## TERMS

*Upon which will be Farmed out the consumption of Salt in the town and the environs of Batavia, for the year 1813.*

**1.—** **T**HIS Farm will be sold for the period of one year, or from the 1st of January to the 31st of December, 1813, payable in Spanish Dollars, one-third in silver, and two-thirds in paper money, at Rix Dollars 6½ for one Spanish Dollar.

**2.—** The Salt made within the jurisdiction of Batavia, shall be wholly and exclusively delivered to the Farmer, on pain of confiscation and paying double the price of sale on discovery of having acted to the contrary.

**3.—** If Salt be scarce, the Farmer shall pay 6 Spanish Dollars, or 30 Rix Dollars copper to the Salt-makers for one great or double coyang, or so much less as without vexation, and conveniently may be done, and he shall moreover be obliged to accept the whole of the quantity of Salt made within the jurisdiction of Batavia.

**4.—** The Farmer shall dispose of Salt at no higher rate than 36 stivers copper coin per gantang, or equal to that rate in silver or paper money.

**5.—** The proprietors of lands where Salt ponds are found, shall for the Salt made on their lands and delivered to the Farmer, receive 16 gantangs from the Salt-makers and 24 gantangs from the Farmer in value, at the rate specified in Article 3d, but not in kind.

**6.—** The Salt-makers shall be obliged to have a licence of the Farmer for every Salt-pond they wish to lay on, to watch over which, and to prevent clandestine sale of Salt, the Farmer shall be at liberty to appoint a proper person to make his stay at such place.

**7.—** The Salt imported from without the jurisdiction of Batavia, shall be disposed of solely to the Farmer at an equal rate to its value here, including all the expences.

**8.—** The Farmer shall for as long as he is not provided with his own prows, be at liberty of disposing over all these timber prows and prows peppang, and their men as are usually going to and fro to Pakkies and other places within the jurisdiction of Batavia, to fetch off Salt from thence four times a year, provided he pays freight at 30 Rix Dollars paper money, or pro rato in silver or copper coin, or so much less as he may contract for one great or double coyang.

**9.—** The Farmer shall be at liberty of having all deficiencies paid for at the market price by the initials or owners of prows by its unloading at this place, if such deficiencies exceed five gantangs per coyang.

**10.—** The Farmer shall be obliged to provide with Salt the Potyas or holders of the Bazars respectively in the environs of Batavia, beyond the 6th pole, at the rate of Rix Dollars 129 copper money, for one small or single coyang, when reasonable notice be given to him by each of them of the quantities they will be in want of for their said Bazars, and it shall be allowed to them to levy on each gantang two stivers copper, more than at Batavia, and thereabouts to the 6th pole inclusive.

**11.—** The Farmer shall be obliged to take care, that a sufficient quantity of Salt be at hand, for the consumption of Batavia and the environs, and shall allow no Salt to be exported without the jurisdiction of Batavia, but by approbation and licence of the Magistrates.

**12.—** The Farmer shall be obliged to sell the Salt calculated for the consumption of the Preanger Districts at the same rate as heretofore, or for a price equal to what is paid for the same at Pakkies, and such shall be the case with the necessary quantity of Salt required for the consumption of Buitenzorg, but the Farmer of Buitenzorg shall be obliged to indemnify the Farmer of Salt for the expences fallen upon it from Pakkies to Batavia.

**13.—** The day previous to the day of Sale of the Salt Farm, every one who may have more than one quarter of a Coyang of Salt in his possession or under his charge shall be obliged to state it to the Magistrates, on pain of confiscation and paying double the price of Sale on discovery of having acted to the contrary.

**14.—** All the potyas or holders of Bazars in the environs of Batavia, shall take care that the Sale of Salt received by them extends no further then their Bazars respectively, on pain of the transgressors hereof being punished by due authorities according to the exigency of the case.

**15.—** Should it happen that not sufficient Salt was made at Bantam for the consumption there, the Farmer shall be obliged to provide it by procuring the required quantities from Pakkies to the retailers at Bantam, at the rate of Rix Dollars 80 copper coin, or Spanish Dollars 16, for one small single Coyang.

**16.—** The Farmer shall, at the beginning of his Farm, have credit for three months, but shall make restitution of those arrears to Government in the fourth month, and afterwards pay his Farm money regularly within the first six days of every month without any exception whatever.

**17.—** The Successor in his Farm shall be obliged to take over from him all those quantities of Salt, which at the expiration of his Farm may be at hand, on paying the fixed prime Cost by Art. 2, and the charges.

**18.—** The said successor to the Farmer shall also be obliged to take over from him all prows, godowns, or lombongs belonging to the Kongsy of this Farm, by valuation of two impartial persons to be

appointed by both the Farmers for that purpose.

19.—The Farmer shall give two approved Securities by Government, for the due fulfillment of the aforesaid terms, and in case of failure, this Farm shall be resold at his risk, and he and his Securities be held responsible for all the losses sustained.

## CONDITIES

Waar op de Consumptie van het Zout in de stad en ommelanden van Batavia, voor den Jare 1813 zal worden verpacht.

1.—DZE verpachting zal zyn voor den tyd van een Jaar ingaande met den 1ste Januari en eindigen de met den 31ste December 1813, en opgeveld worden in Sp. Matten betaalbaar  $\frac{1}{2}$  in zilver en  $\frac{1}{2}$  in papiere geld, de Sp. Mat gerekend tegens Rds. 6—24, papiere geld ieder.

2.—Al het Zout dat in de Jurisdictie van Batavia zal worden aangemaakt, zal by uitsluiting aan den Pachter moeten worden geleverd sub poene van Confiscatie en de dubbele waarde van dien in contrarie gevallen.

3.—De Pachter zal waner het Zout schaars is van de Zout makers voor de groote of dubbele Coyang betalen 6 Sp. Matten in zilver of Rds. 10 Japans koper geld, of zoo veel minder als hy naar billijkheid by een ruime voor raad van dat artikel zeider vexatien zal kunnen bedingen; en zal hy Pachter tevens verplicht zyn te acceptieren al het Zout dat in de Jurisdictie van Batavia zal worden aangemaakt.

4.—De Pachter zal het Zout niet hoger dan wel minder mogen verkopen als de Gantang tegen 23 St. koper geld dan wel in zilver of papier daar inde gelykstaandig.

5.—De Eigengas van de Landeryen waer Zout punnen gevonden worden, zullen op het Zout dat aangemaakt en aan de Pachter afgeleverd word van de Zout makers 16, en van den Pachter 24 Gantangs genieten wel te verstaan in gelden en dus niet in natura, berekend tegens de prys by Art. 3.

6.—De Zout makers zullen verplicht zyn van ieder nieuwe Zout paand die ze zullen wille aanleggen een bewys van den Pachter te vragen en waarom, en ook om den Clandistinen verkoop van Zout tegen te gaan, den Pachter de vryheid zal hebben zulks te laten surveilleren door israam die hy zal goed vinden aldaar te plaatsen.

7.—Al het Zent dat van eliers buiten de Jurisdictie van Batavia zal worden ingevoerd, zal alleen aan den Pachter en niemand anders mogen worden verkocht, voor de prys waar op den Pachter het Zout niet alle de ongelden daar op beswaard, almer te staan koat.

8.—De Pachter zal zo lang hy niet van eigen Vaartuigen zal wezen voorzien, 4 maal in het Jaar ter afhaal van zout van Pakkies of elders onder de Jurisdictie van Batavia, kunnen disponeren over alle hout Prauwen, en Prauw papangs die gewoonlyk op een afvaren met de daar op vereischte wordende manschappen, mits betalende voor de groote of dubbele Koyang aan vracht, waner den Pachter zulks niet minder kan bedingen Rds. 30. Japans koper geld of zo naer rato in zilver of papier.

9.—De Pachter zal het recht en de faculteit hebben om alle deficiencia op het Zout by uitlevering alhier door de voerders of eigenaars der Prauwen te laten vergoeden tegens den markt of verkoops prys, in dien de minderheid op het zelvemee meer als 5 Gantangs per Koyang zal komen te bedragen.

10.—De Pachter zal verplicht zyn, aan de respective Bazaar houders of Pottias van de onderscheidene Bazaars in de Oonne of Boyenkanden boven de 6de paal van Batavia, het Zout af te staan tegens Rds. 120. koper geld de kleine Koyangs, mits aan hem door een ieder voor af wordie opgegeven de quasiteit Zout die ze voor henne Bazaars zullen benodigen, en zullen de altoos 2 st. koper per Gantang meer mogen heffen als in en om de Stad tot de 6 paal inclusive.

11.—De Pachter zal verplicht en gehouden zyn te zorgen dat altoos op Batavia een genoegzame hoeveelheid zout voor de consumptie van de Stad en Oannelanden aan handen zy, en zal geen zout voor den uitvoer buiten de jurisdictie van Batavia mogen afstaan, dan met voorkennis en naar geöbtineerde licentie van de Magistrat.

12.—De Pachter zal het zout dat voor de consumptie van de Preanger Regentschappen gerekend magt worden te benodigen afstaan tegens dezelve pryzen als bevorens dat is: tegens den prys waarop

hun dat artikel te pakkies te staan komt, en zal zulks inzelvervoegen geschieden met de quaniteit die gerekend mag worden voor de consumptie van Buitenzorg te benodigen, mits den Pachter van Buitenzorg den zout Pachter schadeloos stelt voor de onkosten daarop van Pakkies naar Batavia gemaakt.

13.—De dag voor de verpachting van het zout, zal een ieder, die meer als een quart koyang in zyn bezit of onder zyn berusting heeft, daarvan opgave doen aan den Magistraat, sub poene van confiscatie en de dubbele waarde van dien waner bevonden zal worden hier tegens te hebben gehandeld.

14.—Alle Potias of Bazaarholders in de Bataviase Ommelanden zullen het debiet van het by hun ontfangea zout, niet verder mogen extenderen als binnen hannie respective Bazaars, sub poene dat in contrarie gevallen de contraventeurs naar exigentie van zaken zullen worden gecorrigert door de autoriteiten daartoe bevoegd.

15.—Zoo het mocht gebeuren dat op Bautan voor eigen consumptie geen zout genoeg wierd aangemaakt zal den Pachter van dat zilt alhier verplicht zya hetzelde aitestaan aan de Bataviase Handelaars tegus Ryksd: 80 Japans koper, ef 16 Spaansche matten de kleine koyang.

16.—De Pachter zal by den aanvang van zya Pacht drie Maanden crediet hebben, en daarna dezedrie agterstallige Maanden in de vierde Maand van zya Pacht termijn aan het Gouvernement restituereen, en vervolgens met den 6de van ieder lopende Maand zyn Pachtschat maandelyksch volloen zonder enige exceptie.

17.—De aankomende Pachter zal verplicht zyn van den afgaande over te nemen al het zout welke by het uiteinde van de gestipuleerde Pacht tyd aanhanden zal wezen, tegen betaling van de gefixeerde inkoops prys by artikel 3 bepaald met de daaraop berekende ongilden.

18.—Ook zal de aankomende Pachter van de afgerefene moetien overnemen, alle de Vaartuigen, Pakhuizen of Lemboangs tet de Kongsi van deze Pacht gehoorende, onder bitlyke taxatie van oportydige lieden door de beide Pachters daartoe te bencenen.

19.—De Pachter zal voor de naarkoming der bovenstaande Condities behoorlyke cautie stellen ten genoegen van het Gouvernement, en zoophy tagebreeke mocht blyven zai deze Pacht ten zynre risico op nieuw worden opgeveld, zulcende alle schaden daarop te lyden door hem en zyne borgen worden vergoed, zuander dat hy eenige aanspraak zal kunnen maken op de daarop te valde voordelen.

CONDITIONS and Terms on which the following Revenue Farms of Government will be disposed of for the year 1813, at the Stadt-house of Batavia, on the 24th December, viz.

1.—The licence for keeping Vegetable shops.

2.—The capitation of the Chinese.

3.—The licence for slaughtering Catte, with permission to th' farmer to levy the Farm duties in copper duits.

4.—The licence for killing Hogs, Shorn Goats, and Sheep, the Farm duties to be levied by the Farmer in copper duits.

5.—The licence for Manufacturing Wax-candles, the Farm duties to be levied by the Farmer in copper duits.

6.—The licence for cutting Chinese Tobacco.

7.—The Rice-market.

8.—The Fish-market, on such stipulations as have been established by the conditions of Farms, of the 14th December, 1811.

9.—The Wayangs.

10.—The Weighing Farm, on conditions separately formed thereof.

11.—The consumption of Arrack for Batavia and its Environs, on terms separately formed thereof, under date the 27th November, 1811.

12.—The Trade to Ships and Vessels in the Roads.

13.—The pass for a Chinese Junk for trading to Macassar, in the year 1814.

14.—The consumption of Salt for Batavia and its Environs, on conditions separately formed thereof on the 4th Dec.

The Farmers shall be bound to pay monthly, beyond their Farm-money to Government, five per cent to the Collector of Customs, and the above said Farms shall further be sold on such general conditions and terms as were stipulated in the year 1797, and in the alterations made besides them in and since the year 1800, for as far as they are not inconsistent with the alterations now made.

Also, shall at the day and place pre-

scribed, be disposed of for the year 1813.

15.—The Sait and the Bhoom at Bantam, on conditions separately formed thereof on the 23d November last.

All the above said Farms shall be sold for Spanish Dollars, first by abatement, and then by high bidding.—Payment is to be made in gold or silver coin, or at the option of the purchaser, one-third in gold or silver, and the remaining two-thirds in Batavia paper currency, at the rate of 6½ Rix dollars for one Spanish dollar, agreeable to the Proclamation of the Right Honorable Lord MINTO, bearing date the 11th September, 1811.

2.—That the duties of this Committee be confined to the examination of every estimate, contract, contingent disbursement, or indent, which may be referred to their consideration by the Commander of the Forces or by Government, and in particular cases, on any general question involving considerable expence or supply, when such examination is required thereon.

3.—That the Civil Architect do attend the Committee, for the purpose of assisting with his opinion on the calculations of labour and materials.

4.—That each Member do record his opinion on the subject referred to the Committee, and that these recorded opinions be transmitted to the Lieutenant Governor in Council through the Commander of the Forces.

5.—That a Secretary and two Clerks be allowed for the Committee.

6.—That in the establishment of the regulations for the transaction of the business of the Committee, a reference be had so far as the powers and objects of this Committee extend, to the forms and usages established for the conduct of the Military Board in Bengal.

Yesterday forenoon, the Honorable Company's extra ship Harriet, Captain Lynch, laying at the Honorable Company's Chain Moorings, close to Chaundpaul Ghaut, (with great part of her cargo on board, and nearly ready to proceed down the river to complete it,) unfortunately took fire, (we believe in the Fore-hold,) the alarm was instantly given, and the most prompt assistance was afforded by the Departments of the Master Attendant, the Naval Store Keeper, and the Harbour Master, with their Boats and People, also the Boats Officers and People of the different Ships laying off the Town; the activity of Commanders lies on this melancholy occasion, was particularly conspicuous; he was almost the first on board, accompanied by an Engine; all his department were upon the alert; the progress of the flames were however so rapid as to baffle all human exertion, the ship was cut from the Moorings to prevent the fire communicating with the contiguous shipping, and she swung upon the bank, immediately below Chaundpaul Ghaut, where she was scuttled, so that the water just covered the Orlop Deck, and we understand much of the cargo in the hold may probably be saved, no doubt, somewhat damaged.

At the time the paper was put to press, the flames were still raging violently, not

then having reached the water's edge.

The scene was awfully sublime—and attracted an immense concourse of spectators.—The agility of the fearless Mariners—amidst the falling of masts, yards, and rigging, enveloped with flames and smoke, presented a view terrific beyond hasty description.

Had this melancholy accident happened upon a flood tide, the damage would doubtless have been almost incalculable, amongst the crowded tiers of valuable ships laying immediately to the Northward of the Harriet, very fortunately in this lamentable case, the Harriet was the most southerly of all the shipping laying at the Calcutta Chain Moorings.

We lament to add that since writing the above, the Salt Petre Cargo, in the hold has blown up with several terrible explosions—and literally covered the esplanade with sulphur;—there are now no hopes of but very trifling fragments of the wreck being saved.

# SUPPLEMENT TO THE JAVA GOVERNMENT GAZETTE.

## Proclamation.

THE Right Honorable the Governor General having by Proclamation under date the 11th September 1811, judged it expedient to provide a Fund for the gradual liquidation of the Paper Currency, or for reducing its amount within such limits as may appear convenient and advantageous to the Public, and to direct that the said Paper should be charged with an annual duty of 5 per cent on the value thereof fixed to be levied on the renewal of the Stamp, the Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council in pursuance thereof, is pleased to direct that the said duty be forthwith levied for the present year, and notice is in consequence hereby given that Messrs. Boswell, Van Beusechem, Kamphuis, S. Bredero, Schill, Killian, Barends and Reinking are appointed under the Superintendance of the Secretary to Government to attend from the 1st of December next, until the 31st day of January next ensuing daily, Sundays and Christmas-day excepted, from 8 o'clock till noon, for the purpose of receiving the duty of 5 per cent, and re-stamping such paper Notes of Individuals, as shall be presented for that purpose.

2.—For the convenience of the Public, two Offices will be established, one at the Stadt-house, and one at the Government House, Molenvliet, at both of which attendance will be given daily as above directed.

3.—By this arrangement it is deemed that sufficient time will be given for all the paper in circulation to be stamped, and therefore notice is further given that it is the positive intention of Government not to extend the stamping of the paper currency after the 31st January next.

4.—With a view to ensure an early tender of the Paper for Stampment, the new duty of 5 per cent shall affect all Paper whatever, stamped or not, from the 1st January, 1812, and from and after that date no Paper which has not been re-stamped, shall be a legal tender under the Proclamation of the 11th September, 1811, except with the deduction or allowance of 5 per cent for the said duty.

5.—All Paper which may not have been re-stamped before the 1st February, 1812, will cease to be acknowledged after that date.

6.—A commission will be appointed at Samarang and Sourabaya to re-stamp such paper as may be presented for that purpose, and will sit from the 15th December 1812, until the 31st January 1813, as above stated.

That no person may plead ignorance of this Proclamation the same is directed to be published in the English and Dutch languages in the next and two subsequent Gazettes, and translated into the Native languages and affixed at the usual places at Batavia, Samarang and Sourabaya.

TENDER OF BANK-NOTES FOR RE-

### BRAY v. HILL.

The Plaintiff in this case brought his action to recover damages from the defendant, having unlawfully distrained upon his goods after the sum due for rent had been tendered.

Mr. Garrow said, this was a case which never expected to have had to state in a Court of Justice. He thought it had been completely put out of doors, and that no person would have chosen to agitate it. Still however, did he imagine that an Attorney that Court would have stepped forward as a candidate for the honour of trying such a question. The Plaintiff occupied property to a considerable amount, belonging to a Mrs. Shepherd, mother of Mr. Shepherd, an Attorney of Court, situated in Holborn. Mr. Shepherd acted as agent for his mother in regard to the property, and was in the use of receiving rent of it, on her account. On the 20th January last, the rent then due, amounting to 54 guineas, was tendered to Mr. Shepherd; but he refused to receive it, unless it was paid in the current coin of the country—that is to say, in guineas. A proper tender, the Learned Counsel understood, would be proved to have been made. It would be for the Defendant, Mr. George Blundell Hill, who made the levy, under orders of Mr. Shepherd, to account for his conduct.

Mr. Samuel Barker, Attorney for the Plaintiff, proved the tender of the rent due having been made to Mr. Shepherd on the 20th January. Mr. Shepherd objected to receive it until it was paid in the current coin of the realm. He said Mr. Bray had been impudent to him, that he was determined to punish him, and to train upon his goods, against 4 o'clock this afternoon, unless the rent was paid to him in the current coin of the country. He did not mention his mother. A distress was put on the Monday, being the 22d July, and the goods were replevied. Mr. Shepherd, at the same time, said, that, when the next quarter became due, he would sue on the covenant of the lease, unless the rent was paid in the current coin.

Creecy, hostler to the Plaintiff, proved that the defendant came in to the Plaintiff's house, to make the levy, on the 22d July. The witness saw the amount tendered to the defendant in Bank of England notes, before the distress was made—but which the defendant refused to accept, saying, he would have nothing but gold, or hard cash. The individual notes then tendered to the defendant, the witness had kept in his possession ever since and now produced.

Mr. Parke was about to address the Jury on the part of the defendant, when Lord Ellenborough interrupted him by himself addressing the Jury. Mr. Parke begged that he might be allowed to say a few words by way of explanation. Lord Ellenborough said—"Not a word." His Lordship was sorry to be obliged to tell the Gentlemen of the Jury, that, in point of law no legal tender had, in this case, been made. As the law stood, Bank of England Notes were not a legal tender. They did not sit there to make law, but to administer the law as it stood. He was sorry to tell them that such was the law; but he could not help the law more than the Jury could.

Mr. Parke assured his Lordship, that it was no fault of his that the present case had come before a Jury.

Lord Ellenborough, again addressing the Jury, said, his inclinations, he was convinced, were the same with their's; but their duty also was the same. To the inconvenience which such a verdict as they must pronounce in this case must necessarily impose on the Public, his Lordship was far from being insensible; but still, both his Lordship and the Jury must do what their duty imposed on them. The Jury accordingly found for the defendant.

Lord Ellenborough, after another trial had been disposed of, reverting to the present case observed, that to the best of his recollection, a provision had been made in the late Act of Parliament, (Earl Stanhope's) as to tenders in payment of rent. Mr. Garrow said, unfortunately in the present case, the distress had been put in on the very afternoon previous to that on which the Act in question received the Royal Assent. It could, therefore, have no effect on this case.

## SUPREME COURT OF JUSTICE.

On Saturday, being the first day of the fourth Term of the present year, the Court was opened with the usual formalities.

Their Lordships were entirely occupied in hearing the motions of the several Barristers, and adjourned at an early hour to this day. The number of suit in Equity at present on the bar, is unusually great, few however, are of very interest. In the Sittings, about the latter end of next month, a cause will come before their Lordships, in which Lieut. Oliver P. Pinxit, and Lieut. Charles Hamilton Bell, Defendant. It is a case of *Crim. Con.*

Thursday last, a Coroner's Inquest was held on the body of a Portuguese Sailor, who drowned himself in a tank near the Bythana-Khana. The circumstances which led to this man's death are worthy of notice: It appears that he had been without employment for some time past, and had greatly addicted himself to drinking; returning home in a state of intoxication on Thursday morning, his mother upbraided him with his dissolute habits; being enraged at her reproaches, the wretch seized the helpless old woman and carried her to a neighbouring tank, where he attempted to drown her; in this he was fortunately prevented by the timely interference of two persons, against whom he then directed all his rage, and actually succeeded in throwing one of them into the water, from whence he was taken in a lifeless state. The Portuguese man, stimulated either by the exacerbations of his own wrath, or by fear of the consequences of these murderous attempts, plunged into the tank, and was drowned.

His Majesty's Frigate *Modeste* is expected to arrive in England in the course of a few days. The final packet for the *Gaulford* was despatched from town on Monday evening last; that ship put to sea on Friday morning. The Regent and Earl St. Vincent have sailed from Sangor since our last.

## TRACT OF A LETTER FROM ON BOARD THE REGENT.

" September 21, 1812.

" We have met with so many misfortunes that I last addressed you, I am almost astonished at our having escaped destruction. Yesterday evening we broke one of our largest anchors; and the ship drifted upwards of two hours before it was observed. Fortunately, however, the alarm was given at day-break in the morning, just as the ship was tailing the rocks on the long sand. In less than five hours more, we should certainly have been found."

To-day, our ill fortune seemed still to follow us; another of our anchors having broken, two feet below the stock: and the ship was so completely water-logged, by taking water at her hawse-holes, that we were near going to the bottom. I hope however, that we are now at length clear of our ganders."

The *Hammon Shaw*, we understand, was to pieces very rapidly on Sangor beach, the beginning of last week; and it was feared that but little of the property on board could be preserved.

On the 5th current, the Arab ship *Fathool-kire* was abandoned by her crew, who arrived at Bissenpoor on the same day in the ship's launch. The *Fathool-kire* was last seen in a sinking condition, under the east end of Sangor.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief and suite were expected to reach Cawnpore on the 16th or 17th current.

On Wednesday the 5th August, the Honorable Mount Stuart Elphinstone, the British Resident with his Highness the Peishwa took leave of the Paadivwar Camp, at a dinner given by Major Anthony and the officers of the Grenadier Battalion; the table exhibited the best viands that could be prepared, and the wines were excellent. After dinner the President gave the following toasts:—

The Prince Regent.

Lord Minto and the Government of India.

Mr. Elphinstone, and may continued success and happiness attend him through life.— This toast was drunk "three times three" with the greatest enthusiasm.

The policy of the times that gives us such agreeable company.

Lord Wellington and the armies in Spain and Portugal.

Several capital Songs and Duets were given with great taste and in good voice; the utmost conviviality prevailed; and between 11 and 12 o'clock, the company broke up with one general feeling of regret at the departure of their much esteemed and highly respected guest.

The cause in which Patrick Crawford Bruce, Henry Fawcett, George Simpson, John De Poerthieu, William Crawford, James Pennington, John Forbes, and James Henry Crawford, Merchants of Bombay, are Plaintiffs, and the Hon. E. I. Company and William Egerton, are Defendants, is expected to be heard in a few days.

The object of this Suit is to oblige the Company to give an 8 per cent. Promissory Note in exchange for a Bombay Certificate, under the conditions of the Bombay Loan, of the 2d of September 1809. The Interest on about Thirty Lacs of Rupees, is depending on the issue of this Suit.

The Plaintiffs subscribed 25,000 Rupees to the Loan advertised in the Bombay Courier of the 21st January, 1809. Blank Numbers were left on the Bengal Register, for the reception of the transfers from the other Presidencies; and the Company offered to give a Promissory Note, when the Certificate was presented in September, 1809; which, if accepted by the Complainants, would be found to have been advertised to be paid off, (and the Interest thereon to have ceased) several months before it was issued.

If the Plaintiffs gain their cause, the whole of this Loan at Bombay, must be put on the Register of the Bengal Debt, in succession to all the 6 per cent. Loans; and consequently would not be paid off until the 6 per cent. Loans are discharged.

## LOSS OF THE SHIP EUROPA.

The following letter respecting the loss of the country ship Europa is published by permission.

MASTER ATTENDANT'S OFFICE,  
Point de Galle, August 19, 1812.

SIR,  
I have the honor to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that yesterday there anchored in this harbour a Maldiva boat, having on board a Mr. May and ten Lascars, part of the crew of the ship Europa.

Mr. May reports to me, that he embarked as Passenger on board the ship Europa, Captain Always, at the Isle of France, which place they left on the 28th of April with a Cargo of Sundries, for Batavia, and that on the 28th of May, they were wrecked on a Southern Group of the Maldiva Islands.

That all the Crew were saved; that the Island they were wrecked on was uninhabited; but that people came from the neighbouring Islands with boats, and carried every body to an in-

habited Island, about 15 miles off, and from thence, they were carried to King's Island, where they have been supported by Government, and were well treated.

Mr. May states that there was but little saved from the Ship by the Crew, but what was saved, the Captain was allowed to bring on with him, and that the Islanders afterwards saved a number of Muskets and Pistols, which were in the Ship as Cargo, and which he understands the King has sent on, in the four Boats he had allotted for the Captain, Passengers, and Crew; of these Boats, which sailed together one was bound to Colombo, the other three to Galle, but one only has fetched in, the others were in sight, but to leeward and have probably made Battigam or Gandurah—in one of these Boats, is the Captain with Two Dutch Young Ladies (Sisters) of the name of Du Frankemente, who had been at the Isle of France, for their Education, and were returning to their Family and Friends at Batavia, as also two Young Gentlemen (Brothers) of the name of Barbier, who had been sent from Batavia for the same purpose.

Mr. May speaks in the highest terms of the treatment they met with at the Maldivas.

The Europa, was a Bengal Ship, and had a valuable Cargo; both Ship and Cargo the property of a Mr. Douglas.

The number on board at the time the Ship was wrecked, including Captain, Passengers, and Crew, was forty-three; of which number, one Secony only died at the Maldiva, the rest have been sent on in these Boats, and the whole left the Maldivas on the 13th of this month.

In addition to the above Intelligence we are happy to state that information has since been received of the arrival of the two Boats stated to have fallen to Leeward, in one of which was Captain Always late Commander of the Ship; and on the 19th the Boat bound for Colombo anchored in this harbour having on Board a Hind and 9 Lascars; a Messenger from the Sultan likewise arrived in her, bearing a Letter for His Excellency the Governor.—since the Island of Ceylon has been an appendage of the Crown of Great Britain it has been customary for the Sultan of the Maldivas to send annually an Embassy to this Government with a Letter and some trifling Presents, to which a suitable answer is return and a request made that the Sultan would afford aid to any British Ships touching at the Islands. A Present, consisting of a few articles of small value, accompanies the Letter to the Sultan.
