


This painstaking care in keeping varieties pure and well-bred is not spectacular. It isn't even noticeable, because you learn to expect uniformly good results from Maule's seeds. But it goes on constantly—testing, and checking, and re-selecting the old varieties.

Our concern with these old ones is understandable when you realize that thousands of new varieties have been presented to the publ c in the last two generations, and yet many of our most popular strains are more than 50 years old.

This general policy means something to you. It means that you can buy familiar kinds of vegetables or flowers and have them turn out exactly as you expect them to. It also means that new varieties offered in these pages must possess exceptional merit. We have seen too many highly touted, fly-by-night, seedsmen's introductions to place our faith and yours in doubtful new strains. Everything you buy, new or old, has been examined under rigid testing rules. We are sincere in our effort to live up to our motto, "The Old Reliable Seed House."

recommend it without any reservations whatever.

Tender Pod is one of the earliest varieties to produce pods of edible size, in season with Bountiful, and usually slightly ahead of Burpee's Stringless Green-Pod. The pods are attractive, very dark, velvety green in color, straight to slightly curved, 4½ to 5 in. long, round in cross section, smooth, with long and distinctly curved tips.


Tender Pod produces more pods per plant than any other variety in the early group. It bears over a longer season than any other early variety; the vines remain green and growing when other early beans have withered. The plants are dwarf, vigorous, dark green, and may be planted closer in the row than other varieties. Seed of Tender Pod is a clear, shining white, with a small red dot on either side of the eye. It makes an excellent dried bean.

But all these characteristics of Tender Pod merely support its superlative tenderness and flavor. Because of these qualities you'd grow it in your garden even if it had small pods, a light yield, and were the latest variety in the catalog. You'll be astonished to find that from the time the pods are large enough to use until they are yellow and aged with fully developed beans in them they are completely stringless and entirely without fiber. They're good at any time, and you don't waste beans because the pods are too old to use.

We feel that Tender Pod has a very promising future as a garden bean. For market the pods may be a trifle small; however, we are sure that it will in time become the standard of quality for a special trade that knows how good green beans can be.

a brilliant, translucent crimson, with the vivid color following the veins right up into the dark green, crumpled leaves. This unusual coloring makes the chard look like rhubarb.

The stalks of Rhubarb Chard are particularly delicious, and are used right along with the leaves when they are boiled for greens. Stálks are also cooked separately, dipped in batter, and fried to make fritters.

Swiss Chard is extremely easy to grow, since it is not particular about the kind of soil or weather conditions. It goes on producing all summer long, providing an abundant supply of greens at all stages of



Brussels Sprouts 108 Danish Prize

(125 days)

(125 days)

The most delicately flavored vegetable of the entire cabbage family. Plants grow medium tall and produce an abundance of large, solid, dark green, tightly folded "sprouts" or little cabbage-like heads along the stem. Grow in moderately rich soil to avoid an excess of leaves. Sow seed in April or May in the open ground. Transplant in rows 3 ft. apart and 18 in. apart in the row. When the "sprouts begin to form at the base of the stalk, break off the lower leaves to give them more room for growth. A packet of seed produces about 300 plants; one ounce, 3000 plants; 4 to 6 ounces to plant an acre. The seed crop is very short.

Artichoke 2 Green Globe

Grown extensively for its edible, deep green, globe-shaped buds or flower heads whose fleshy bud scales, when cooked, are regarded as a choice delicacy. Sow seed early indoors, setting the plants outdoors after danger of frost is past, 2 ft. apart, in rows 4 ft. apart. Plants are hardy, but where winters are severe, protect with a heavy mulch to keep crowns from freezing. Will produce a crop of buds the second season and yield heaviest during the first two or three years. A packet will produce 25 plants; an ounce about 500 plants.

Broccoli

Culture: Same as for cabbage. Italian or Sprouting Broccoli very much resembles cauliflower except in color. 

BUSH LIMAS

Maule's finest

We are particularly proud of our fine lima bean seed. Every kind is produced under the most ideal conditions, and the care we give the seed is plainly evident in the crops you have in your garden. Lima beans grow best on rich, well-drained, porous soil. Do not plant until all danger of frost is over; wait until the soil is warm and moderately dry (usually the middle of May in the vicinity of Philadelphia). Generally limas are planted about 2 weeks after the first planting of bush or snap beans. Plant in rows 2 to 3 ft. apart, spacing the seed 6 in. apart, and set them edgewise with the eye downward and cover with 2 in. of soil. Later thin to stand 12 to 18 in. apart in the rows. Cultivate shallow and frequently until the plants blossom. Pick the pods as soon as the beans are of edible size. A packet will plant about 25 ft. of row; use 1 lb. for 100 ft.; use 60 lbs. to an acre. Turn to page 13 for pole limas.



A fertile, well-drained, sandy loam or muck soil is best suited for growing garlic. The bulbs (sets) are composed of several sections or "cloves" which should be separated and set in rows 1 ft. apart, and 4 in. apart in the rows. Cover the "cloves" with 1 in. of fine soil. When the tops turn yellow, take up the bulbs, dry in the shade, and store in a cool, dry place away from frost. They will keep perfectly all winter.
