### **DEWART'S ARGUMENTS** ON BEHALF OF KELLY

Contentions Advanced Quashing of Indictment of Winnipeg Contractor

Winnipeg, June 2.—Arguing for the quashing of the indictment returned by the grand jury against Thomas Kelly, the contractor, H. H. Dewart, K. C., of Toronto, contended before Mr. Justice Prendergast yesterday the province thought this reference.

Mr. Justice Holmes, of the United States supreme court, in giving judg-ment on the Kelly appeal against the extradition order of United States Commissioner Mason, had remarked that the supreme court took it for granted the accused would be tried only for the offences named in the extradition warrant. This, indeed, was made necessary by the treaty between Canada and the United States. But the crown had put a count in the indictment, charging Kelly with received. dictment, charging Kelly with received in money obtained as the result of a conspiracy between himself, and Sir Rodmond Roblin, James H. Howden, Rodmond Roblin, James H. Howden, George R. Coldwell, Victor Horwood and others. This meant that an attempt was to be made to prove conspiracy against Kelly, although the crown had no howers to attempt that the provention of the construction piracy against Kelly, although the rown had no business to attempt that, Receiving.

.Another discrepancy in the indict Another discrepancy in the indictment was the count charging the accused with receiving money obtained by conspiracy between himself and the persons named above, and also his sons Charles and Lawrence. The young men had not been mentioned in the extradition proceedings. Therefore it was improper to charge Kelly now with conspiracy with them. This was one of the counts which should be deleted because Kelly had not been extradited on it.

The second count which he held ex-

The second count which he held ex-ceeded the limits of the extradition warrant was that Kelly had "received money obtained by false pretences." In Chicago he had been accused of re-ceiving money obtained by conspiracy, but not of receiving money obtained by false pretences. In any event, Kelly should not be accused of receiving the same money that in another count he was accused of obtaining by false pre-

Objections also were entered against the count charging theft. This crime according to the bill of particulars, covered a period of two years, and included nineteen separate acts. Mr. Dewart said it was contrary to the provisions of the code to lump such a series of acts together in one count. It was provided in the code that an indictment for theft might include three separate acts, provided they had taken place within a period of six months. Edward Anderson, K.C., took up the argument when Mr. Dewart had concluded, His first objection to the indictment was that it failed to specify dates and acts. Kelly was charged with stealing "money, valuables and other property." This was altogether too vague. That the accurad should not be charged with stealing as well as receiving was another contention of Mr. Anderson's. Stealing and receiving were distinct offences and a person could not be found guilty of both in connection with the same money or goods. Mr. Anderson also argued that the charge of perjury should set fort first, that Kelly had been a witness before the public accounts committee. before the public accounts committee, and secondly, that the committee real-ly had the power to take evidence un-



### **PARLIAMENTARIANS GOING TO ENGLAND**

Australian and New Zealand Delegation in City Today; the Personnel

En route to the capital of the empire with a view to conferring on imperial issues, and later to visit the western front, representatives from Australia and New Zealand of the British Empire Parliamentary Association, ar rived on the Makura last evening, and stayed till the afternoon boat to-day, proceeding to Vancouver.

The members of the party are: Australia, Hon. Patrick McGlynn, K. C., member of the house of representatives for Angas, South Australia, and former attorney general, and later minis-ter of external affairs in the last two. Isberal cabinets of the Common-wealth, New Zealand, Hon, W. C. F. Carneross, of Eitham, chairman of the committees of the legislative council; Sir James Carroll, K. C. M. G., mem-ber for Glsborne; E. P. Lee, member for Camaru and C. J. Parr<sub>ii</sub> C. M. G., member for Eden.

They were met at the boat by Hon Lorne A. Campbell, on behalf of the provincial government; G. H. Barnard, M. P.; Mayor Stewart; Col. E. J. Chambers, chief press censor, for the Dominion authorities; and Col. George H. Ham, the genial chief of publicity for the C. P. R., the last two of whom will accompany them across the con-

The party is making its stay at the Empress hotel. The parliament build-lags were illuminated in their honor last evening. The programme to-day included a regimental inspection, a call at Government House and on the ad-miral superintendent of the Esquimatt dockyard. Sir James Carroll is to speak to the Canadian Club in Vancouver to-morrow.

The visitors are looking forward to conference, which will take place the conference, which will take place in London during July. The opinion appears to be that it is preliminary to an imperial conference. Questions of economics, industry and social affairs which have arisen from the war will be fully discussed by the delegates, the Canadian representatives joining the party in the east. The present plans contemplate a direct crossing of plans contemplate a direct crossing of the continent to Ottawa, where they will meet Canadian ministers. Mr. Glynn, who has written extensively on constitutional questions, and was on of the framers of the Commonwealticonstitution, has an invitation, hatated, to go on to Washington, D. C. but doubts if he will be able to ac cept it. As a member of the federal war committee, a body representing both houses and parties in the Australian Commonwealth, Mr. Glynn is particularly suited for the share he will take in the conference work.

Sir James Carroll has been associ ated in office with several New Zea land ministries, and is one of the bes known men in the island Dominion. The invitations which had been is


