From the files of the Lincoln Financial Foundation Collection 5. 743 Obituary.

J. V. Hanks died in South Canon on the 8th, aged 82 years and 6 months. Below we print a portion of an obituary prepared by Rev. Harris, of the M. E. church, who conducted the funeral services. We regret that space will not allow the reproduction of the notice entire:

Rev. Jacob V. Hanks was born in Hardin County, Ky., March 17th, 1812, and died in this city Oct., 8th, 1894. In January of 1835 he was married to Elizabeth S. Adams. In the interval between the two dates— 1812 and 1894—was lived a useful life. The history of a life of such length, lived at such a time, must of necessity be eventful. Almost all of the greatest century in the World's history was lived by this good man. He joined the Methodist church iu 1839, and was soon after authorized to fulfill the duties of a local preacher, and continued his labors in this line for many years. Father Hanks was a man possessed of a distinct personnality. He was a typical American—courageous, patriotic and true. Like his first cousin, Abraham Lincoln, he loved his country. When the Black Hawk war raged he went forth to do and dare for his country, and during the civil war he counted nothing hard to do that would in any way relieve suffering or advance the cause of freedom. He was a man of unusual physique, and his strong body and powerful constitution were an appropriate compliment to the stalwart character and noble purpose of the real man. He had a tender heart and a loving and forgiving spirit. He loved men for their real worth; he loved them because they were the objects of God's greatest love. He had not wealth; but, better than wealth, he had love for humanity, 1, like his lord, "eat about doing good. It was my privilege to visit th's good man very frequently during the month of his final sickness and severe suffering. I always found him cheerful and patient, trustful and believing. Just a few hours before be went away a touching scene occurred. I was standing by his bedside when his oldest living son (J. M. Hanks) came in from Florence. Approaching the bedside he said, "Good morning, father," then taking his hand he said, "It is hard here, but is it all right he said, "It is hard here, but is it all right ahead?" The dying christian answered "Yes; it is alright ahead." The glories of the other life have dawned upon this aged father. All enemies have been conquered, all battles won, all victories gained. The reward of a long, patient, trustful life has co.ne. God grant to all his dear ones the same triumph and victory. One of the Hanks. The Quincy Whig declares that a cousin of Abraham Lincoln has just died near that city. It says:

In the death of John H. Hanks, who had the distinction of being a first cousin of Abraham Lincoln, at Lou-isiana, Mo., where his funeral was held yesterday morning, there is more or less local interest in the fact that he formerly resided in Quincy and Adams county and leaves several relatives still living here. He came to this county with his parents, his fa ther being Joseph Hanks, a brother of Nancy Hanks, mother of the illustrious president of the United States in 1828 and settled on the farm which is still known as the Hanks farm, in Melrose township, about five miles southeast of the city.

John H. Hanks and his sister, Miss Isabelle Hanks, resided on the farm until after the death of their mother, who died in 1872, his father having died in 1856, and moved to Louisiana, Mo., where they have lived with another sister, Mrs. A. C. Hall, who also survives since with the exception of two years spent in this city. John Hanks and sister, Isabelle, came to this city about three years ago, and lived here two years before returning to Louisiana and made their home at 2141-2 North Fourth street.

In a recent interview Mr. Hanks gave out the information that he had never seen Lincoln but twice in his life. On one of these occasions it might be interesting to know that it. was the time that Lincoln was in Quincy for the joint debate with Stephen A. Douglas in Washington park. Hanks recently told of this meeting and said as follows: "My father was anxious to attend the debate, but was taken sick and was unable to go to Quincy. He sent me with a surry to bring Mr. Lincoln to our house. I met him at the office of Lawyer Browning in Quincy, and he promised to go with me, but when the time came he had just received a dispatch calling him back to Springfield, and that he regretted very much not being able to visit his uncle Joseph, my father."
In adding he stated: "Lincoln rec-

In adding he stated: "Lincoln recognized me as his cousin and my father as his uncle. And my father and mother taught their children that Nancy Hanks was their aunt."


## Cousin Of Lincoln Dies In West At 84
