SUBJECT: Army Construction Section-Organization equipment etc.

PERSONNEL INTERVIEWED: Major ISHIKAWA - in construction section of Air Force and later that of Army.

- 1. A chart on the organization of the Army construction section will be prepared by Major ISHIKAWA, showing the flow of authority and the functions performed by each unit involved.
- 2. Nearly all Army construction in Japan excepting fortifications was handled by this organization. Fortifications were handled by the engineers; overseas construction was done by the Field Armies.
- 3. Construction equipment was generally barrowed from prefectural and municipal organizations, although the Regional Armies also had some of their own.
- 4. In 1940, 9% of the construction equipment produced in Japan went to the contractors; but by 1945, only 45% was available to them, the difference being taken by the Army. (No information on the Navy)
- 5. Major ISHIKAWAsubmitted a document showing the organization of the Army special construction groups.
- 6. The methods of construction of airfields were discussed. Fajor ISHIKAWA said that about 30% of Jap landing strips were unpaved, the ground strengthened with sod.
- 7. In 1942-43 concrete was the principal material used, but the subsequent shortage caused a switch to asphalt.
- 8. Concrete was used only for primary building-airstrips, utilities, buildings, headquarters, etc.
