

ORDINANCE NOP 18

A N ORDINANCE CREATING AND DEGANIZIN ; AND PROVID-ING FOR A BOARD OF HEALTH AND FOR THE APPOIN MENT OF A HEALTH OFFICER IN AND FOR THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH BOARD.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Board of Health in and for the said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regularly licensed physician and a graduate of some reputable school of medicin .; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board of Tru-tees and shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Board. The Board shall hold its meetings in the City Hall in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular, and aneals have t ings of the Board shall be open to. the public.

Section 3. - The Ma shal of said city shall be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be exofficio Health Officer of said city.

Section 4 .- Three members of the Board of Health shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a has number may adjourn from day to day and compet the attendance of absent members in such manner as the Board may prescribe. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure.




