned down the application of Vancouver city to tax fire insurance companies, the city had got through a general clause in its charter under which it is able to tax these companies.

Mr. Robertson declared that this clause had been slipped in the charter as a joker clause, and as a result Vancouver was taxing more than 150 of these companies 1900 a year. He pointed out that this was a right which no other municipality in the Province has, and asserted that it was never intended that Vancouver should have such a right.

Oscar Bass said that he represented Vancouver, objected to the clause being referred to as a joker, and said a full explanation would be given which would satisfy the committee.

Mr. Robertson: "That would suit us fine. We would like nothing better than the fullest and widest inquiry into this."

The committee, however, decided to send the insurance men before the private bills committee, as the Vancouver charter comes under that body. A hearing will be given later in the week.

Labor Men Lodge Memor-andum With Municipal Committee

"This Executive Committee of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada observes that representations have been made to your Committee with a view to transferring the cost of education from the Municipalities to the Provincial Government. Upon this point we have no objections to offer.

"But the further suggestion was made that the increased cost to the Province should be met by increased traation, net on those most able to pay, but on the very poorest of His Majesty's subjects resident within the Province. This is sought to be accomplished by the removal of the exemptions which now exist in regard to income tax. With the complete removal of all such exemptions wretchedly remunerated regardless of their family necessfues and responsibilities. This proposal impresses us as being hopelessly impracticable and utterly unjustifiable and will most assuredly incur the just condemnation of all enlightened practicable and utterly unjustifiable and will most assuredly incur the just condemnation of all enlightened citizens. Such a reactionary measure would bring the Province unfavorable notoriety wherever the English tongue was spoken and would mark the acceptance in this Province of an entirely new principle of taxation.

From this 'Ixtake it that "public spirited citizen" is not convined by or satisfied with an essay attempting to expose the fallacy of the Single Tax system, which cost for collecting and distributing at least \$2.400. Appeal Court Upholds Trans-yaal Employers' Tax

VICTORY BOND HOLDERS WILL RECEIVE CASH

Ottawa. Nov. 21.—The Department of Finance announces that holders of 1922 Victory Bonds, due December 1, can have their bonds paid of in cash of the bond issue maturing on December 1 is \$178,000,000, and conversions totalled more than \$100,000.000, cash payments for bonds will be in the neighborhood of \$78,000,000.

The statement of the Department says:

Bloemfontein, South Africa, Nov. 21 (Canadian Press Cable via Reuter's) — The South African Appeal Court has reversed the decision of the Transvaal Supreme Court, which declared that imposition of the employers' tax by the Transvaal Council was ultra vires.

Action was taken by the Crown Mines Company as a test against the act, which imposed a tax on the company of 2f sterling a head on every person employed by the company over the number of eight. The court held, that the Provincial Council had no power to tax profits derived from mining, but the higher court's decision now makes the tax valid.

"In order that holders may receive cash promptly at date of maturity, it will, be necessary, when dealing through a bank, to deliver the bonds for examination and llsting at least four days prior to December 1. Correspondingly, if bonds are presented to a bank on or after December 1. holders must be prepared to grant a few days for examination and verification before payment is effected."

Must Surrender Bonds.

Officials of the Department state that it appears from inquiries received that some holders have the impression that the principal of the bonds will be sent out by cheque automatically, as the interest is in the case of registered bonds. It is pointed out that payment of the principal can be effected only on surrender of the bonds themselves.

Attention is also directed to the fact that the bonds cease to bear interest on the maturity date.

If held thereafter, claims for further interest cannot be entertained.

Similar remarks were made about the money loaned under the Soldiers' Land Act and the Department of Industries. A big loss must be faced, he asserted, and there was no use of including these loans in the list of revenue-producers.

Mr. Jones concluded by saying that capital would not invest in this Province because of high taxation; that unemployment existed because industries did not pay and that settlers were leaving their lands because they could not pay their taxes. Taxation must be reduced, overhead expenses materially cut and land settlement encouraged.


Siki, Stepped On Again, Might As Well Hit Back for Senegal







that the Current price prevailing at the time in the city for services or commodities. It provides further that ratepayers may apply to the courts to restrain the Council from paying more than these current rates at any time for any service or commodity. Should the Council pay more than these rates, the legislation provides that the courts may order the Mayor and aldermen personally to repay all the money so spent to the city and fine them each \$100.

Plan Impracticable.

Lacding the attack on this plan, Alderman E. S. Woodward said that the whole idea wan impracticable. It was impossible for the current price of a commodities at all times. The commodities at all times and opaint?" he asked. "It is probably different at every, atore, and if the city happened to pay a price higher than that, provailing in some store we could be haled before all judge and fined \$100. Again, when it comes to salaries, what is the current price of a solicitor? How can we estimate that?"

Alderman Woodward said the framers of the proposed legislation knew that the city was paying \$4 a day to laborers who could be replaced by unemployed at \$2 a day or less and they desired that the Council be restrained from paying more than the latter figure. "And \$4 a day is a magnificent sum on which to keep a wife and family in these times!" he remarked.
