All unmarried persons with an income of \$1000 a year, and married folks whose income is \$2000 a year, must pay an income tax.

Failure to file a statement will make you liable for a severe penalty.

Our Weekly Recipe

Creamed Mussels

Wash mussels thoroughly and plate them in boiling water, leaving them until the shells open. Then pour off the water, take out the "beard" or byssus, and remove the meat from the shell, preserving the liquid in a separate dish. For each cup chopped meat, make 1 cup creamed sauce, being careful not to let it brown, is stirred in slowly $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of the mussel liquid and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of milk. Season to taste and continue to cook until thick and creamy. Add the mussels just before serving. Pour on toast.

Will Rebuild a Lodge and Hotel

While the embers of the Pebble Beach Lodge fire were still hot, twelve hours after the structure was burned to the ground, involving an estimated loss of \$50,000, builders and architects were on the ground evolving plans for new structures.

With insurance money to the amount of \$35,000 as a nucleus, it is said that plans are under way not only for the immediate erection of a splendid and bigger lodge, but also for a fifty-room stone hotel.

It is not known just now if the fire will interfere with the opening of the new golf course next month.

With the splendid accommodations afforded by the hotels and cottages in Carmel-by-the-Sea, it would seem that there is no necessity for postponing for a single day the opening of the course—an event to which golfers throughout California have looked forward. Even had there been no fire, many of the golf enthusiasts would have taken up their residence here because of lack of accommodations at Pebble Beach.

A number of valuable paintings were destroyed in the fire, among them a splendid canvas by Detlef Sammann, for which he is said to have refused a flattering offer a few days before the conflagration.

The United States Postoffice, located in the lodge, was also destroyed. A quantity of mail was burned, but it is probable that all stamps and accounts were saved, as these are usually placed in the safe at night. The safe was opened with but little difficulty. Postmaster R. J. McCabe is still on the job.
