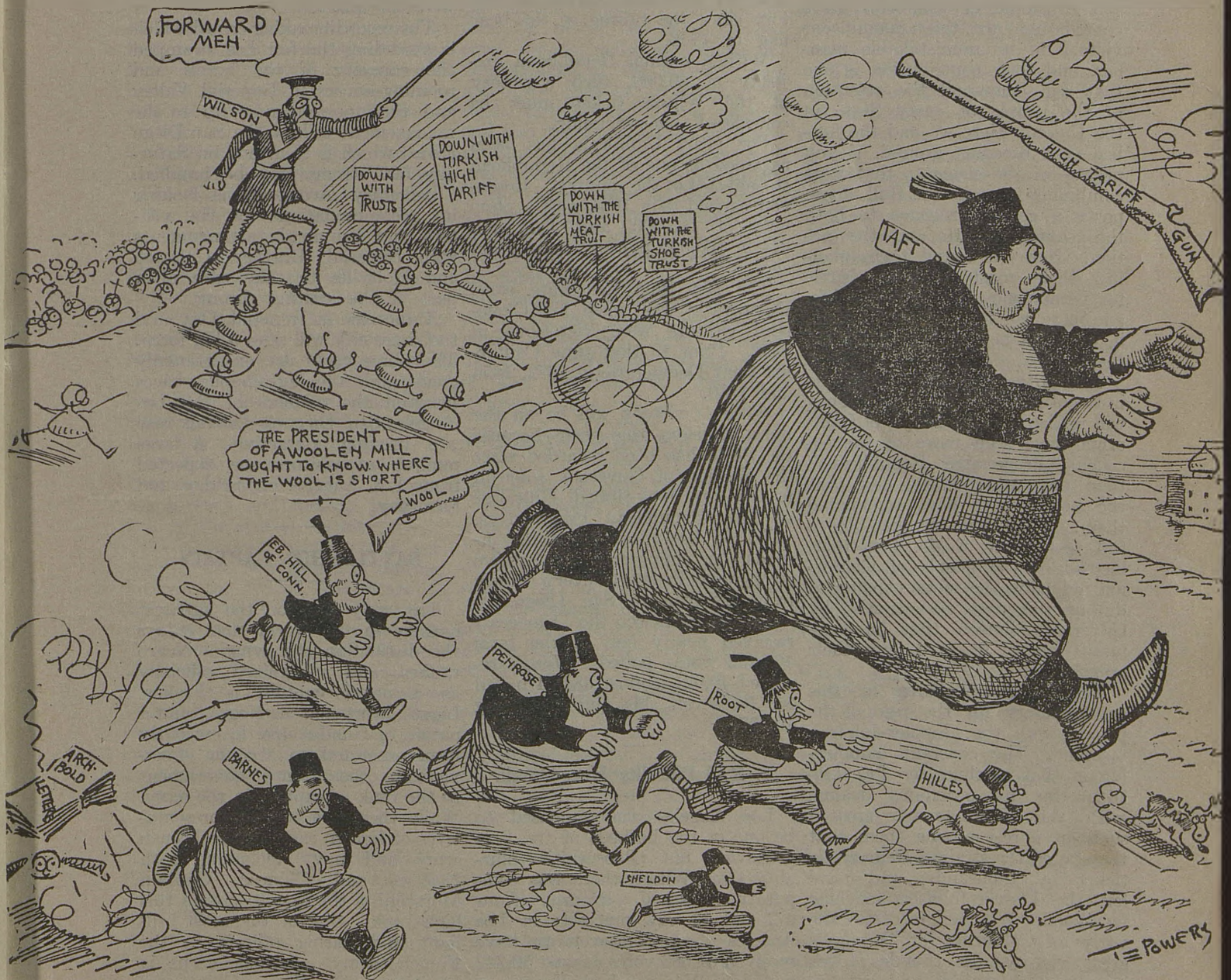

Opposition Routed by Wiison's Forces

"It was, indeed, a most glorious victory, a victory that will be shared by practically all the people of our country. It is a glorious triumph for the cause of Democracy—for the cause of the people. It means a step onward and upward in our national life.

The people of California have contributed to this magnificent victory in no unmistakable manner, and their contribution is one that will command the attention of the people of every State in the Union. Here we had the hotbed—the breeding ground, if you please—of the elements that were combining to make the Bull Moose party a genuine menace to both this commonwealth and the nation. Here we found them making their most vigorous battle for permanency in our public life, and here we have checked them, if we have not as yet eliminated them.

This is the view that the people in the other States will take. They will realize that the people of California have seen more of the so-called "Progressive Republicans" than any other State, and that the people here have repudiated them? DEMOCRACY'S VICTORY IN CALIFORNIA OVER- WHELMING

Should he carry by the estimated plurality over Roosevelt of 7500 votes, President-elect Wilson will win the State over to the Democrats for the fifth time in its history since the raising of the bear flag in 1846.

With a normal Republican majority of 80,000, such a victory of the Wilson ticket must be considered overwhelming.

For years California has been regarded as one of the Republican strongholds of the country. Roosevelt carried it in 1904 with a plurality of 115,000, and Taft had nearly 100,000 plurality four years ago.

The last time the State went Democratic was when the Cleveland electors were victorious in 1892. Prior to that time California went Democratic in 1852, 1856 and 1880.

Wilson's victory will be all the more decisive this year because the State has been regarded since the election of Governor Johnson to be the rock-ribbed Gibraltar of the Republican Progressives.

Wilson has made surprising inroads on supposedly Progressive strongholds in nearly every county from Siskiyou to San Diego.

In San Francisco the Democrats received nearly half of the total 105,232 votes polled. Wilson received 49,021 against 38,624 polled for Roosevelt, his plurality being 10,397.

T. R.'S Plurality Here Small.

Los Angeles was supposed to be one of the hotbeds of the Progressives, but Roosevelt's plurality over Wilson there was comparatively small. Returns from 677 out of 727 precincts in Los Angeles show Roosevelt to have received 64,683 votes against 50,342 polled for Wilson.—L. A. Examiner.

SECOND DAY OF FAIR.

Imperial County Fair is Attended
by Thousands Who Enjoy the
Races and Other Features.

El Centro, Nov. 6.—(Exclusive Dispatch.) The second day of the Imperial county fair was attended by about 3,000 people today. The fair was in full swing for the first time and all of the various exhibits were in place.

The record-breaking crowd which is attending the fair has swamped the capacity of the hotels and rooming-houses in Imperial Valley and the question now up to the management is how the San Diego crowd which is to attend on Saturday 500 strong may be handled.

Secretary Armstead is looking up accommodations for the visitors and has made arrangements with Imperial, Brawley, Calexico and Holtville to take care of a part of the visiting throng.

Tomorrow is Imperial Day and the sister city will send a big force. The horse races are exceptionally good and the automobile races between the winners of the Los Angeles-San Diego-to-Phoenix race are proving attractive. A large number of visitors are expected from Los Angeles on Friday and Saturday.

BATTLESHIP CAPTAIN

The only one of the greatest nations in the world that enjoys the distinction of having a Negro ranked and recognized officially as a naval captain is France. Lieut. Mortenoi, a Negro, and a native of Guadaloupe, has recently been promoted on account of services to the French government to the rank of captain in the navy. While there are many representatives of foreign races in the French army and navy including both Negroes and Chinese, Captain Mortenoi is the first to obtain this high rank. One of the most brilliant and daring officers in the French army aviation corps is Lieutenant Do Hu, a Chinaman.

In order to reach the intelligent race men and women, or to keep posted on race doings, read Negro papers. Let the Negro ministry live up to this move and the press of Los Angeles will become a power.

APPOINTS NEGRO POLICEMAN

Special to the New York Age.

Little Rock, Ark., Oct. 20.—Paul Chaney has been appointed a policeman and has been assigned to night duty along West Ninth street. A number of prominent colored business men in that section of the city petitioned Mayor Taylor that a Negro be appointed police officer.

Police Officer Chaney, who is a blacksmith by trade, is the first Negro to serve under the present administration as a guardian of the peace. Samuel Speight, a Negro, was for many years connected with the detective force here.

Philadelphia, Oct. 21.—S. B. Stuart, whose wife has \$10,000,000, and Thomas Posey, their colored chauffeur, are in the Jewish hospital tonight with bullet wounds in their legs. The shooting oc-

curred early this evening in the Stuart home, Melrose park.

The above dispatch is decidedly interesting, even though the reader is called upon to supply the hidden information. Just why both victims should be shot in the legs and how, and by whom, the dispatch does not state. It seems like a puzzle, but there must be a solution for it.—Western Outlook.

THE VICTORY IN THIS STATE

The victory in this State over the Lissner-Johnson machine seems to be complete. At this writing the returns are not in sufficiently to determine the full extent of the Bull Moose disaster; but the returns thus far show that the Lissner-Johnson machine is tottering to its fall. The big vote recorded against the Bull Moosers in this State by the Negro voters is gratifying beyond the power of words to express.

Now that the work of political emancipation has set in it will be

kept up until the Negro enjoys every advantage that the exercise of the franchise secures for other citizens.

DEMOCRATS SWEEP THE COUNTRY

By an overwhelming popular wave, the intelligent, independent Negro voters of the North and West, joining in the grand swell the Democratic party is again in complete control of the government.

After the elpse of more than a half a century another Virginia gentleman and statesman goes to the White House. The overwhelming vote given Gov. Wilson by the Country gives him opportunities enjoyed by no man since Lincoln. By the election of Gov. Wilson the South has an opportunity to wield a larger influence in National affairs than it has enjoyed since the early sixties. Gov. Wilson is a man of ability and broad vision and without doubt will live up to his opportunities.

Brownsville has been avenged. The man, Roosevelt, the first to besmirch the character of Negro soldiers has gone down to ignominious defeat. His mean attempt to break the Solid South by basely betraying the Negroes, aside from winning for him the contempt of the Southern people, it has forever broken the solid Negro vote.

THE LYCEUM

Dr. Stewart delivered a very encouraging address to the Lyceum Sept. 29th, subject: "Thinkers." From the size of the audience, he dubbed the Lyceum as the society of thinkers, and stated that the great body of the people did not think; that the thinking is generally done by a few. He said one of the Negro's great drawbacks is the failure to think, and the Lyceum could be engaged in no greater work than that of gathering together the thinkers of the community; that the business of thinking and investigating be encouraged

to the end that the number of thinkers in the community be increased. He said the doctrine of educating the head, heart and hand is alright provided that the emphasis be placed on the head instead of the hand; that when the head is properly educated it will become the seat of thought and the hand, which simply obeys the head, will do beautiful things. He stated that taking advantage of this doctrine of educating the head, heart and hand, that many states, having a large Negro population, had abolished all high schools for colored children and increased the number for white children. The object of this discrimination is easily to be understood—the Negro is to be taught to work and the white people taught to think.

ONE NEWSPAPER COMES OUT FOR GUY EDDIE.

"Atty. Eddie, is but a victim of the questionable plan of using 'Stool Pigeons,' women decoys and such types as would appear to have been used in city service. It might very easily be that women of the type of his accusers could be used in a 'frame-up.' It is just as certain that the use of women of that type is, on the whole, dangerous both to officials and citizens."—The New Age.

The above from the New Age gives that paper the unenviable record of being the first city paper to show an inclination to defend Mr. Eddie. While the other papers have published only the facts disclosed by the investigation they have published no conclusions as to his guilt or innocence. The New Age is undoubtedly against the prosecution of the City prosecutor and moral censor. This is the first time under its new management that the New Age came out for or against anything that the public was seriously considering. The guilt or innocence of moral censor Eddie remains to be established. Thus far there has been no evidence produced to show that his handsome

accusers are other than ladies; therefore *the Liberator* is not prepared to put them under a cloud of suspicion. If a copy of *The New Age* could be forwarded to moral censor Eddie he would doubtless prize it highly.

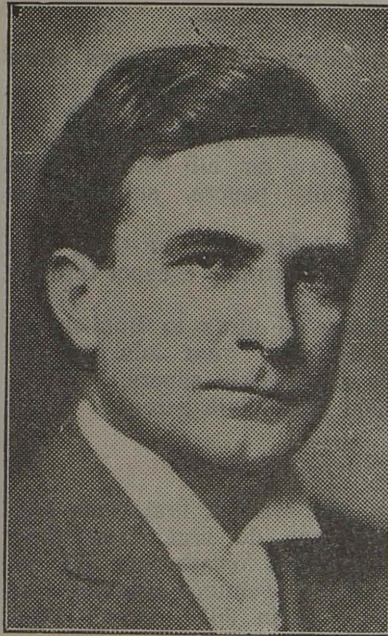
The young couple received many useful and valuable presents. Ice cream and cake was served at the reception tendered them by the brides parents.

THE LYCEUM

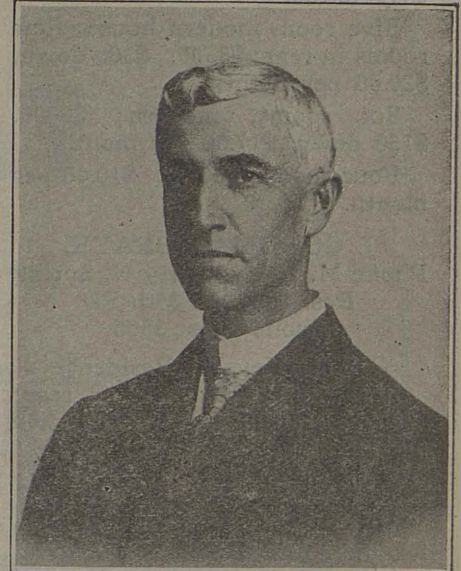

Bull Mooses are invited to be present at this conference. As there are nothing in sight but scavenger jobs, the movement to disband is strongly urged by the thinking ones.

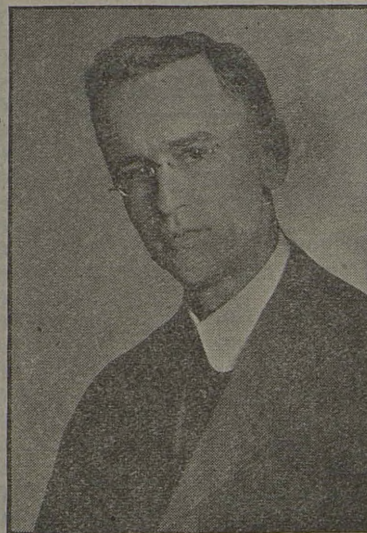
