TWO CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED MURDER

Alleged Assailants of Wellknown Prospector Lodge in Wilkinson Road Jail

For the alleged attempted murder of H. M. "Lord" Bacon, a grizzled old Prospector, and one of the best known, characters on Vancouver Island, John Smith and Sol Balmain were yesterday brought over to Victoria by Provincial Constable Marshall, and were lodged in the Wilkinson road jail.

The story of the shooting and the alleged attempt to murder, as told in evidence before the police magistrate at Campbell river, came to hand when the constable handed over his prisoners yesterday to the Victoria authori-ties. The two accused, John Smith and Sol-Ralmain, are to be tried at the next assizes.

According to the story told by Bace to the officers, he had had a disput-with Smith and Balmain and two other men over the staking of some mineral claims nearly thirty miles out of Campbell river. Bacon claims that be had staked the preperty and had done work on it Ipr some time before Smith and his partners laid claim to it.

On October 22. Bacon said, he was walking out with a pack of grub his claims and had got about t miles out of Campbell river wh Smith and Balmain came driving after Smith and Halmain came driving after him in a horse rig. Bacon stood to one side of the road as he saw the men coming. He says that when within forty yards of him, one of the men dropped to his knee and taking deliberate aim with a rifle shot him through the right hand, the bullet longhing its way through the width through the right hand, the bulle I loughing its way through the width of his hand and emerging at the base of the thumb. The builet, nearly severed the thumb, and it has had t be amputated since. A second shot passed so close to his stomach that in its passage it made a grazed mark across his left groin.

Bacon, who was quite unarmed at the time, though suffering intense pain from his wounded hand, ran for shelter into the thick bush. He says he was followed by the men, but managed to evade them until dusk, when he took shelter in the cabin of a settler who bandaged his wound and cared for him. Next morning the settler left before daylight for town to inform the police, and Bacon says that through the chinks and window of the cabin he saw Smith and Balmain approach. They tried to force their way into the cabin, but finding the door barred, decabin, but finding the door barred, de-sisted and returned to town. They made no effort to get away, although 24 hours elapsed between the time of the shooting and the time Constable Marshall was summoned and reached Campbell river from Quathiaski cove.
In their defence the men state that
Bacon previously had threatened to
shoot them if he found them, on the
disputed claims.
